New fire station nearing completion

Over the past eight months, construction of the new Cambourne Community Fire Station has taken place and we are pleased to announce that the station will be open sometime in June, with our own staff moving in later this month.

The station will primarily be used as a base for the Cambridge City and South Cambs district teams at Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service (CFRS), made up of administration staff for the districts and officers specialising in preventing fires in the community and working with businesses to protect their staff and visitors from fire. Eventually, the station will be able to be used as a community facility with meeting space for local residents and groups.

The Service is committed to reducing the number of fires suffered by residents and thanks to the work of community safety teams and firefighters, the number of fires in Cambridgeshire has dropped by 38 per cent in the last six years. The community safety teams work with all residents, but particularly those at greater risk of a fire such as vulnerable elderly residents.

Our fire protection teams work with businesses – such as shops, pubs, factories, restaurants and hotels - and other non-domestic premises owners in the South Cambs area to ensure they have adequate measures in place, not only to prevent a fire from occurring, but also to ensure that those inside of the building can get out quickly and safely.

Cambourne Community Fire Station has been strategically positioned as the Service has identified Cambourne as a growing community and one that will pose an increasing risk, and therefore will require its own operational fire station and fire engine in the future.

CFRS was able to build the fire station now thanks to a Section 106 agreement between Cambridgeshire County Council and MCA Developments in 1994. As part of the agreement, the fire service was given the site free of charge and also received a total of £588,000 towards the building costs of the new fire station. The total cost of the build is envisaged to be £1.05million, which means the Service has been able to provide a new fire station – the first to be built in Cambridgeshire since the 1980s – for under £500,000.

I am writing regarding the recent price increase by Stagecoach. The residents of our little town have known about this for some time, and only the most severe form of myopia can excuse the apathy shown to two articles in the Cambridge News Cambourne Edition, discussions on the Cambourne forum, mentions on the cam.misc internet group, a front-page article in the Crier (which must have been seen as it goes to everyone), debates in the Hub and notices placed in the bus stops around the town.

I am of course writing about the "boycott" of the Citi 4. By my estimation is has shown just how unified we are in our anger. On the bus that I get (the 7.05 and 7.25 buses in the morning), it has only resulted in a handful of people deserting the avaricious people carriers.

You cannot help but draw a few conclusions from the fellow passengers. Upon reaching our final destination, it is interesting to note that the majority of people do not immediately head for other bus stops, but, like me, walk to our destinations in the town; we all tend to follow the same route and you eventually recognise the faces of fellow bus travellers.

Since these people do not have to rely on other Stagecoach buses, why then do not they not seek cheaper transport, on a Whippet bus for instance? The timings of arrival may not be the same, but the final destinations are only a short distance apart. There is no reason why we should be reliant on Stagecoach unless, for instance, you had to use them to continue your journey, like I had to do to get to Milton for a few months last year.

I have decided that I will no longer play Stagecoach's disgusting game. This week, I used the alternate means of transport and was pleasantly surprised by it. Yes, I had to walk further but I saved £2 per day. If Stagecoach were to increase the price of their tickets by a pound or two - as I suspect they will in a year or two - Cambourne residents will metaphorically sigh and reach into their purses and wallets rather than do what Andy Campbell suggested - "vote with [our] feet".

It has shown quite ably that, when it comes to uniting to fight a great injustice, the Roaring Lions of Cambourne are little more than pusillanimous pussy cats.

Dear Editor,

You published an anonymous letter responding to my recent article in the Crier on the subject of Dr Andrew Wakefield's scandalous behaviour, stirring up fear over Measles Mumps and Rubella vaccine (MMR) for personal gain.

The author, hiding behind "name and address supplied" accused me of the same crime, suggesting that I had written the piece in order to profit personally from an increase in uptake of MMR vaccine in Cambourne. Had the author bothered to check with me, I could have explained that Monkfield Medical Practice has a block contract for MMR vaccine administration and I am paid the same whether I immunise 0% of children or 100% of children.

The current uptake in Cambourne is 94% for the first MMR, supporting my assertion that "nearly all" have been immunised, but only 83% for the second MMR immunisation (due by the age of 5), which is why I am worried about an outbreak. Uptake levels above 92% are needed to prevent outbreaks through so-called "herd immunity". France is currently experiencing a resurgence of measles cases with over 4000 notifications so far this year.

I wrote the article to help parents who bring their worries to me over the safety of MMR. I would like to see 100% of children protected. I urge vaccination with MMR because I believe it is right, and because I have a professional duty of care for my patients. The Health Protection Agency* is also is urging parents to protect their children against measles by ensuring they have been immunised with two doses of MMR. This is particularly important given the increase in cases in children and young adults over the last month.

I have nothing personal to gain from improved uptake of MMR and I deeply resent the slur. I would appreciate an apology. I am not anonymous – the author can write to me at the practice.

Comberton Village College: A Note from the Principal

After a long period of time, we will all be very pleased when the current building work at the college is finished. The final handover is now imminent and the official opening ceremony is due to take place on 14 June. Lord Hill, Education Minister, will open the facility. David Bell, Permanent Secretary at the Department for Education, is set also to be in attendance. We hope that many others will also be there to celebrate the opening of this major new facility in the area.

We are pleased to be able to report that, once the contractors have left the site, we have confirmed that there will be a minimum of 55 additional car parking spaces compared to the position before the work had started. There is some scope to get further cars in addition to that onto the site also. This is more than the number of extra staff who will work at the school.

The new gymnasium is already completed and is handed over to the school. There will also be a new school library located amongst the new facilities and a major new front entrance that we hope all visitors will appreciate. Then there will be all the fine new Sixth Form facilities, both general (Lecture Theatre, private study space, common room and cafeteria) and dedicated teaching spaces. This will allow our first ever cohort of Sixth Form students to start with us this coming September. We have been funded for the maximum number possible for us in the first year, namely 185 students. We are pleased to be able to confirm that we expect to have approximately that many students with us when we start in September. About 100 of these are current pupils at Comberton Village College. The remaining students will come from other schools, many local and others further afield.

Looking further ahead, we are in much discussion with the county and a design team about the development of a secondary school at Cambourne. The plan is to look to secure facilities that could open in September 2013 in order to cater for the further increase in numbers of children aged 11 that will be in the designated catchment area of Comberton Village College by that date. The new school, run in very tight association with Comberton Village, would allow all pupils in the catchment area to be educated at a local secondary school into the future. This is obviously what we all want to happen and can be the case if we are able to see through this development.

Swimming Courses at Comberton

FORMER Olympic swimmer Christine Jarvis-Ilman is coming to Comberton.

Ultimate Aquatics, which she runs, is offering improvers' courses in the village college pool during the summer holidays.

There are two weeks of courses, from Monday July 25-Friday July 29 and from Monday August 22-Friday August 26. There will be two sessions, starting at 10.00am and 11.00am each week.

The courses are for swimmers aged 7-15 who can swim at least 10m on their back and front. The aim is to improve technique in all strokes, water confidence and water safety - and to have fun in the water. Each week-long course costs £30.

Safe Driving: A skill for life

About 300 people are killed or maimed by drink drivers in the UK EVERY WEEK. About a quarter of young drivers killed are over the limit. 1 in 6 dead drivers have been found to have illegal drugs in their system.

It is impossible to accurately calculate how much alcohol is in your system or whether you are over the drink drive limit. After just one drink your reaction times will slow and your judgement will be impaired, you will become over confident and make bad decisions. To calculate how many units you have consumed you will need two pieces of information:

1. What strength is the alcohol. 2. How much alcohol is in the glass.

The calculation is % ABV (strength of alcohol) X Volume (quantity of alcohol in ml) divided by 1000. For example; 25ml glass of spirit at 40% is calculated40 X 25 = 1000 divided by 1000 = 1 unit (an easy one to start with) 1 pint beer (568ml) at 5.2% (Stella) calculated....5.2 X 568 = 2953.6 divided by 1000 = 2.95 units 250ml red wine at 14% calculated.... 14 X 250 = 3500 divided by 1000 = 3.5 units

It's easy to say "Oh I'll just have one glass". That one glass of wine for an average lady could give you a breath reading of 38.5mg, that is over the legal drink drive limit. More than half a million breath tests are carried out each year, please don't become a statistic. If you would like more information go to www.2young2die.org.uk or www.brake.org.uk

If you are planning a night out think about who will drive, but go one step further than that, do you need to drive tomorrow? "So let's stay in tonight and have a drink, the kids have gone into town we're all alone for a change". A nice bottle of wine, a good film, all nice and relaxed after a busy week. At midnight the phone rings: it's your 18 year old daughter, lost her purse, missed the last bus - "Can you come and get me Dad?" - It really is that easy to fall into a drink drive trap.

At the end of the day it is your decision, but how would you feel if you were one of those that killed or maimed someone just because you had been drinking before driving? Being convicted of a drinking and driving offence really is a life changing experience even if you don't kill or injure someone. If you are charged with drinking excess alcohol and then driving you go to court. If found guilty you will have a criminal record, you will be banned from driving for at least one year and in certain circumstance for up to five years. A fine or community sentence will be imposed or in the worst cases you may go to prison for up to six months.

IF YOU ARE GOING TO DRINK, DON'T DRIVE. That is the only sure way to avoid joining the statistics. Please drive safely.

In my ministry I have had many people come to me with relationship problems. Most often the difficulty is with the men. That is not to say a few women folk have not caused some problems, simply in my experience it is mostly the guys. A massive problem is that so many people start relationships with little or no training or information. Now women sometimes have magazines that speak about relationship difficulties. However, I have not come across any for men. And even those for women often have a worldly self-centered approach. So men remain uninformed and give it no thought. Often unaware how badly they are treating their partners as they do not even realize that the same words said to a man may be interpreted differently when saying them to a woman. We should all take time to learn of the other person's background and traditions so that we can dwell with them according to knowledge. Understand if they were raised in a one or two parent home and how that affects their thinking. Guys we need to do some things to make our relationships better.

First, be a husband. Now I know marriage is not extremely popular, but it is right, if indeed you want to spend the rest of your lives together then formalize it. It is important for doing things right and also for legal reasons. Do you realize there is in England no such status as common law wife? If one of you dies without a will everything goes to the partner's family. Even with one if you are not married you may be liable for inheritance tax.

Second, be a man. 1Corinthians 13:11 When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away childish things.

You need to grow up and take responsibility for your actions and for your family. If you are wrong then admit it. And apologize if you have done wrong. Even if it is to your children. Honesty and integrity should be ingrained in your life. Your wife is not your replacement mother nor a servant nor a plaything. She is a help to you to accomplish what is best for the family and is to be respected and cherished, protected and loved. If there is a problem, do not run away like a little boy to his mummy, you stay and deal with it. If you don't know how then ask for help. Preferably not from your parents as they will often be biased and can end up causing more harm. Gen 2:24 Therefore shall a man leave his father and his mother, and shall cleave unto his wife: and they shall be one flesh. Your wife is now your primary relationship, not your parents or siblings. You can help your family, but not to the extent where it is ruining your marriage.

Third be a giver. I am not talking about presents or cash although sometimes that is nice, but give of yourself. Take time to listen to them and let them finish before speaking. I learned the hard way that a woman often is more in need of a problem to be heard and understood than a problem fixed. Christ gave of himself, his own blood and his life for us and that is the standard of love a husband should have for his wife. And remember these are regardless of the treatment from your wife. We do these things not to get better treatment (although that usually happens), but because they are right to do. Taking steps to work on your marriage, learning how to be a more mature individual and expanding the boundaries of your love will enhance your relationship and as an added bonus usually will help make everyone much happier.


Vegan and gluten-free fruity rock cakes

Ingredients

- 500g Dove's gluten free plain flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 250g dairy-free spread
- 250g caster sugar
- 200g dried fruit

(pour on enough boiling water to cover and allow to soak)

• 100ml dairy-free milk





If you're not gluten free or vegan then of course you can substitute for wheat flour and butter but this is a great recipe for anybody. These cakes are sweet, light and crumbly. You can serve them straight from the oven, warm or cold, with custard, ice cream, stewed fruit, fresh summer berries as a dessert or simply with or without butter and jam for a little bite to serve with a nice cup of tea. Best of all they take minutes to make.

Turn the oven to 180°C and line a couple of baking trays with baking paper.

Using a large bowl sift the flour and baking powder into the bowl and add the spread in in lumps. Gently rub together the flour and spread (as if making crumble) with your thumbs, index and middle fingers, lifting it up from the bowl and allowing it to fall through until it resembles breadcrumbs. Then add your sugar and, using a fork, mix through.

Gently squeeze the dried fruit of excess water and add into the mixing bowl with the flour mix and then add the milk (you could of course use water if preferred). Then using the fork combine everything together until it forms a cake mixture.

Use a couple of dessert spoons to place the mixture onto the baking trays. You can make them as big or small as you like but leave a little space between each one to allow for rising. Bake them in the oven for approximately 15 minutes. If you're making extra large ones allow for 20 minutes at least but you can check one by breaking it open and making sure it's no longer doughy.

Once they are cooked – ENJOY!!

Wildlife Review June 2011

We recently received an email from a concerned resident who reported seeing children killing bumblebees for fun in Cambourne. Some of you may be aware that all bees, including honey bees and bumble bees, have suffered serious population declines. This is mainly due to modern farming practice, especially spraying of insections.

declines. This is mainly due to modern farming practice, especially spraying of insecticides, and reduction of wild flowers in the countryside. Bees provide us with a valuable service in pollinating most of our fruit and vegetable crops – if bees died out then humans might struggle to survive. We need to do all we can to help them. If you have a garden, you can do your bit by choosing a variety of different plants so you have flowers across the whole of the spring and

summer, and leaving some corners of the garden undisturbed for them to find a place to nest. We will be trying to improve the habitat for bees in the green spaces in Cambourne too – watch this space!

If your children are keen to find our more about wildlife then they might like to join our new Wildlife Watch group that is starting soon. See the separate advert for details.



Wildlife in Cambourne has been affected by the very dry spring. Most of our small ponds have dried out because there is simply no rain to fill them. We don't know yet how this will affect the wildlife in Cambourne. Some of the dragonflies and other insects that breed in the ponds will not be able to this year (those that prefer the lakes should be ok).



Birds and mammals will find it hard to get a drink and those that usually dig for their food will be finding it very tough. Make sure that your bird bath is kept topped up as birds may come to rely on you as a source of water, and if you don't have one – now would be a great time to start. It doesn't have to be fancy, a plant pot saucer is ideal.

If you want to top up your pond then water straight from the tap can cause algal blooms. If you have a water butt, it is bound to be empty, so fill that up from the tap and let it stand for a few days (as long as you can bear to) to let all the chemicals evaporate before putting it in your pond.

EASTER CAMP 2011

350 cadets and staff from Beds and Cambs Wing held their Easter Camp in North Yorkshire at Wathgill Camp and used the Catterick DTE as its training area.

During the week long camp, the cadets were split into 12 flights, each commanded by a Cadet FS, and a Cadet Sgt as 2 IC. These senior cadets were fully responsible for their flight for the week, and to help them they received advanced leadership and management training whilst their flights were also receiving their own leadership training.

This was all to stand them in good stead for their week ahead which included the flights taking part in the obstacle/confidence course with the army, rock climbing and abseiling, orienteering, first aid, and shooting, all provided by our own qualified staff.

A year's membership is £20 for adults and lasts until January 1st. There are concessions for children at £10 for the year and under 13's fish for free if accompanied by an adult member.

E A rod licences are required by anybody wishing to fish non tidal waters in England and Wales but they can be bought online on a daily basis . The lake has been fishing very well and you can't help but catch small Rudd if you use sweetcorn or maggots, but make sure you have a disgorger handy as they are very greedy. The carp have been responding to a number of tactics including spodding as well as surface fishing with dog biscuits (my favourite) and traditional methods such as float or ledger fishing. All the carp are in very good condition and in order to keep them that way bring a landing net and treat them with respect. Don't rush to bring them in let them tire first, a loose clutch on your reel helps in this respect you will also land more fish.



Anybody who has never fished would be made welcome and can get in touch if they want to come and see how it's done, the club is very friendly and has some very experienced anglers who would more than happy to show you how to get started.

The lake has so far this year produced one 16lb carp to Pete and a nice 10lb carp to Mick but other good fish have been caught in the 6-9lb region. So far the lake record has not visited the bank but since the average size of the fish is now 4 ½ lb it is reasonable to expect the 19 ½ lb carp to have achieved over 20lb.

Cambourne fishing club is a not for profit volunteer run club aimed at preserving and enhancing the fishing at lake Ewart .The lake is owned and maintained by the wildlife trust and all decisions are made with close co-operation between the Environment Agency the Wildlife Trust .
