

"...Is Cambourne at risk of a Measles Outbreak*? *92% of children need to be immunised in a population to guard against an epidemic of measles.

Dr Peter Bailey, General Practitioner at Monkfield Medical Practice, has written to the Crier to express his concern. The headlines above are his opening words. A complete transcript of his letter to us is our front cover feature this month.

"Cambourne is famous for its high birth rate. Cambourne attracts young and growing families. As parents we all have to make decisions about immunising our children. Andrew Wakefield's autism scare frightened us all for a while, but most of us now know that the research on which it was based was flawed.

But it turns out this was not just poor scientific method. Something much more sinister had been going on.

Recently, the British Medical Journal published articles by investigative reporter Brian Deer about the MMR story.

What I read shocked me and made me angry. I learned that the supposed association between MMR and autism had been faked for personal gain. As a result, parents have suffered agonies of worry, children have been damaged by the diseases that MMR could prevent and populations continue to live at risk of outbreaks of potentially fatal illnesses - all because of greed and fraud.

No link between the vaccine and MMR has been shown in any of the many subsequent studies. Autism incidence in Japan continued to rise after MMR was withdrawn completely because of the scare. Children have died as a result of the deceit.

Here are some of the revelations from Brian Deer's articles:

- Wakefield was being paid by Richard Barr, a Norfolk solicitor, to find evidence to prove a connection between the vaccine and injury in order to aid lawsuits against vaccine manufacturers. He hoped to define a "brain-bowel" syndrome as its centrepiece. Barr paid Wakefield a total of £435,643 plus expenses.
- In February 1998 Wakefield and his co-workers published a paper in the Lancet about 12 cases laying

the foundation of the vaccine scare. No case was free of misreporting or alteration. Patients were recruited through anti-MMR campaigners, and the study was commissioned and funded for planned litigation. At a press conference about the paper Wakefield urged the use of single vaccines instead of MMR.

- Days after the press conference Wakefield met business partners to discuss a joint company to develop a replacement for MMR. Wakefield had filed for a patent for a single vaccine from which he hoped to profit.
- Wakefield formed a company which would offer diagnostic tests for his invented syndrome which he now called autistic enterocolitis. His "private and confidential" prospectus for his company aimed at raising £700,000 from investors and forecast extraordinary revenues saying: "It is estimated that by year 3, income from this testing could be about £3 300 000 rising to about £28,000,000 as diagnostic testing in support of therapeutic regimes come on stream."
- In January 2010, the UK's General Medical Council found two of the Lancet paper authors guilty of a raft of charges. Wakefield was judged by a five member panel to be guilty of some 30 charges, including four counts of dishonesty and 12 of causing children to be subjected to invasive procedures that were clinically unjustified.
- In February 2010 the Lancet retracted the 1998 paper describing it as "utterly false".
- In May 2010 Wakefield was struck off the medical register.

Nearly all parents in Cambourne have decided to immunise their children. Are your children protected?

Blue Bin and Paper Only Caddy

Since the introduction of the blue bin and paper only caddy we have seen the amount of recycling increase. The level of battery recycling has been very impressive with the equivalent of 400,000 AA batteries being recycled in the first three months. We hope that this fantastic start can be maintained and that you find the following information useful.

Paper only caddy

Paper is a very valuable material when collected separately from other materials through the paper only caddy, and it generates an income for the council. However, if paper is mixed in the blue bin with other materials, it needs to be sorted and is classed as lower quality which means we can't get the same income from it and it costs the council money. **Yes please...**

Top tips for recycling

- •To help you recycle more in your blue bin please squash plastic bottles and flatten cardboard boxes.
- •If you are having difficulty in fitting all of your recycling into the blue bin, please place excess recycling in a returnable container or cardboard box (which will be recycled along with its contents).
- •If your caddy has gone missing you can contact us on the details below for a replacement.
- •To avoid any potential shredded paper being spilt during collection, please place shredded paper in an old envelope to prevent littering and remember that you only need to shred documents displaying personal or confidential information.

•If your battery bag is not replaced after collection please contact us for a replacement or alternatively use a plastic bag and tie it to the handle of your blue bin.

I am a local resident and supporter of the Stirling Aircraft Project. This organisation is a registered charity that seeks to commemorate the aircraft and its crew. I believe the attached letter from the Stirling project to the Parish Council may be of public interest.

"..Dear Sir/Madam,

I am the Secretary of The Stirling Aircraft Project which is a registered Charity that is re-constructing a cockpit and commemorates those that operated and flew this oft forgotten aircraft. It has recently been brought to the attention of our Chairman that one of the new housing estates in the Cambourne settlement has had the roads named after famous aircraft presumably to commemorate the new town's links with the adjacent former RAF Bourn. The Short Stirling was the first of the RAF's 4 engined bomber aircraft and operated from RAF Bourn with XV Squadron RAF.

I feel however that I have to point out that there has been an unfortunate error in naming one of the main access roads as "Sterling Way" when in fact it should of course be named "Stirling Way".

Whilst we appreciate that road signs will require replacement and that the Royal Mail will have to be informed, it is important that the road names are historically correct otherwise their true meaning will be lost in time. Therefore can we respectfully request that this road be officially changed to "Stirling Way" in tribute to the aircraft and men that flew from RAF Bourn.



Medieval Life at Jeavons Wood!

The Year One and Two Children at Jeavons Wood recently travelled back to Medieval Britain. They were immersed in this period of history and learnt about the parts of a castle, how to attack/defend it and how to become a knight. Our role play areas, both inside and outside, were transformed into castles complete with moats, drawbridges and ramparts and the children were lucky to have some lovely dressing up clothes which inspired them to create their own plays and stories about knights,

dragons and princesses.

Learning about castles also helped us with our Science work investigating forces; we started by looking at pushes and pulls that we would find in a castle, and also the pushes and pulls we find around school. Next, we looked at the different types of equipment that knights would use in a castle and what forces they used; the children loved making their own catapults, finding out which materials and objects were the best to use.

In art the children made shields, colour-mixed paint for their dragons and worked brilliantly in groups to produce textiles to show the story of St. George and the Dragon and the Sword in the Stone. This stemmed from research they carried out on the Battle of Hastings and the Bayeux tapestry. In fact the children read lots of information books and learnt about how they were set out with features such as a glossaries, indexes and contents pages. They also did a lot of research, using these information books and the internet to find out facts, and wrote up their research as non-chronological reports. As a product of all their learning, the children made class information books are now in the school library for others to read.





One of the highlights of our learning about this period in history was participating in a magnificent feast, making and eating food from

Medieval times which included, pottage (a vegetable stew), homemade bread and ginger snapdragons. The children learnt about the roles of different people who lived and worked in the castle and made some beautiful decorations to transform our school hall into 'The Great Hall' of a castle. It looked amazing! We had wonderful entertainment in the form of jesters, medieval dancing (which the children learnt in PE) and even a bit of 'jousting'.

Pastoral Thoughts

Matthew 28:5 And the angel answered and said unto the women, Fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified.

6 He is not here: for he is risen, as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay.

This month Christians celebrate the resurrection of Christ. Now some people have said that modern society has no place for Christianity. People in this country have been denied the right to adopt because of the standpoint they take concerning morality as Christians. Persecutions are increasing, but believers still continue. Now what has this got to do with you? Is this celebration of remembrance of the resurrection significant to you?

Well that depends if the resurrection was real or false. Did Christ rise from the grave? People have debated over this for 2,000 years. And there is a wide range of opinion. From those who deny the existence of Jesus altogether. Even though he was written about in chronicles of external historians during that time, as well as several key figures involved. There are also those who say a man did live and was executed under Roman authority, but no resurrection. However, many of the disciples died even after torture unwilling to deny that they had seen Christ resurrected. This is extremely significant as men may be willing to die for a lie they believe to be true. However, if they knew it to be a lie they would not have suffered willingly for it. And it was consistent with the disciples as all, but one according to my knowledge died a martyr for their faith. Even him they tried to kill a few times. Some think that Jesus is still in the grave. Although this is odd because as soon as the disciples said "He is risen", the chief priests could say no he is not, and showed the people the body.

There are those who say the disciples stole the body from the tomb. This in fact would need greater faith than the resurrection as 1. The tomb was guarded by a Roman watch usually 16 men on rotating shifts so no one gets too tired. 2. They would not fall asleep as the penalty for that was death. You don't get a much better motivator for staying awake than if you fall asleep we will kill you. 3. Even if all the soldiers were asleep it would be impossible to roll back a two ton rock from a tomb without waking anyone. These were fishermen not ninjas. 4. The disciples at this point were scared and either hiding or leaving town. And quite frankly the disciples at this point had the combined bravery of a nervous gerbil. Remember it was the women who first came to the tomb not the men. 5. If the Romans had believed the disciples had truly stolen the body which involved breaking a Roman seal they would have been immediately rounded up and executed. But, there are those of us who believe that he arose just as the Bible records. As attested to by the disciples who died affirming it as well as over 500 people at one time seeing Him. This is significant to you for if indeed He was raised as is recorded then that is evidence that Jesus is who He said He was, the Son of God. If that is true then what he said is true about man being sinful and needing a Saviour. And if that is true you need to ask yourself have I repented of my sin and received the forgiveness through Christ? If the answer is no then maybe you had better get that taken care of soon.

Wildlife Review April 2011

While out in the Eco Park on a warm day recently, I was waking past the ponds and noticed lots of movement. On closer inspection I saw there were lots of frogs mating in the pond and there was already a good amount of frog spawn. The toads and newts will also have been busy laying eggs, though theirs is not as conspicuous at frogspawn. Toads lay their eggs in long strings wrapped around plants, while newts carefully fold a leaf around each individual egg with their back legs.

Queen bumble bees are also emerging at the moment and searching for nectar sources to start their colonies. That is why it is vital to have early flowering plants and many gardens are excellent at providing this vital source of energy. Please let us know if you see any bumble bees in your gardens over the next couple of months and send us a photo if possible so we can identify which species we have in Cambourne.



On the bird sightings front, Bob Webster sent me this photograph of a sparrowhawk that came into his garden in Great Cambourne. They like to hunt the small birds that are attracted to our garden bird feeders.

Many spring flowers are making a cheerful sight in the woods and hedges around Cambourne. The blackthorn is blossoming along Crow Dene bridleway and, towards the end of the April, bluebells and cowslips will be flowering in Monkfield Wood. The Wildlife Trust has a series of events happening in its woodlands to celebrate bluebell time. The closest to Cambourne is at Waresley and Gransden Woods on Sunday 1st May. 

With the Easter season upon us it's easy to get overwhelmed by chocolate, hot cross buns and all manner of sweet treats. This recipe is really delicious, it's savoury and it's fun. Watch people get confused when you hand them round because they'll more than likely think that they're going to be sweet. (I actually made these over Christmas together with some small cakes which I made to look like triangular sandwiches – I got enormous pleasure as guests became rather bemused by the 'swap'

Method:

Prepare a muffin tray by lightly greasing (alternatively you could place muffin cases in each slot – this will enhance the end result if you're aiming for a 'sweet' look). (I prepared mini muffins but there's no reason why you couldn't make large ones.) Preheat your oven to 180°C.

In a large mixing bowl, blend together the butter and oil (it will appear to curdle at first but keep beating and it will become smooth) and then add the 2 eggs and beat thoroughly. Stir in the courgettes, cheese and seasonings (zest, sugar etc). In a separate bowl mix together the 2 flours and baking powder using a whisk (this will sift the flour and just incorporate a little air) and then use a large metal spoon to fold the flour into the wet mixture.

When you have done this generously spoon the mixture into the muffin moulds (at least ¾ full). Pop them into the oven for about 10-15 mins (if cooking large ones this will vary, estimate 20-25 mins and then check). Just as with any cake pierce the muffins through the middle with a knife or skewer and it should come out clean.

Ingredients:

125g butter, 1/3 cup vegetable oil

1tsp salt, 1tsp sugar

- 30g grana padano cheese (or parmesan), 100g grated cheddar
- 1 cup wholemeal flour, 1 cup self raising flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 2 courgettes grated
- 3-4 tsp ground black pepper

2 eggs

Zest of 1 lemon

Cream cheese topping (optional): 300g cream cheese, 1 tsp salt , 2 tsp ground black pepper, 2tsp paprika

If adding the topping, once the muffins have cooled, whip the cream cheese and seasonings and then either pipe it or use a knife to smooth it over each muffin. Dust with a little extra paprika and if you think extra decoration is needed, add a little red edible glitter – it all adds to the finished result.

After what seemed to be a long-awaited trip back to the River to get my fish back as soon as possible. Unless, of course, it is of Ouse, I decided to stop off en route at a little local pit. This is a pit I have not fished before, so I had no idea of what to expect. I chose my swim and began to plumb the depth, and on only my second cast a swirl erupted around my float. This was definitely caused by a pike, as I have encountered these similar situations before.

I knew that if I were to introduce a bait almost instantly, there would be a great chance that it would be taken straight away. My Sardine had only been submerged for a couple of minutes, and nothing had happened, so I gave my float-fished bait a little twitch, and then it was taken.

A short and rather half-baked tussle followed on the fish's part before a nice colourful camouflaged Pike of about 10lb slipped into my awaiting landing net.

After an hour or so, I decided to move on to the River Ouse. On arrival, I found the river to be carrying a significant amount of extra water, this was due to the recent and persistent rainfall we had, and this also made the river very coloured. The first couple of hours were going rather slow, so I thought it was high time for a sausage sarnie. While my bangers were sizzling away on the stove, I looked up and saw my float-fished half herring had finally been taken. It then began slowly moving off downstream. After a firm strike, the fish was on and clearly up for a spirited fight, especially as it now had the added help of the extra flow. After a few arm-aching minutes, the pike was safely in the net, and it was another nice fish of around 9lb.

Another 4 hours had now passed before I had any further action, like before, a half Herring bait had fooled this Pike. This fish weighed around 10lb, I say around, as most of the fish I catch I would rather estimate than weigh, as it takes less time, and I like

specimen size...

After enjoying a couple of days at home with my wife, I thought it was time to get back down the river. On my arrival, I discovered that the condition of the river had somewhat deteriorated since my last visit. The weather too was not much better; it was raining with a cold north-westerly wind.

My first chosen swim was an off-shoot from the main river. I found some slack water to fish but after an hour and a half, there was no action forthcoming so I decided it was time to move on. I did not have far to move to my next swim. There was a point where the main river merged with a back water, which lead to a marina. The water from my left, and right, was pumping past me at a high rate of knots. So, between the two, it had left a slack area. This spot, I decided, was where my baits were to be positioned. It was only a matter of minutes, before my floatfished Herring was taken by a small fish of around 3lb. But, it just goes to show, that even in the worst conditions, you can still catch fish. Anyway, a little while later, I decided to go and try one of my more productive swims. This was only a short drive away, but when I arrived, I found my swim to be totally unfishable. On that note, therefore, I decided to call it a day. Indeed I had not been feeling too well that morning, so the best place for me was to be was back home, by the fire!

The Running Man

When you start to push your body and increase the amount of running that you do it is easy to over exert, perhaps in a race pushing for a good time or just during training, and cause an injury. If this happens it is wise to rest the injured area and use the RICE method of Rest, Ice, Compression, and Elevation. Gentle massage can help too encouraging the blood to reach the injured area and speed recovery, then return to running with short easy runs

However, prevention of injury is always better than cure. To this end always allow time before your run to warm up, a gentle jog for a kilometre or so will do this. Follow this with a dynamic stretching and mobilisation routine (a quick search on the internet will give many ideas for this). Sports physiologists have found that dynamic stretching prepares the muscles for exercise much better than a static stretch routine. But there is a place for the static stretch routine (again see the internet) at the end of a workout.

The best time to carry out static stretches is following a cool down jog that will decrease body temperature and remove waste products from the working muscles. These stretches will help muscles to relax, realign muscle fibres and re-establish their normal range of movement.
