NEW YOUTH GROUP FOR CAMBOURNE

The army cadet force officially arrived in Cambourne near Cambridge on Thursday 21st May 2009, when their newest detachment was declared open by Major Steve Martin the area commander.

Following talks between local army cadet leaders and Cambourne Youth Partnership, an agreement was reached earlier in the month which benefits all young people living in the area who are aged between 12 and 18. Cambridgeshire Amy Cadet Force, which is part of a national voluntary youth organization sponsored by the British Army, will provide challenging and adventurous activities for local young people at the Cambourne Soul Building in Back Lane each Thursday evening between 7.30pm and 9.30pm. All are welcome and there are even vacancies for adult helpers aged up to 55.

Initially there will be 10 army cadets at the new detachment who will help and guide new members. A free uniform will be provided to each new cadet and in addition to training sessions in basic military subjects young people will also have chance to take part in a whole range of exciting outdoor pursuits including the Duke of Edinburgh is award. For those who would like to achieve some qualifications recognised by future employers, BTEC certificates - each equivalent to form

to four GCSE exams - will also be available through cadet force membership.


This is a great opportunity for people living in and around Cambourne, said Captain Steve Swann, who is second in command of the area. This new detachment brings exciting activities and adventure, not just for young people but also for adults who wish to take part

- And the cadets are here to stay. On 27 June the cadet Corps of Drums and many other cadets from surrounding areas will be taking an active part in the local festival to mark Cambourne's tenth anniversary which also coincides with national Armed Forces Day. Once grants and funding have been agreed for a new Cambourne Community Centre it is hoped that the detachment will find a more permanent home. But as there needs to be a minimum of 15 cadets attending each week to keep a detachment viable the hunt is already on for new recruits! So if you are aged 12 to 18 and looking for fun, adventure and excitement, come along to Cambourne Soul in Back Lane on a Thursday evening and try it out and don't forget there are places for adult helpers too. No experience is necessary and all training is provided.

Hairy Potter



The Garden Wizard

I think May was a cracking month. A sunny start to warm that soil up followed by a good

drenching to get things going. June is here now though and that means long sunny days and warm light evenings (always good to be optimistic). This is the month when even the most reluctant of you out there will want to enjoy spending time outside. Even if it's only lounging on the patio with a drink, waiting for that blackened burger from the BBQ! If you are a fair weather gardener then it is not too late to plant a few containers for a bit of an instant makeover. Many climbers and roses will be in flower this month and the bedding plants you so carefully nurtured through the last frosts of May should be filling out nicely.

Top 10 jobs

- 1. Hoe borders regularly to keep down weeds (especially before they seed!)
- 2. All containers will need careful feeding and watering
- 3. Deadhead flowering plants to encourage new blooms
- 4. Get hanging baskets and containers in position outside
- 5. Cut lawns at least once a week
- 6. Plant out summer bedding
- 7. After your climbing rose has finished flowering, be sure to prune it as next year's blooms will be produced on this summer's new growth.
- 8. Prune spring flowering shrubs to prevent them becoming overgrown
- 9. Always let the foliage on spring bulbs wither naturally. This is vital for next year's display
- 10. Take Geraniums & Fuchsia cuttings

Things should be growing well so if you are a new resident, a word of warning. We occasionally get a breeze here so any tall herbaceous plants should be staked to prevent damage. If you are a rose lover then you will be no stranger to their high maintenance nature. You will need to keep an eye out for those pests and diseases and treat as necessary. A good feed will help them bloom but watch out for those suckers! A good job for the weekend is to clip those hedges to keep them looking neat.

In The Vegetable Garden

Salad crops will be ready for harvest as will the best thing to come out of the ground, early potatoes (personal opinion granted but hard to beat all the same). Hoe up around main crop potatoes and thin out rows of carrots and other vegetables so as they can reach their full potential. As it starts to heat up shade your greenhouses to stop plants scorching. Pinch out side shoots on your tomato plants and keep onions well watered. If all that isn't enough then plant out your leeks when large enough (about pencil size is a good guide).

And finally, do you ever get confused between weeds and plants in your boarder? Well the best way to make sure you are removing a weed and not a valuable plant is to pull on it. If it comes out of the ground easily, it is not a weed!

There's no doubt about it, walking is good for you. It's good for your heart, it's good for your lungs, it's good for the muscle and bone growth of your children and it's good for your feeling of wellbeing! Strong scientific evidence now supports the many benefits to health of regular walking – it is recommended that we take at least 10,000 steps a day.

Studies show that walking can:

- Reduce the risk of coronary heart disease and stroke
 Lower blood pressure
- Reduce high cholesterol
 Reduce body fat
 Enhance mental well being

Walking offers a great way to help kids get the active habit. If parents express excitement about the prospect of a walk in the countryside, they are more likely to transmit this feeling to their children. It's important to treat the walk as an exploration or adventure and to go at the child's pace, no matter how often they want to stop and look at things; take treats to eat and plenty to drink; and head for some landmark that will appeal to them such as a castle, a playground, an ice cream van or a boating pond. If children experience walking as part of a fun activity they are more likely to want to go again.

So, how do you find out what is on offer? John Harris, a keen walker, got fed up with the lack of information on walks that were going on in the County. So, he decided that if he couldn't find what he was looking for – he had better create it! CAMBOURNE WILDLIFE

I have had lots of reports of bird sightings in Cambourne over the last month and during the dawn chorus walk we heard or saw 32 species. Lots of you have been getting out and enjoying the green spaces and all the wildlife they have to offer (If you would like a leaflet showing how to get to them, call into the Manor House or phone or email me). We are doing a lot of surveying of bird nests this summer (that's us out really early on the hill!) to see what effect our management is having. The experts are really impressed with the numbers of corn buntings, skylarks and meadow pipits we have here. We also found a kestrel nest the other day, but I'm keeping the location secret!



near roads

Over the summer we will be doing lots of mowing around the site. Our methods may seem a bit strange to some, so I thought I would explain what we will be up to and why.

Between the trees: most of the planted trees are now getting big enough to cope on their own but we will be mowing between the trees that are still small during July and August. This keeps the competition from grasses down while the trees are establishing. The trees on the Northern boundary are taking longer to grow as the ground is so dry on the mound and the trees struggle to get a good root system established. Once they have enough roots they will start to put on a lot more growth above ground. We also regularly mow along back fences in places to keep the vegetation back from gardens. Please do not dump your grass clippings over your fence as this only enriches the soil and encourages the weeds.

Country Park and Crow Hill: There are many ground nesting birds in this area so we leave as much long grass as possible for as long as possible. We are working to reduce the amount of pernicious weeds, such as bristly ox-tongue and creeping thistle, by using specific herbicides and by selecting a couple of small areas to mow intensively throughout the summer. We started this constant mowing in March, so the areas will not be attractive to the birds. Next year these patches will be in different locations. The rest of the grass will get mown in September, but some parts will be left long over winter to provide cover for birds, small mammals and insects. Dog walkers - please don't let your dogs run through the long grass, especially during the breeding season.

Hay meadows on the Southern and eastern boundary track: these areas have a traditional hay cut in July after the wildflowers have set seed. This helps to keep the nutrient levels low so that rank species don't grow as strongly and the wildflowers have a chance. In some years we delay the cut to allow later flowering species a chance to set seed. The best time of year to visit these meadows is the end of June when most flowers are out and there are lots of butterflies and other insects. Other parts of the boundaries are mown like the country park.

WARNING!

We will be treating some areas of the Country Park with herbicides to try to reduce some of the pernicious weeds in the grasslands. The areas will be well marked with signs. Please follow the instructions on these signs and do not go into these areas, or allow your dog to run across them, for 24 hours. We avoid the use of chemicals wherever we can, but sometimes have to use specific treatments. We always make sure contractors follow strict public and environmental safety guidelines. If you have concerns please get in touch.

FIRES

There have been a few fires in the Country Park recently on some of the grass piles. We do not allow fires of any sort, including disposable barbeques, in any of our areas. If you see flames then please call us during office hours or the police at all other times. I would really like to put a stop to this before it causes real damage or someone gets hurt.

We must ensure that we do not act as fools and the best way to do this is to build our knowledge and wisdom firmly upon the foundation of the fear of the Lord without mingling in any vain philosophies of man or selfish, unrighteous and foolish ideas of our own. For the Christian who wishes to live a victorious life neglecting your Biblical study is not an option. 



LONDON IS ABLAZE!

On 2nd September 1666, a terrible fire spread through London.

So terrible was it that it burnt over 259 houses down in one night. Only one person died that we have heard of.

The houses were made out of wood and thatch and that is why the fire spread so auickly.

Four days later it was over but hundreds of people are homeless. "The fire was chaos!" reported Mrs Lucey.

2nd September 1666

At 1 o'clock in the morning I was woken by a sudden scream. My maid was desperately packing away. She was shouting about a fire that was spreading quickly from the King's bakery shop. I quickly got dressed to investigate and got a boat out across the river and I saw millions of people running for their lives. I called for the King's soldiers to knock down houses. As I walked down the street, I could hear children weeping.

TERROR IN LONDON

On the second of September 1666, a horrible fire destroyed three quarters of London. Thomas Farynor, the king's baker, left his oven on and forgot to turn it off.

First it destroyed all of Pudding Lane, the street the bakery was in.

After that people were running and screaming everywhere. Some of the people were even trying to put the fire out with leather buckets. The Army were pulling houses down with ropes, and blowing houses up with gunpowder to get a gap between the houses because they were so close together.

Finally the fire went out. Samuel Pepys wrote a diary about the fire.

"It was chaos," Mrs Boot of Fox Lane reported.

2nd September 1666

At about 3 o'clock in the morning my house maid, Jane, woke me and told me about a horrible fire. I thought it would only be a tiny fire at first so I went back to bed and slept some more. However, by and by my housemaid kept waking me so I got out of bed and crawled on the carpet and into Jane's room who was packing desperately. After that I got my night gown on and went to the window and flung open the curtains over Fish Street. I realised that even my neighbours had gone! at Hinchingbrooke Health Care NHS Trust, Huntingdon

Two new ways of working at Hinchingbrooke Maternity unit will offer women more choice:

The Primrose Suite - Hinchingbrooke's new Midwifery Led Birthing Unit Due to open in June 2009, the Primrose Suite will be an exciting new addition to the choices for women choosing to give birth at Hinchingbrooke.

Primrose Suite will be available for use by women who choose to birth in a low risk birthing environment within the hospital and who, following an assessment by their Community Midwife, are suitable for birth in a low risk environment. This purpose designed and built area is independent to the labour ward and consists of a reception and waiting area with two birthing rooms and a two bedded rest area. The area is bright and contemporary in design with stylist photography adorning the walls, colourful curtains and toning furniture give this area a comfortable non clinical feel.

The rest area and both birthing rooms are ensuite, with direct access to a new pool room from one birthing room. The rooms are equipped with Bradbury couches and other birthing aids to support women in exploring positions for birth, while medical equipment, such as infant resuscitation tables, are hidden away in keeping with the non clinical theme of the area.

A kitchenette is available for light refreshments so that the new family leaves for home refreshed and ready to enjoy their new arrival.

For women who are low risk, but not suitable for the Primrose Suite or for women who choose to give birth on the labour ward, there will be continued access to the birthing pool and to a low risk birthing room within the main labour ward environment.

For more information please contact your community midwife or the labour ward co-ordinator at Hinchingbrooke Health Care NHS Trust. Neonatal Examination Clinic

From May 2009, women who request early discharge home after a birth in the hospital will be given the choice of either: waiting to see a paediatrician to undertake the newborn examination prior to discharge or going home with an appointment to return within 72 hours of the baby's birth for the newborn examination which will be undertaken in an outpatient clinic by specially trained midwives or a paediatrician. An appointment for the baby to have its newborn hearing test will be offered alongside the newborn examination appointment; women who have a home birth will also be offered this service.

At the meeting of Cambourne Parish Council on Tuesday 19th May 2009 the holding of a Fun Fair on Great Cambourne Green was reconsidered in light of a petition containing 122 signatures against the holding of a Fun Fair on the Green.

At the beginning of the meeting there was an opportunity for residents to give their views for and against the Fun Fair all the concerns were noted for consideration by the Councillors. During the public session two petition in favour of the Fun Fair were presented the first containing 318 adult names and a second containing the names of 82 children under the age of 18. All residents were given a fair and equal chance to give their views on the Fun Fair.

Larry Gray (a member of the Showman's Guild) the representative of the family wishing to hold the Fun Fair on the Green explained that his was a family fair that had been operating for over 40 years.

Larry gave reassurances that the times of opening would be adhered too as his family are responsible and would be willing to keep the music down on the Wednesday and Thursday. None of the stalls provide alcohol or give it as prize. The showmen ensure that the area is cleared of people and provide security at the event.

The Councillors then considered all the information and had a detailed discussion on the pros and cons of holding the Fun Fair on Great Cambourne Green. A vote was then taken and it was agreed that a Fun Fair should be held on Great Cambourne Green as it would be a positive event for all the Community. It was believed that the steps being put in place would mitigate a lot of the concerns of the local residents.

The Fun Fair will take place on Great Cambourne Green. The Fair will arrive on Monday 6th July 2009. The Fun Fair is to be cleared by mid day Sunday 12th July 2009. The Fair would be open on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday 6.30pm-9.30pm and Saturday 2.00pm-9.30pm.

"Cambourne Parish Council voted overwhelmingly to go ahead with the fair on Great Cambourne Village Green. This represents a great opportunity for the residents of Cambourne to come together as a community and have some fun."

The intention is that the Youth Council would have its own budget to spend on youth initiatives.

I would like to thank the community for their support over the last 8 months."

Councillor Roger Hume was re-elected as Parish Vice-Chairman for the ensuing year.

THE FINANCIAL SITUATION

Firstly, it is necessary to explain that the Parish Council has no money of its own, only that which it receives from the taxpayers of Cambourne.

Secondly, I should say that the Parish Council gets no grants from central government or from the South Cambs District Council (SCDC). The PC's money comes purely from the RESIDENTS of Cambourne, not even from the businesses who pay a nationally determined Uniform Business Rate of which the Parish Council does not get any share.

The Parish Council raised a precept of £256,000.00 to cover the cost of running the Council and the facilities in Cambourne this allowed for an income of £54,800.00. We actually had an income of £127,480.00 of which included Allotment rentals, Community Centre hiring, MUGA bookings, £14,400.00 bank interest and contributions from the Developers towards the maintenance costs of the facilities transferred to the Parish Council.

The Parish Council actually spent £247,280.00 on Cambourne; this was used to fund the running and maintenance of The Hub, MUGA, open spaces and play areas to retain them as valuable assets for the community. The actual spend was slightly lower than projected due to delays in transferring the assets to the Parish Council and the completion of projects including the Maintenance Building. Most of this under spend is to be held in allocated reserves and will be spent in the next financial year when the projects come to fruition or continue to form the basis of our repairs and renewals fund as some of the areas are up to 10 years old.

The Council last year had its fourth audit and once again obtained an unqualified Audit which means that all the actions of the Parish Council throughout our last financial year was within the law and powers that govern Parish Councils.

In December the Parish Council set the precept for the financial year 2009-2010. The Council once again spent a long time on this as we wanted to ensure that the work of the Council is improved for the benefit of the residents. It was not an easy decision to make but we are getting a high standard of facilities which we have to maintain or it will cost more in the long run.

This year the Parish Council kept the Precept at the same level, if the number of band D dwellings had stayed the same, the band D charge would have been the same as last year. Unfortunately South Cambs reduced the number of band D dwellings. This meant there is a 3.14% increase rather than standing still. Hopefully next year the present economic climate will improve and bring a growth in new house sales.

I have to confirm that all the Council's accounts are subject to scrutiny by the Government appointed external auditors, and that all the Council's activities will be subject to the mandatory Internal Audit process.

The Pike Anglers of Cambourne

Over the last few weeks or so, things have started to look more promising for the forthcoming months. The fishing is coming along reasonably well at the moment. All of the new venues that we have visited so far have all produced pike of some size.

After a couple of visits to Milton Country Park, I eventually rediscovered just what it was like to catch a pike. Milton has now become one of our new chosen venues for us to fish this coming season. So, one evening after work, I took myself up to Todd's Lake within the country park to give it another go. I was hoping to see if an evening session would be more productive, as other sessions during the daytime seem to have been somewhat slower.

After a couple of uneventful hours I finally got into some tough summer pike fishing that I have come to expect. My first pike fell to a new fox soft bait lure. The fish was a fine looking pike of around 10lb, considering many pike look a little tatty and worse for wear at this time of year. This is usually due to post-spawning. I decided to stay in the same swim, when five minutes later I was into another summer scrapper. The only difference this time was that this one was bigger. After a couple of attempts to tail walk, (this is a pike's way of trying to throw the hooks), the pike was brought safely to the margins, where I gloved it out.

While I am on the subject of gloving pike, I really would not encourage or recommend people to try it, this goes out especially to those anglers that have not had much experience when pike fishing. Flying trebles can cause really nasty injuries, so please use the appropriate landing nets.

Again, a very nice-conditioned fish was landed, but this time around the pike weighed in at approximately 14lb. That is the biggest fish for me so far this season, and I do hope that there will be plenty more to follow, and bigger! Fishing with surface lures in the summer months can also bring you some exhilarating sport. Surface lures are not only used to imitate injured fish they also imitate bugs and small insects, for example frogs, waterfowls, rats and other creepy crawlies.

It seemed a great time to try them on this evening in particular and so I moved onto the lake parallel to Todd's, the lake called Dickerson's. I did manage to raise and interest two pike, but I could not just tempt them enough.

If you have not experienced this kind of fishing before, believe me it can be a very exciting pasttime, and a great way to spend an evening, if you are lucky enough to catch the pike in the right mood that is.

A visit to nearby Hinchingbrooke Park saw me entice another 3 Pike, during a short session of only a couple hours. On a bright and breezy day during the week, the pike seemed to be in a confident mood. After a number of follow-ups to my new fox soft bait lures, I only managed to land the 3, the biggest being around 8lb. The other 2 were somewhat smaller, but great fun nevertheless.
