Time Bank in Cambourne

A Resident's Panel for the Consortium of Housing Associations would like to set up a Time Bank for everyone in Cambourne (regardless of tenure).



How could you join Cambourne Time Bank?

The Consortium of Housing Associations would set up a database which would hold a list of people interested in getting involved in the project. You would need two personal references from someone who has known you for more than three years and isn't a blood relative.

Meet up to chat over what things you would feel happy getting involved in e.g. ironing, chatting in English to someone who needs to learn English, food shopping, lifts, making up someone's hanging baskets etc. and discuss what things you would be interested in getting help on too.

How would Cambourne Time Bank work?

Once you are registered on the system, you can start volunteering through the scheme. The system works by you providing 1 hour of your time and in return you get 1 hour credited to your account. You store these credits until you have enough for something you need help on. It's important to remember that it's only the person's time that you are getting for free – not the cost of any materials.

When a request comes in, you will receive a text or email to see if you can help and a meeting between the person who needs some help and the volunteer will be set up, with support. If you both feel comfortable with the set-up, then the work will go ahead. If for any reason you didn't feel comfortable with the person, then we would try and find someone else who is happy to help. After the Time Bank work has been done you get your 'time sheet' signed by the person that you are helping and this will be logged

Who can get involved with Cambourne Time Bank?

This scheme will be open to everyone in Cambourne, not just for Consortium residents as it is about building the whole community in a positive way. The only criterion is that it's for Cambourne residents only.

So get to know new people, make friends and both give and receive help and support.

We still have lots of work to be done on this idea, the Time Bank may take some time to set up and get going and at the start certain skills may not be on offer until more people are involved. We would really welcome any ideas you have on this and if you are interested in finding out more please let me know.

Remember, everyone has a skill that is useful....even if you don't recognise it....so give it a try and get involved.

Dear Cambourne Crier

In recent editions of the crier I have read, and heard in local businesses, suggestions to restrict the parking near the junction of High Street and Broad Street. I have, some 20 minutes ago, experienced some very poor driving that was not as a result of cars parked and obstructed views - an older gentleman with a long white beard and driving a Honda Civic decided he no longer wanted to give way (at the junction to turn right towards School Lane) and was literally millimetres from ploughing into the side of my car. I was fortunate enough to be able to drive across and up onto the path as there were no pedestrians waiting to cross. Had there been pedestrians walking from the businesses on site with Fish 'n' Chick'n, I would have had nowhere to perform an emergency manoeuvre and would have had the gentleman ram the driver side of my car. I wonder how much the recent petition relied upon accident statistics and opinions that were due to 'obstruction'; in my experience I think we should be calling for safer driving and re-tests rather than focusing on parking. As a result of this letter I would like to urge Cambourne residents and workers to report incidents of poor and dangerous driving. These people need to be removed from the road!

Dear Residents.

We were all very concerned about the sudden increase in the cost of the Megarider ticket last year. We all heard what Stagecoach said about the loss of subsidy but I think Clayton Hudson exposed that one quite effectively.

In my opinion, it now transpires that people living in Kingston, Bourn, Longstowe, Caxton and Cambourne have been misled by the Stagecoach bus company since the increase. In addition, information received about transport for next year that has not been passed on to parents of students already at one of the 6th form colleges in Cambridge. In any event, I wish to ensure that parents of students in Y12 are not overcharged next year, and enable anyone with students in Y12 and Y13 at present who feel so moved to claim a refund for the last few months. The combined effect of the misinformation and lack of information set out below may (have) cost some parents several hundred pounds.

Many of you purchased an annual Megarider ticket for your student to travel to college in Cambridge from one of the villages now outside the Megarider boundary. Earlier this year those of you with these tickets were informed by Stagecoach that, as a result of the subsidy supporting buses from Cambourne coming to an end (derrr more than 18 months ago!), would have to trade- in the Megariders for Megarider Pluses. This nearly doubled the price of school transport for all those living in Kingston, Bourn, Caxton, Longstowe and Cambourne.

Now this is where it gets interesting - if you challenge Stagecoach about this on the basis that you had a valid contract with them for transport for the year, it was not open to Stagecoach to alter that contract as and when - it was a legitimate contract! The bus company have agreed to this by precedent by swapping megariders for megarider plusses at no extra charge ie that it had no right to charge any more because there was still a valid ticket on the same route that had been paid for and the payment had been accepted therefore the contract had been entered into and completed by both parties.

THIS MEANS THAT ANYBODY WITH AN ORIGINAL ANNUAL MEGARIDER, WHO CHANGED THEIR TICKET FOR A MEGARIDER PLUS, CAN APPLY TO CLAIM A REFUND FOR THE DIFFERENCE THEY HAVE PAID

Now we get to next year – anyone who has a student who is due to start Sixth Form in September does not have to buy the seemingly overpriced Megarider. The one to buy is a Goldrider for travel into Cambridge next year at a price of £200 per term. This is more than £300 cheaper over the year than the price of the Megarider Plus.

I understand that the County Education Transport are not informing parents of current 6th Form post CVC students that the Goldrider is the ticket to buy, some new students have received the information and for some random reason some haven't. If your student is already going to college in Cambridge – go for the Goldrider!

Also by claiming back the difference between the Megarider and the Megarider Plus and by purchasing the Goldrider you could save several hundreds of pounds. You don't have to be a student to do this.

Borrow an Energy Meter Scheme

Got better things to spend your money on than electricity bills? Borrow an energy meter from any Cambridgeshire library free of charge and find out how you could cut your electricity bills by as much as 15%.

Cambridgeshire County Council libraries have a stock of energy meters which residents can borrow free of charge for two weeks at a time. The meters are easy and safe to use and show how much electricity is being used in the home at any one time.

Using a meter can help you see just how much energy is used, for example, by lights in empty rooms, appliances on stand-by or boiling a full kettle. Armed with this information, studies show that households can reduce their bills by 5 -15% by making small changes to use less electricity.

Ask to borrow a meter at your local library today and start planning what to do with your savings!



Pastor Donavan Bangs In light of recent events many members of our government have called for a return to morality. Mr. Cameron said speaking of the broken society.

"Irresponsibility. Selfishness. Behaving as if your choices have no consequences. Children without fathers. Schools without discipline. Reward without effort. Crime without punishment. Rights without responsibilities. Communities without control. Some of the worst aspects of human nature tolerated, indulged – sometimes even incentivised – by a state and its agencies that in parts have become literally de-moralised."

In this I agree, but the question is to what morality will we return to? To the morality of the right honourable members of parliament who made claims for homes they did not have and expenses they did not incur. Or in layman's terms fraudulent thieves. Or perhaps the morality of the banking or financial institutions that cried out when they got in trouble then proceeded to reward those responsible for gross misconduct or unacceptable risks with bonuses from taxpayer's money. Or perhaps even our energy companies who raise the prices calling out that it is the rise in wholesale costs and not their fault, but yet refusing to say what those costs are and still posting billions of pounds in profit. And yet these people all denied any wrongdoing (some albeit only initially until overwhelming evidence was put forth). Some still deny wrongdoing. They may have a moral compass, but someone has stolen the needle. It reminds me

Judges 21:25 In those days there was no king in Israel: every man did that which was right in his own eyes.

Everyone decided what they thought was right as they had no king, no authority, no standard, no absolutes. They justified their actions in their own minds, It was and is not so much as what is right and wrong, but what can I get away with?

Many people have been surprised at the events. I was not surprised as it was only a logical progression of the policies and attitudes of society today. Children are indoctrinated to believe they can live as they please. They are bereft of

discipline and the tools that had worked for thousands of years have been stripped away in the name of progress. They have been taught to expect the state to give all that is needed. Even when I was growing up many girls would get pregnant just so they could get a council house and move out of their parent's home. They are shown that the rich and powerful people are morally depraved, lying and thieving, but successful. So, why not be like them. Drug addicts and adulterers are idolized. They are taught the natural way is survival of the fittest, that those who are stronger prey upon the weak and that is how we evolved. S, it is no wonder that they would go out and take what they wanted without fear of reprisal as they feel justified in their own eyes that such behaviour is natural and common. And the only difference between them and the politicians and the corporations is that the looters steal a lot less. I find the actions of all of them deplorable, but unsurprising.

To truly return to morality we need standards beyond our own eyes or situational ethics. It may be labelled old fashioned or archaic, but the guiding principles set out in the scripture are righteous because they come from one who is righteous. It seems we have forgotten.

Proverbs 14:34 Righteousness exalteth a nation: but sin is a reproach to any people.

Perhaps before implementing programs the leaders and we ourselves might initiate prayer like Solomon. 1Kings 3:9 Give therefore thy servant an understanding heart to judge thy people, that I may discern between good and bad: for who is able to judge this thy so great a people?

Where can we find direction?

2 Timothy 3:16 All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness:

It is time to return to the book, so I would encourage you to find a place that teaches right and wrong or before we know it our children and our streets will be on the tv.

CAMBOURNE COMMUNITY FIRE STATION

A STAKEHOLDER day marked the opening of Cambourne Community Fire Station on August 11. Throughout the afternoon, representatives from local organizations in Cambourne took the time to take a tour of the station and speak to those who work there.

Cambourne Community Fire Station, located in Back Lane, Great Cambourne, will primarily serve as a 'hub' for those working to both prevent and protect communities from fire. Staff will work from the station with the aim of making Cambourne and the wider South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge areas safer.

During the last 25 years, Fire and Rescue Services throughout the UK have changed extensively. While traditional firefighting will always be vital, it is now also recognised that efforts should also be made to educate people to prevent fires from occuring in their homes and to keep them safe when they are out and about in non-domestic buildings such as pubs, sports centres and their place of work. This approach has been successful, with the number of accidental fires in Cambridgeshire falling by 38 per cent in the last six years alone. During this time, the number of fatalities and casualties has also dropped significantly.



The station is the first to be built by Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service in nearly 25 years. It was completed under budget in July after a 42 week build by local contractors, M.A.R.S (Construction) Ltd.

The majority of the costs for the community fire station were met as part of a section 106 agreement by the original developers of Cambourne, MCA Developers and Cambridgeshire County Council. Through this agreement, the Fire Service received the land for free, and also a substantial contribution towards the build. This has meant that the station has cost the Fire Service £438,000 in total.

Neil Newberry, Assistant Chief Fire Officer for Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service said: "The Fire Service has identified Cambourne as a growing village on the outskirts of Cambridge and one that will almost certainly pose a greater risk in future – requiring its own operational fire station and fire engine. in the meantime it will be used by our Community Safety and Fire Protection teams who do a tremendous amount to ensure that members of the public are safe from fire, whether they are at home, at work or enjoying leisure activities."



Cambourne Kitchen - Spicy Pork and Tomato Crunch

I thought it might be useful this month to do a recipe that requires little more than the ingredients found in the store cupboard. So I checked my store cupboard and this is what I came up with. I hope you enjoy it. I've used pork but you can use any meat that you have to hand or prefer (although I recommend that if you are using chicken breast or a quickly cooked cut of meat that you add it just before you put the dish in the oven to avoid overcooking) or just use beans and pulses.

Ingredients: Stew.

- 500g belly/shoulder of pork cut in chunks (about 2 cm cubed)
- · 2 medium onions finely diced
- 1 tin anchovies with garlic and herbs (50g) (optional)
- · 2 tsp dried rosemary · 1 tsp good quality smoked paprika (pimenton)
- 2 tsp salt 3tsp sugar $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp hot chilli powder (optional) Juice of 1 lemon
- · 390g carton chopped tomatoes · 4 tbsp tomato ketchup · 1 tin (400g) baked beans
- · Oil to fry

Ingredients: Topping.

· Approx 350-400g breadcrumbs/cornflakes/crackers/tortilla chips (anything you have) lightly blended in a food processor • Salt and pepper • Approx 200g grated cheese

Method:

Place a medium to large saucepan on a high heat. Add a little oil and then add the meat to brown. Once the meat is browned and sealed, turn the heat down to medium and add the onion to soften and caramelise slightly. Add in the anchovies (if using) and allow them to melt into the mixture. After about 5 minutes, add the herbs & spices, lemon juice, salt, sugar and ketchup. Finally add the chopped tomatoes. Allow to cook for at least 45 mins on a low heat and add the baked beans towards the end just to heat through. This will prevent them becoming mushy.

Pour the stew into an ovenproof dish. (If not using immediately, add the topping as you are about to put it in the oven). Mix the crumb topping with the cheese and seasoning and scatter over the top. Place the dish in a preheated oven (180°C) until golden and crisp.

This really is straight forward and works beautifully. The topping can be made with whatever you have available - cornflakes sound strange but they really work and add just the right sort of crunch needed to contrast with the rich stew and soft meat.

Wildlife Review September 2011

Autumn is approaching and the hedgerows are full of berries. Those beautiful blossoms that came out during our lovely warm spring have produced a good crop again this year, which will help lots of birds, mammals and insects feed up before the winter.

Over the coming months look out for more signs of autumn, such as migrating birds, interesting fungi and leaves changing colour on the trees. But don't forget to go out and enjoy the last few butterflies and dragonflies of the season before they disappear until next spring.

We have been busy with mowing all the grassland areas around Cambourne. Our nest monitoring showed that the birds nested early this year and finished early too, so we were able to get on with mowing parts of the country park slightly earlier than usual.

Thank you to everyone that kept their dogs on a lead through the Country Park this season. It gave the birds that extra chance of not being disturbed and hopefully a few more chicks could fledge. We have taken down the signs for this year, but please continue to respect other users of the site and keep your dogs under your control. We will be reviewing the dog restriction areas for next nesting season and will let you know which areas we need your help to protect.

The Running Man

Hints, Tips and Info for Runners from the Run Leader of Cambourne Runners

I'd like to take the opportunity to give all of the Cambourne Runners a public pat on the back. In January, on a very cold wintery morning, a massive group of newbie runners stood in front of me. Along the way we have lost a few and gained a few, but always retained a committed hardcore.

Those runners, who looked at me in disbelief when I told them that in a matter of weeks they would be running 5km, have now become fully fledged runners.
