I asked a builder back in 1999 "where is the affordable housing?" to which he replied; "none of these houses are affordable!" His response stuck with me over the 11 years I have lived and raised a family here. Still living in the original plot of equity share housing I have watched with interest and involvement the growth of Cambourne.

I started the original summer festival here, recognising (as someone working for charities in health, disability & social care) that public events are important for growing communities. There are significantly more families on different incomes here now, but sadly, this is not often seen as a positive trend that meets the need expressed by that builder 11 years ago.

ANDREW LANSLEY MP HAILS 'EXCITING' SPORTS CENTRE PROJECT IN CAMBOURNE

South Cambridgeshire MP Andrew Lansley CBE has paved the way for building work to begin on Cambourne's brand new sports centre – and is looking ahead to the completion of the "exciting" and "highly valued" project. The Secretary of State for Healthled the official 'breaking ground' ceremony at the sports centre development site in Back Lane, Cambourne, turning the first sod of earth to mark the beginning of construction.

The new sports centre is being provided by MCA Developments Ltd, a development consortium comprising leading housebuilders Taylor Wimpey and Bovis Homes, as part of its commitment to creating public facilities for the community alongside 4,250 new homes in the new Cambridgeshire settlement.

The facility will include indoor sports courts, a gym and dance studio plus a host of other facilities for the public to enjoy, and is expected to be completed by December 2011.

Mr Lansley said: "I was very pleased to have 'broken ground' on this exciting project. Cambourne is a very young community, where sport, exercise and dance are all very popular with many teams and groups. I know people in Cambourne are keenly looking forward to this and it will be highly valued." Mr Lansley was joined for this morning's ceremony by a number of local dignitaries, including South Cambridgeshire District Council chairman Cllr Charles Nightingale, Cambourne Parish Council leader Cllr Clayton Hudson and other councillors, who were welcomed by MCA Developments Project Director Neville Stebbing.

Mr Stebbing said: "Over 3,000 families have moved to Cambourne in the last 11 years and this community has an enthusiasm for sport and physical exercise, with numerous clubs, teams and other activities thriving here.

"This new sports centre will add considerably to that tradition of sporting prowess and this, in turn, will enhance the health and general wellbeing of the local community. Taylor Wimpey and Bovis Homes would like to thank South Cambridgeshire District and Cambourne Parish councils for their invaluable help in getting us to this stage."

The new sports centre is being built on behalf of MCA Developments by respected Comberton-based construction firm RG Carter Cambridge Ltd, which began preliminary site-preparation work in November 2010 after being awarded the contract for the scheme. The two-storey facility will include a four-court sports hall for badminton, basketball, five-a-side football, indoor cricket, netball, gymnastics and martial arts. It will also comprise a fully equipped gym and dance studio, showers and changing facilities, plus a social area and juice bar, along with 144 car parking spaces and provision for up to 60 cycles outside.

The building will feature an environmentally friendly ventilation system with 'wind catchers' in the roof to expel stale air from inside and replace it with fresh air. The sports centre is being built next to Cambourne's existing bowling green, outdoor multiuse games area and skate park, creating a wider sports complex for the community. An area

use games area and skate park, creating a wider sports complex for the community. An area of land is being reserved at the development site to enable the facilities to be extended should this be deemed economically viable in the future.

ROVING REPORTER

Phyllis Armstrong (a Year 11 Comberton Village College student) interviews Caroline Aldridge, Senior Librarian at Cambourne library, to review, in the light of possible cuts, the Library's valuable role in Cambourne.

Because of budget pressures, Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) has been considering a range of ideas to make savings of £2.2m (from its annual budget of £6m) to transform the library service within Cambridgeshire. Libraries can be seen as easy targets for cost cutting, but small libraries cost relatively little to run; they bring people together and are an important part of community life. The library is a valuable resource here in Cambourne, particularly because it is a fairly new development, and forms part of the essential infrastructure for the community. It offers information leaflets about local groups, societies, library events and maps to new residents. According to Caroline Aldridge, Library Supervisor at Cambourne library, it is vital for all communities to have a library that meets its needs. The Library provides people with important local information, books, CDs and DVDs for recreational and educational purposes and a place to meet others. The CCC produced a 'Library Services Review Questionnaire' for the general public to give feedback, which elicited more than 5600 responses. The results (which were not available at the time of the interview) are online at: www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/leisure/libraries/news/libservicereview

The library offers multimedia items and reference and picture books for younger children. In a secure, child-friendly area with junior book displays, the library holds Rhyme Time and Story Time sessions with songs, stories, crafts, and rhymes for those under 5. For the same age group, it also offers the BookStart and BookCrawl scheme, which encourage children to get stuck into books – with the help of various incentives. It organises supplies of books for nurseries and pre-schools. Cambourne library participates in the national Reading Challenge, which is aimed at pre-school and primary school children. This year in Cambourne 215 children enrolled in the scheme, which helps encourage children to read more in the school holidays, gain confidence and as a result do better at school. Caroline Aldridge believes that: "...from the staff's point of view, it is a real pleasure sharing their reading experiences." Throughout the year there are regular primary school visits to familiarise young children with the library and a book club, Chatterbooks, for younger children.

For the students and young people in Cambourne, the library provides services such as one-hour daily free internet access; areas to revise; staff guidance; and access to subscription sites such as news and encyclopaedias for research. The library also has a reference section to help with schoolwork. There is a special "teen fiction" section with DVD films available for rental and a book group specifically for teenagers. Caroline Aldridge felt that this: "...helps them to share ideas and recommend books to each other." As part of the Duke of Edinburgh Award, students also have the opportunity to volunteer to assist in the library.

Cambridgeshire's larger libraries, including both St Ives and Huntingdon libraries incorporate Learning Centres where users can sign up for a variety of computer-based study packages including NVQs and those provided by Learndirect. Although there are no tutors for these courses at Cambourne Library students who have registered with Learndirect at one of the Learning centres can use the computers in their local library to continue their work online.

There are currently 9 book groups based in Cambourne who meet on a monthly basis – of which 3 meet in the library itself. For these groups, the Library orders books, gives advice on how to run sessions and on reading lists, provides forward notice of visits by authors and allows an 'extended loan period' on selected books. If someone wants to join these, the library will pass their details onto whichever book group has spaces. Caroline Aldridge emphasised: *"At Cambourne it is important for everyone to have equal access to library services."* Those who are visually impaired or have mobility issues can get free of charge items through the postal or doorstep service, for an extended loan period.

All library users can reserve and renew items online. A number of services are available as part of the Library online database, including newspapers, family history, company information, evening courses, details of clubs and organisations locally. In order to make Cambourne Library more accessible during the week from 9:00 am - 5:30 pm a 'Quick Pick' self-issue service with a selection of popular books CDs and DVDS operates. In addition, a coin-operated photocopier and internet access are available, together with health information.

Cambourne Library runs various events, such as talks by authors, computer courses, and art exhibitions. For the over 50's, the "Engage in the Afternoon" event with speakers talking on a variety of subjects is well attended; there are also regular free 'Computers for Beginners' courses. The Creative Writing Group and Art Drawing Class meet when the library is closed and other community groups are encouraged to meet there as well. Caroline Aldridge confirmed that the library *"hoped to include other groups that wish to use the library space"*. The Library is located in a "partnership building" with Cambourne Medical Centre, which means that it hosts a number of joint events including 'New Parents Group' and 'Baby Massage' sessions. Events are publicised in local community centres within the Cambourne area, other libraries and through the mailing list for book groups.

If you join the library you can use the computers free of charge for 1 hour per day as well as being able to borrow books, DVDs and CDs. When the library is closed you can still become a member, return your books in our drop box or ask a member of staff to issue books for you at the counter. You can also make photocopies and use the computers in the reception area. We also have a selection of DVDs available for hire. Did you know that as well as Greetings Cards you can buy stamps at the library?

Book Start gifts. You can collect your book start pack from the library any time, just bring along your red health visitors book. • <u>BOOK SIGNING:</u> Cambourne Library March 14th 4.30 – 6.30pm. I'm not privy to detailed information on these matters, but it appears to me that there is no village in the area with better amenities or more shops. I doubt that crime and anti-social behaviour are any more prevalent than in most places – certainly including Cambridge itself. It sometimes seems as if some of the original residents (and I was here almost from the beginning) thought they were moving to some sort of Beverly Hills in Cambridgeshire, populated by affluent people, with beautifully manicured gardens and parks, zero crime etc etc. Ten years on and guess what; there is the same mix of people, lifestyles and behaviour as almost everywhere else. It doesn't help, in terms of image and reputation, if we let people get away with unfairly characterising the village as some kind of "problem".

We also don't help ourselves if we over-react to every teething problem – we all knew that we were moving into a new community, which would obviously have its ups and downs whilst establishing itself. Certainly there have been mistakes – some of which cannot easily be undone. However, you only have to look through the Crier to see how much has already been achieved in terms of community activity, for example.

It's also encouraging to see an ongoing rise in economic activity – and whether you agree or disagree with the recent planning approval for more homes, there is no doubt that they will help to sustain, and perhaps even increase, the number of local shops and restaurants.

If we want Cambourne to be a success, I suggest we all do our bit to promote it. Speaking for my family, we greatly enjoy living here.

Creative Learning at Jeavons Wood

School boring? Never! At Jeavons Wood the children are having a fabulous time learning though creative topics that they have had input in choosing themselves. The Reception children started the year with a robot theme and, this week, decided to move on to a new, equally exciting topic - pirates! They've created pirate ships both inside and outside, have set sail using their telescopes to spot land and have even walked the plank. They've made treasure maps, searched for gold and used their counting skills to calculate how rich they've become. We've been very impressed with the pirate stories that the children have written and the messages that they have produced to send in bottles.

The Children in Year 1 and Year 2 chose 'castles' as the topic on which to base their work. Walk into any of the Y1/2 classrooms and you are met by knights,

dragons, princesses all busy learning. They've produced some wonderful writing based on the story of 'George and the Dragon', have used mixed media to create fabulous paintings of dragons and are now busy researching information about medieval Britain. If you walk into the Year 3 classroom, however, you will have a very different experience. Net curtains at the windows and a role-play area transformed into Granny's 'parlour' indicate that you are now in George's house (of 'George's Marvellous Medicine'). The children have invented their own magical medicines, produced recipes and written instructions on use - they've also made medicine bottles out of clay. School life was very different for Roal Dahl (the author of George's Marvellous Medicine') as a boy and the Y3 children are currently reading his semiautobiographical account of his experience and researching more about life in the 1950s.

Comberton Village College: A Note from the Principal

As usual at this time of year, performance data has been published for all secondary schools in the country. The perceived need to measure the performance of schools now seems accepted territory in a way that certainly was not the case not so very long ago.

The standard data that has been produced for a number of years coonfirmed the particularly strong performance by Comberton Village College students in summer 2010. We knew that it had been a record year on all the main GCSE and equivalent measures. The pleasing thing about the recent data was that it clearly confirmed the excellent progress made by students during their time at the school from the age of 11. The so-called 'contextualised value added' measure seeks to measure the progress students make during their compulsory secondary years, allowing for the context of students. For the second consecutive year, this figure was around the top 5% nationally for Comberton Village College students. This measure really is a significant measure. Surely, it is right to measure most the progress of students more than absolute achievement. This is obvious when seeing a figure of 100% of pupils at a grammar school getting at least 5 A*-C grades. What else would anyone expect? Anything less would be a disgrace. Indeed, such selected students should, of course, be looking for the top grades. It is interesting that a higher percentage of Comberton students, from an all-ability cohort, got A* and A grades than was the case in a good number of grammar schools: a remarkable statistic.

This year, the decision by the Secretary of State to introduce a retrospective measure of the new so-called 'English Baccalaureate' created much interest and controversy. This is a measure that requires at least 'C' grade achievement at GCSE in all of Maths, English, Double Science, a Foreign Language and a Humanity (defined simply as History or Geography). Comberton's figure for this was one of the highest for state schools in the country. Some figures were incredibly low (often reflecting the collapse of GCSE foreign languages in some schools). However, we did not force all students to do a full foreign language at GCSE and either History or Geography. Thus the difference between our headline GCSE figure and the 'English Baccalaureate' was fundamentally down to curriculum choice by students (achievement in both foreign languages and humanities is extremely high). Quite what this was thus actually measuring in our schools was an interesting question.

Of course, there is another point. I think that we all want our young people to be truly educated. I am pretty sure that we all think that there is rather a lot more to this than certain statistics of exam performance. We state that we want all Comberton pupils to become 'Caring, Capable and Confident'. That is full and rounded education. It is, at best, only very partially measured by the annual performance data that is published.

There have, of course, always been 'Lies, Damned Lies and Statistics'. That seems as true today ever.

Ps 11:3 If the foundations be destroyed, what can the righteous do?

In our adult Bible study time at 10 am we have just started a series from a group called Answers in Genesis. It is a video lecture dealing with creation. But why is this important? Many churches these days disregard the Biblical account of creation, or they attempt to intermingle modern theories with Biblical truth. This is not good. Now the sweet sounding lies will say oh well the story of a literal six 24 hour days of creation is just a myth and Adam and Eve were merely characters or symbolic representations of mankind. Now this may sound quite refined, certainly non confrontational from the world's point of view, however this leads to some problems. You see Genesis is foundational to all of the major doctrines in Christianity. In actuality without the book of Genesis Christianity itself serves no eternal purposes. So what do I mean by that? A Christian is a follower of Christ. One that believes that Christ being the Son of God came to earth and lived a sinless life. That Christ as the lamb of God shed his own blood upon the cross of Calvary to pay the price for our sin. Then those who have accepted and received Christ as their savior having their sin cleansed by Christ receive eternal life, not because of their own good deeds, but through faith in the redemption that Christ has provided. Now here is the problem, if Adam and Eve were not real then there would be no initial sin. And if there is no sin there is no need for a redeemer from sin. Furthermore if we say we believe in Jesus that he was the Son of God yet we do not believe in Genesis we are in fact calling Jesus a liar or stupid because he believed in a literal creation. Mt 19:4 And he answered

and said unto them, Have ye not read, that he which made them at the beginning made them male and female, In the very next verse, Jesus quotes directly from Genesis 2:24 when He said, "For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and cleave to his wife; and they twain shall be one flesh."

He believed in Abel (a son of Adam and Eve who was also the first murder victim)

Lu 11:51 From the blood of Abel unto the blood of Zacharias, which perished between the altar and the temple: verily I say unto you, It shall be required of this generation. Jesus also references in places concerning the flood, all in the first few chapters of Genesis

And in either scenario, lying or being ignorant of the truth would disqualify him from being God the Son. Which would mean he was just a man and incapable of the redemption of mankind. If you take away the fall of mankind through sin and the redeemer there is no foundation for faith, nor in fact a requirement for faith. And that is exactly what Satan would wish. I would encourage you that call your selves believers in Christ not to abandon your foundation. Perhaps you've been away from solid Biblical preaching for some time. Maybe you've allowed the lies told by people that do not even truly believe Jesus to permeate your thoughts and values. How can we follow the Lord if we do not even believe what he has said? If you say that you believe in Christ then find a place where they actually teach belief in Christ, not just historical data that he existed, but having faith in what Christ had faith in and believing what Jesus believed. We have also improved our ability to offer the doctor or nurse practitioner of your choice because fewer people are seeking appointments for minor coughs and colds, earache and sore throats. Cambourne residents have responded well to the latest information that antibiotic treatment does not help self-limiting viral illnesses. Excess antibiotic prescribing puts us all at risk from resistant germs – we can protect our families by saving antibiotics for when they are really needed.

We will do our best to accommodate any request to see a particular doctor or nurse practitioner and we understand the importance of continuity of care. If we cannot offer you the person of your choice on the day you call we will make sure that whoever sees you communicates appropriately with your usual doctor or nurse. We have a skilled and experienced team which meets regularly for updates and education and case discussion.



Cambourne Kitchen Apple, marzipan & mincemeat crumble

The filling:	The crumble:
5 dessert apples (approx 500g) cored and cubed.	2 cups (approx 250-300g)plain flour.
1 Bramley apple cored and grated or finely	1 cup (approx 125-150g) ground almonds.
chopped.	125g butter (slightly soft).
2 tbsp lemon juice.	1/2 cup (approx 75g) caster sugar.
1 tbsp caster sugar.	11/2 tsp ground nutmeg.
400g mincemeat.	1/2 tsp fine salt.
150-200g marzipan.	50g flaked almonds.

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180°C. Using a fairly deep oven-proof dish approx 9" round place all the apple on the bottom and mix with the lemon juice and sugar. Break the marzipan into smallish nuggets and place randomly on top of the apple and then smooth over the mincemeat.

Put the flour and ground almonds into a separate bowl and cut the butter into small pieces into the flour. Gently rub the flour, almonds and butter together and allow the flour to sift through your hands as you rub with your thumb and fingers until all the butter has been blended with the flour and the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.

Add the remainder of the ingredients except the flaked almonds and mix with a fork. Pour the crumble topping lightly over the filling and then scatter with the flaked almonds.

Put the crumble in the oven for about 35-40 mins until golden brown and the crumble has cooked through. Serve with cream, ice cream or custard (or if you're still wanting a little extra indulgence, all three!!!!)

This is great for using up leftover mincemeat, marzipan etc but you could leave out the marzipan if you don't like it. If you're gluten-free and/or dairy-free you could use all ground almonds for the crumble or mix with rice flour and dairy-free spread. You could also try adding cloves and cinnamon to the crumble for extra wintry spice.

Papworth Astronomy Club News

On the 12th January, we held an open meeting in conjunction with the BBC's Stargazing LIVE series, which was shown on BBC2 the previous week. We welcomed several visitors who found us on the BBC's Web site and also a group of young astronomers from Papworth primary school. Unfortunately, the weather prevented us from doing any stargazing but we did hear an interesting talk by Professor Alan Aylward of University College London. He discussed the possibility of interstellar travel and concluded it is not feasible with current technologies. However, both NASA and ESA have Web sites where you can submit your own ideas and proposals! He also gave us an update on his research into exoplanets, of which more than 700 have now been discovered. Several of the recent discoveries show signs of earth-like atmospheres, so the possibility of humans surviving on other planets is no longer as far-fetched as it once may have seemed.

Our next meeting will be held on Wednesday February 2nd. Mike Nichols, one of our club members, will give a talk called "Astro Navigation in Aviation". Mike learnt to navigate by the stars when he was in the RAF (before GPS was invented!) and he will describe some of the techniques he used. Due to refurbishment of our usual meeting room, it will be in the function room of the Conservatory, Chequers Lane, Papworth Everard, at 7:30PM. Entering Papworth Everard village from the south (Cambourne), take the first right after the shops and library into Chequers Lane. The Conservatory is on the left, immediately after the tennis courts. From the north, take the first left after the sports field into Chequers Lane.

Wildlife Review February 2011

Thank you for all the reports of Waxwings in Cambourne over Christmas. I have yet to spot them myself, so I am quite jealous. I would love to see any photos you may have taken of any winter wildlife in Cambourne.



During February, wildlife will really be gearing up for spring. I have already heard lots of birds singing in

the woodlands around Cambourne including song thrush, blue and great tits and robins. I am going to try to keep a diary of all the wildlife I see (or hear) around Cambourne and other sites I visit throughout the year. Hopefully I will be able to look back and see patterns in when things have occurred and compare it with future years. We'll have to see how often I remember to write things down, but why don't you have a go too? You don't have to know the names of everything, just record the sights and sounds that you hear as you walk to school or work.

Dates for your diary this year include:

International Dawn Chorus Day – Sunday 1st May – we will be arranging a walk to celebrate again this year, more details to follow Cambourne Plant Sale – Sunday 22nd May - a wide range of plants that will attract wildlife to your garden, with experts on hand to help you chose the right ones, as well as BBQ charcoal, tea and cakes and free parking

Garden Watch is back again this summer, exact dates are still to be confirmed but you can register your interest at http://www.wildlifebcnp.org/gardenwatch.htm where you will also find lots of information about garden wildlife, spotters guides and activities.

Attention Budding Naturalists.....

Unfortunately in life everybody has to experience some sad losses along the way, and at this time it is my turn. So, fishing has taken a back seat for the time being. After having had such a lengthy layoff from pike fishing, and fishing in general, my wife had arranged, unknown to me, a special day's

fishing. This was arranged between herself and T.V favourite and great Pike angler Mick Brown, for a milestone birthday surprise. On the morning, I met up with Mick at 8'oclock, where his boat was moored. We were soon afloat and on the Great River Ouse trolling some Fox diving lures.
