Sunflower@Cambourne Nursery



Welcome to our May update!

I thought I would start by telling you all a little bit more about Sunflower Nursery.

CAMBRIDGE HOUSING SOCIETY (CHS), who own and run the Cambourne Nursery, is a non-profit making organisation. In Cambourne, it focuses on community projects such as affordable housing for rent, shared ownership housing and community investment services and CHS provides a Community Development Worker – Laura Parkinson.

Through CHS' interest in providing services for local people, and given the need for childcare in Cambourne, CHS opened a new Nursery in Cambourne in September 2008. CHS already has a successful established community nursery on Stretton Avenue in Cambridge, and the new Sunflower Nursery in Cambourne reflects CHS' experience of delivering high quality childcare.

The Sunflower Nursery offers Day Care for children aged from 4 months to 5 years, from 8 till 6pm. Through our local community connections with the Cambourne Children Centre and the local Parent Support Advisor, we have provided the crèche facilities for a number of local courses for parents in Cambourne. We also have Government Funded Pre- school places which residents can apply for. The Sunflower Nursery is a small business, with its own budget, income and costs - and has to fund itself. The fees are set to cover the cost of high quality childcare and all staff are professionally trained in childcare and are all First Aid trained. Having only being open for 5 months, we received a 'Good' grading in all 14 aspects assessed by Ofsted – the Government inspection body that regulates childcare and education – these great results reflect the high quality of the service. and staff are working towards attaining "outstanding" grades from Ofsted next time they inspect.

EASTER ACTIVITIES

Jackie our cook who runs the weekly cookery club made Easter nests with the children, which they enjoyed immensely – there was a lot of bowl licking going on!

On April 6th, we were part of the community Easter Egg Hunt run by Laura (Community Development Worker) and Jenny from the Wildlife Trust. Almost 100 children and adults visited our garden to seek out the eggs that Nursery Staff had artfully hidden, watched by the Easter Bunny....or was it Laura?!

OUR GARDEN - SPRING HAS SPRUNG!

The children have been very busy planting seedlings and bulbs with Tricia, Ian, Manda, and Barry (staff in the over 2's wing) and we are now starting to see results. We have herbs and vegetables that are beginning to grow. The plan is for Jackie to include them in the Nursery meals. Barry has planted a 'Willow Wigwam' which is flourishing, and the children have great fun using it as a den.

SUNFLOWER: THE OFFICIAL OPENING

Wildlife Review May 2009



The blossom is out, the trees are turning green again and life is busy for the wildlife in Cambourne. Birds will be making nests, some in trees and some on the ground, so we have to be very careful when doing any work around the site. Walking through the woods you can hear many male birds singing to defend their territories and attract mates. The most distinctive include chiffchaffs (who call out their name repeatedly), greenfinches (wheeeeze) and great tits (like a squeaky wheelbarrow). Let me know when you see the first swallows arriving!

Bluebells will be coming out in Monkfield Wood and near the A428, but for really spectacular displays go along to one of our ancient woodland reserves at Waresley, Gamlingay or Hayley Wood. Check on our website for directions. Around Cambourne the Hawthorn will be blossoming, and buttercups, oxeye daisy and cow parsley will be flowering. Dragonflies will start to emerge towards the end of the month and common blue butterflies will appear.

During the Easter holidays 17 volunteers came out to help me litter pick in the Country Park, Eco Park and Monkfield Wood. A huge thank you to them and all those who collect litter through the year. If you would like to borrow our litter picking equipment at any time please get in touch.

The people that grow these plants for us through the year will also be available to advise you on what will be best for your garden. During May half-term we will be out around Cambourne with telescopes and binoculars to get you closer to the birds of

Cambourne. On Thursday 28th May we will be

at different locations around the green spaces for about an hour. You will find us at Oaks Wood from 10am, Crow Hill from 11am and Whomping Willow Lake at midday. You can come along to one or more of the locations and you should see a wide variety of bird species. We will also have lots of information about how you can help the birds in your own garden.

Pastoral Thoughts

Sitting on the floor with my legs hanging out the back of the helicopter as we went over the jungle in almost total darkness was an interesting experience. I then noticed another noise that had not been there before. It was not our engine or the miniguns rattling in their mounts, but a much deeper droning noise coming from outside the aircraft. Of course, ordinarily I could see nothing but darkness, but I knew there was something else there. I pulled down my night vision goggles and switched them on. Straight away I could see where once there had been just a blanket of dark sky now I saw our refueling aircraft and the other helicopter. Now many of you realize that this happened many years ago. However, the vast contrast in that situation remains with me still. What a difference it made from the isolating darkness to the reassuring vision of friends there providing what we needed to carry on. Many of you have been in dark places whether physically or spiritually and you know what a difference a little light can make. Some of you may still be in places of darkness and you feel isolated and alone. You may not know which way to turn because you cannot see your way out. I have some good news for you. Jesus said in

John 8:12 Then spake Jesus again unto them, saying, I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life.

Before I came to Christ I was not only in spiritual darkness, but spiritually dead. But then I heard that message of love and hope and a glimmer of light came to my life. I turned away from the darkness and went into the light which is Christ. I asked Christ to save me July 12th, 1992 and he did. If you are tired of the darkness, that same message is there for you. Comberton Village College A NOTE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

What is true education? Rather a large question requiring more than just a brief column from a local educationalist might be a fair response! For sure, it goes far beyond the acquisition of significant qualifications (although a formal education in our society is reasonably bound to involve gaining meaningful qualifications). It will certainly involve the development of the individual, a proper preparation for later life, an appreciation of the world in which we live, an ability to live with and work with others and other things as well.

Perhaps real education has something involved in it that could be described as 'transformational'. This is a phrase perhaps too easily and potentially glibly used. However, powerful education perhaps has the power to affect and to change lives. This begs a question about what might ever achieve that. I was reminded recently about the sort of thing that can. I was fortunate to spend a further week in Mozambigue before Easter (a similar visit had taken place two years) to look at establishing further school links for several Cambridgeshire schools as well as strengthening Comberton Village College's pre-existing link with a large secondary school in Maputo. It was a really good week with much possibility for further work and possible exchanges for students and staff from Cambridgeshire in the future. We already have a visit planned for six students and two staff this July, following one last July (in addition to the long-standing similar visit to our partner school near Pretoria in South Africa).

Why do this? It is a lot of effort to make such links and visits possible. It does not give a formal qualification to any student or count for anything in an Ofsted inspection. The answer is, I believe, obvious and simple: it is true education that has the power to be transformational. Probably every student from this country involved in such a visit is strongly affected in a way that impacts upon their outlook on life. Visiting schools with 100 children in a class, no equipment at all (including desks, hence they sit on the floor) but with a joy for education and life puts virtually everything in perspective. Recognising that turning on a tap and being able not only to get water but to drink it is a wonderful thing not even dreamt of by very many in our world is something that affects young people's lives. Knowing that many students walk more than 10 kilometres every day to get to school for a 7.30 a.m. start is salutary. I vividly remember asking one student from this country who had been on such a visit how his studies were now going on his return. He had not been the most diligent of students before the visit. His slightly embarrassed reply was that he was now, for the first time, working hard to try to do as well as he could "because how could I do anything else now that I have seen and got to know others who have nothing but do not complain and try to do as well as they can". He made a fair point. Many such students go back later to work in the schools, orphanages and other settings they have visited. For all of them, they would say that these experiences have been the most powerful, and positive, educational experience they received in their school years.

During the current official close season, we still like to keep ourselves busy. We tend to scout out new venues for the forthcoming winter, this is always top of our agenda. This means, of course, we also get to chuck a few lures around, which is a result! So, for this season I decided to join the CFPAS, The Cambridge Fish Preservation Angling Society. Many anglers out there will be familiar with this club, I'm sure.

The CFPAS have many sections along the River Cam, River Ouse, also the Reach and Burwell Lodes. There are other venues which include some still waters, one being Barnwell Lake. This lake runs parallel to Cambridge United F.C. along the Newmarket road.

Block Fen lakes A and B at Mepal are also included in the £25 annual subscription. Milton Country Park in Cambridge is another, very popular with the Cambridge carp anglers, dog walkers and the public generally.

All these venues and indeed others which I have not mentioned do offer some good fishing, some good pike fishing as well I hear!

Over the Easter bank holiday we decided to visit one of our favourite tackle shops, Shelton's of Peterborough. The tackle shop had relocated to much larger premises, next door! The grand reopening saw 3 famous anglers in attendance: Discovery Channel's "Total Fishing" programme and "The Great Rod Race series" favourite gentleman, "The Duke" Mick Brown.

Current World Champion Will Raison was also there as was the former 5 times World Champion Alan Scotthorne.

As I have always been a big fan of Mick Brown, one of pike angling's all time greats, I just had to grab this opportunity to have a chat with him. I was also extremely pleased that the great man also signed my book, a 1993 first edition of The Pike and the Passion by Mick Brown. After chatting for almost an hour, we did manage to pick up a few tips. I had asked Mick for his advice on how to fish with jigs and spinner baits the correct way. Sure enough he was happy to pass on his knowledge and experience and gave us a few great tips and ideas to try out.

Back in March the heaviest-ever river pike and the largest ever to come from a "natural" water, was landed recently by John Goble. The new best for the famous Broads system weighed an incredible 45lb 8ozs.

Other big fish of note fell to Chris Burdon who took a fish of 42lb 7ozs, and one of 40lb 10ozs which was caught by Stephen Davis. Both fish came from Boddington Reservoir, Northamptonshire.

Oh! Before I forget, don't forget to renew your fishing licences folks. This season it will cost £26 for you adults and nothing for those of you under the age of 12.

A junior concession is available to those between 12 and 16 years of age, this will cost you £5.

Just remember, if you are caught without one you could be fined up to £2500. Ouch!
