

On Sept 3rd this year, Jeavons Wood Primary opened doors for the first time and welcomed pupils into the fold. At time of writing, there are 52 children enrolled across 3 classes, looked after by 9 members of staff, including 3 experienced teachers and a head teacher who is a former Ofsted inspector. Provision at the moment is for reception, year one, and year two pupils.

Today, I went along to see it all for myself. Situated behind the church, the school is currently housed in what is billed as 'temporary accommodation'. Upon arrival I found a robust and thoughtfully laid out complex. Whilst undeniably temporary, the royal blue woodwork exterior looks as if it has been designed to withstand the ages. Entering, I was to discover in tardis-like fashion, the building is more temporary on the outside than the inside. I found myself in a spacious entrance hall with carpeting, under floor heating, and a light, airy atmosphere. There is artwork on the walls, and in the high ceilings abundant skylights splay natural light as far as the eye can see. All around I could hear the sound of kids having fun. If you had told me I was in a purpose-built permanent building, I wouldn't have batted an eyelid.

After signing in, I was treated to a coffee (always a bonus) and then got to meet the head teacher, Mrs Sarah Humphreys, who spoke eloquently and passionately about the school, the plans for the future, and the community. The school currently has three classes, two of which are reception classes and the third being a balanced mix of year one and two students. Mrs Humphreys went on to say..

"...We knew the age group of children we would be initially taking in. Consequently we were able to focus our recruitment efforts accordingly. We have an experienced team capable of meeting all the challenges.."

"...The emphasis for our current complement of students is on learning through play. Monitoring the interests of the children and teaching them within that framework results in children interested in learning..."

I was given the grand tour through an impressive set of facilities. Everywhere I went I saw colourful, vibrant classrooms, and gaggles of kids involved in a range of activities from finger painting to working on one of many PC's.

Mrs Humphreys also spoke about the relationship with the other primary schools in Cambourne "..The three primary schools in Cambourne meet regularly, and share resources, ideas and training. Whilst diversity between schools is good for the community in as much as it gives parents more choice, Its important to realise there is not a competition scenario Between primary schools In Cambourne.."

Two new classrooms are to be added to the complex next year. Mrs Humphreys showed me the site where the new classes will go, Right next to the ample playing fields and playground that the children get to enjoy at the moment. In two years, the school will move to its permanent location in Jeavons woods. If what I have seen here today is indicative of things to come, then we are in for a treat. Wildlife Review October 2009



The signs of autumn are really starting to appear now, with blackberries, rose hips, and haws appearing on the hedgerows. Keep an eye out for all the autumn migrants arriving to feast on the bounty. There are still a few last butterflies and dragonflies around and the last of the swallows leaving for Africa.

Thank you to Hillary Dawson for her photo of a black squirrel in response to my request last month. Black squirrels are a form of the American grey squirrels with extra dark pigment, or melanin, in their skin. They are found in Cambridgeshire, Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire and were first introduced to Woburn Park (Bedfordshire) from the U.S. at the end of the 19th Century. Has anyone else seen one in Cambourne? Do you have a closer photo?

Fishing Club

We held a meeting in September to discuss the idea of setting up a fishing club in Cambourne to help look after the angling on Lake Ewart. Lots of people came along to discuss how they would like to see a club work and we now have the first committee to start setting it up. This will mean that there will no longer be free fishing on Lake Ewart from 1st January 2010, but membership will only be around

Hairy Potter The Garden Wizard

OCTOBER

October can often feel like the end of the garden year. The weather of the summer is now long gone (not a bad thing some might say!). Look carefully though and all around things are changing as quickly as they did in spring. The trees and shrubs are doing their swan song of berries and autumn foliage and now is the time to take stock and have a bit of a clear up. Look at it as putting your garden to bed but at the

same time getting it ready for next year. Putting some effort in now will pay you back in the spring. You can plant out wallflowers, pansies and forget-me-nots this month, ready for a strong start in 2009. Frost will be here soon so watch out for those tender plants. Bring them inside or use a protective covering.

Top 10 jobs

- 1. Clear up fallen leaves regularly
- 2. Cut back perennials that have finished for the year
- 3. If not done last month, divide and re plant herbaceous perennials
- 4. Move tender plants, including aquatic ones, into shelter
- 5. Plant bare rooted roses
- 6. Why not plant a hedge!
- 7. Prune climbing or rambling roses, removing all old stems
- 8. Plant Tulip bulbs 15 20cm deep (6 8 inches in old money!)
- 9. Last real chance to mow the lawn.
- 10. Fork over and put a layer of organic matter on your borders

The pond will also need plenty of attention. Thin out overgrown oxygenating plants or for that matter any dense foliage. Keep the surface and bottom clear of dead leaves. Placing a net over the surface will help.

In the Vegetable garden

Personally I think there is more to do here than anywhere. The theme is "get ahead". Last of the harvest will bring you marrows, carrots and beetroot for storing, even the odd outdoor tomato if lucky. Once this is done - Start Digging! As the soil is heavy round here, leave it in clods for the winter to do the work. You can prepare some of the ground for planting out winter and hardy spring vegetables including cabbages. Now is the time to sow hardy peas and broad beans under cloches, divide large rhubarb crows, prune asparagus stems to the ground, plant hardy varieties of garlic and cut back Jerusalem artichokes ready to dig when you need them.

Better get going then... See you in November!

On 17th September Cambourne Parish Council hosted a public meeting to discuss the proposal by South Cambridgeshire District Council to site 10 traveller pitches in Cambourne as part of their plans for a total of 88 new plots across the district.

Over 100 residents turned out for the meeting and they were able to question a panel that included Andrew Lansley MP, CIIr Ray Manning, leader of South Cambridgeshire District Council, CIIr David Morgan, local councillor,

Andrew Lansley was quoted as saying that "I will be objecting to the plans for Cambourne for two reasons. Firstly, because no specific site has been named for the pitches, which means residents can't possibly have an opinion on them.

" And secondly because if the site were to fall into the envelope of the village, it could take up land that would otherwise be used for social housing."

CIIr Nick Wright district council planning portfolio holder who was in the audience, said: "The meeting was exceptionally good and we feel we've gained a lot from it and I hope the parish feel they have too by hearing all the views".

"It was difficult for us as district councillors as we weren't able to give opinions ourselves, as that would exclude us from making a decision, but it was much easier for the MP there.

I believe the meeting was a great success as it allowed residents the opportunity to question the panel and gain an insight into how the consultation process works. The councillors were left in no doubt that the audience believed that Cambourne would be an inappropriate site for their proposed development.

I would like to thank everyone who attended the meeting and I shall be passing all the questions that we did not have time to answer on to South Cambridgeshire District Council for them to reply to.

Remember that the public consultation over the plans to introduce the new pitches will continue until October 9. People can give their opinions by visiting the council's website at <u>www.scambs.gov.uk/ldf</u>. or by contacting our Parish Clerk John Vickery at The Hub.

The Pike Anglers of Cambourne cambourne.piking@hotmail.co.uk www.thepikers.net

Back in the late 80's, my only know-how of catching pike was to use live baits (something I do not use anymore, I might add!) These fish were easy for me catch at the time, as the River Lee was absolutely stuffed with fish. This was, to me, the only and most natural way to catch any pike that swam, or so I thought at the time. Many nice pike had graced my landing net in those early days, and even some big perch too! Sometime later I decided to try dead-baiting as I thought it would bring me a new outlook on my pike fishing. I hoped too that it would bring me a better quality of fish. Indeed it did, the bigger fish finally started to appear. Not long after catching my first twenty pound plus fish, I decided to venture away and try some new ways of catching pike at different venues. After seeing a number of decent pike being caught on lures by other anglers, I decided to give it a go. I joined a local region of the Lure Anglers Society. I thought this would surely open up a new world for me, learning to fish a completely new method and visiting other venues at the same time. I could not lose, could I? After going along to a handful of meetings in Waltham Abbey,and meeting new friends, days out were soon forthcoming.

The fishing was rather tough going then, only having a small selection of lures and not catching a thing, I was soon losing confidence. Looking back, my days as a lure angler were to be short lived. The club decided we were going to visit Aldenham Reservoir in Hertfordshire on a blistering hot day. As I was a young and fit lad, I was partnered with a very elderly gentleman. During one of our many conversations out on the water, he told me that he was recuperating from a heart attack, which meant yours truly had the pleasure – and obligation – of rowing all day. So, after rowing this old chap around the reservoir for the best part of 9 hours, catching nothing, and suffering from heat stroke, I ended up like Del Boy on his jet ski! My head was boiled and I was a vivid shade of red. Thus, my days with the Lure Anglers Society were numbered! I do not think I touched another lure after that for some years. Back to the dead baits I went. That was until I moved up to Cambridgeshire and started to fish the Fenland drains. Lure fishing now made sense and seemed the most natural way to fish these waters. Nowadays, the first thing I pick up is a lure rod and a bucket full of lures. Funny how things work out!

More recently we ventured back to the Norfolk Broads. As before, we headed to Wroxham to collect our vessel. The first couple of hours were very quiet as we headed up towards Horning. After a natter we decided to try our luck nearer to Coltishall, the other side of Wroxham. Before we reached Wroxham we stopped at an area which had produced fish on our previous visit. I did manage a hook up, but unfortunately a powerful surge from the pike took my line under the boat and around the anchor rope. Fish gone! A short time later I managed to get one. This pike weighed only around 4lb. But it was start. Moving on, we stopped along a short stretch between Wroxham and Coltishall, this area produced another three pike for us, all these fish were caught on old traditional copper spoons.

A trip to Broxbourne in Hertfordshire saw me at a venue with which many of you may be unfamiliar: Turnford Consortium, which consists of four lakes. The two larger lakes, the Lea and Railway contain some very big carp and some decent size pike too. The Marsh Pit holds some really nice catfish, and finally we have the Boot Pit. This pit is a mixed-species venue with one added bonus fish: A known Pike of 30lb plus is in residency, which means a few trips will have to be made in the coming, colder months. After having a few casts on 3 of the lakes, I finally came across a pike which was in the mood to comply. This came from a swim in the corner of the Railway pit, the lure I used was one of my favorite surface lures. The Pike that engulfed my lure was a typical fish that you would expect at this time of year, a very long and lean fish with very dark colourings. I soon had the fish safely in the net after a long and tough fight. It weighed 14lb 10ozs. Very nice!
