We are a group of volunteers who live or work in Cambourne and are trained by the East of England Ambulance Service to respond to emergency calls in our local community. As we are local, we can reach patients quickly and start life saving treatment in those vital few minutes before the ambulance arrives. We are equipped to provide basic life support, including airway management, oxygen administration, CPR and defibrillation. Since our launch on the 19th April last year we have attended over 140 patients in Cambourne and the surrounding villages.



Our group is looking for new volunteers with the drive and passion to make a difference. To become a Community First Responder (CFR) you must:

- Be physically fit
   Be over 18 years of age
   Agree to a Criminal Record Bureau Check
   Have a full driving licence and use of a car
   Have a caring nature
   Be ready to undertake training and annual retests.



### Wildlife Review December 2011 (Illustrations – Mike Langman)

During November I had reports of redwings around Cambourne. These birds, along with fieldfares, are winter migrant thrushes which we get coming over from Scandinavia to escape the even colder weather there. **Redwings** are similar to song thrushes, but are slightly smaller with a cream stripe over the eye and red under the

Another exciting bird arrival is the appearance of **tree sparrows** in our office garden at the Manor House. These look like house sparrows at first glance, but have chestnut brown caps instead of grey and a white patch with a black dot on the cheeks. They are red list species because their numbers have declined drastically in the UK, though numbers are starting to increase again. Hopefully we can get a good population established at Cambourne. Please let me know if you get them in your garden.

### A new type of Wildlife Trust office volunteer

Have you ever thought about learning how to identify a bat by its call, find out which plants grow locally or how many birds live in our local nature reserves? We currently have opportunities for volunteers to work alongside staff in the Cambourne office on a regular basis, during weekdays, on the various stages of organising surveys but mainly the processing of data. This data has been gathered by Ecology Group volunteers on nature reserves and ranges from species lists of birds, plants and insects to bat calls and photographs. Other work may include event publicity and logistics, conference organisation and bookings, general administration and some weekday survey and monitoring.

Essential skills required include good organisation, communication and team-working. Basic computer literacy (in Word and Excel) is required and an attention to detail is important. Proof-reading skills would be desirable but not essential.

### Retirement of Dr Peter Bailey from Monkfield Medical Practice

At the end of January 2012 I will be taking early retirement from my work as an NHS General Practitioner. It has been my great privilege to work in Cambourne for the last eleven years.

I was appointed to my post by the health authority in 2000 with the brief of developing primary care services for the new community of Cambourne. Working with a small team from temporary premises the service has grown from a list size of zero to around 8500 patients.

Many Cambourne residents will remember the early days when the medical and nursing staff outnumbered the patients! Since I was a boy of 8, general practice has been my ambition and focus and I could not have been happier or more fulfilled than I have been at Monkfield Medical Practice.

Some of you may know that my wife is unwell. She has a constellation of autoimmune diseases including Lupus and Sjogren's syndrome and has had to retire on medical grounds from her job as a GP in Harston. Medications have stabilised her illness but she has limited stamina and energy. It is clear to me that my priority must be to her and it is for that reason that I have made my decision to retire. (I should not want to look back in a few years time and regret working instead of being with her.)

I know that you will understand and support me and I look to you to support my colleagues in the transitions ahead. We have appointed a new partner, Dr Ruwani Siriwardena, who is a very experienced general practitioner. She will start in February and I look forward to welcoming her to the partnership as I hand over.

I will leave with a sense of bereavement as well as satisfaction and I will miss my partners, colleagues and friends in Cambourne, and especially the children who form such a wonderful part of the work of general practice.

As an avid supporter and frequent customer to many of the local businesses in Cambourne I was very disappointed by what happened to me this week.

Whilst parking in the circular car-park near the 'Massif Bikes' shop, I was rudely accosted by a member of their staff. She stated that the car-park was for the businesses and NOT for parents dropping their children off at the schools, in fact there were actively trying to get this stopped. She also questioned as to why I hadn't used the school car-park or walked for a couple of minutes.

Firstly, this is probably not the best way to advertise your relatively new business especially as many of your customers will be Cambourne residents with a young family, the very people you intend to target.

As many of you reading this will understand, the school car-park is always full and utilised to its maximum as most parents/carers attempt to park here first. Although a small minority of parents/carers may only have a 'couple of minutes walk' and choose to drive a vast majority have indeed much further especially those living in Lower Cambourne which does not have its own primary school. Some of the children are as young as 3 years old with even younger siblings with up to a 20 minute walk mostly in the rain at this time of the year before starting a day at school, some parents choose to walk, some choose to drive, and it should be just that, a choice. Others rush off to work straight from dropping the kids off at the schools and cannot afford the 20 minute walk back home to collect the car.

It is right that parking should not be allowed on School Lane directly outside the schools as it does pose a danger and holds up traffic, however, rather than standing a Community Beat Officer' outside the schools informing us of this the tax payers money would be better invested in a controlled crossing and a lollipop lady!

On my final point, if the parking spaces in this area are so precious and given that the parents/carers are usually parked for less than 10 minutes, should the staff (some of whom live in Cambourne) also be forced to find alternative parking especially as many of them are parked there for 9 plus hours even though there is a 'maximum 4 hour stay' in force? Does a full car-park for 10 minutes a couple of times during the week days really matter; maybe they could capture this passing trade?

Massif Bikes have written in with a response.

".. Firstly, I apologise if you feel that you feel you were "accosted", I don't think this is the case, and the lady in question was in fact conversing in a pleasant and jovial manner.

Over the last 18 months or so, and indeed since Dominos Pizza has opened, the parking around the Caxton House area has deteriorated hugely. The motoring public are resorting to parking illegally and dangerously and this, I'm sure, many will agree, is just unacceptable. Parking, especially on pavements in Caxton House has become a constant menace, especially in poor weather, and we are all trying to take steps to ensure this is stopped before a fatal accident occurs.

The police have been out moving drivers along from School lane, problem is, those same drivers are either there in the same spot the next day, parked all over the pavements, or clogging up the delivery bay outside the Dry Cleaners forcing delivery drivers to park up in an even more precarious position, i.e. across the junction of Broad St and School Lane. Large Lorries too are exacerbating the problem, and we also encourage them to park/off load in the correct areas. Whilst drivers may at times feel a little aggrieved, and that parking awkwardly for just five minutes is okay, it's all the last minute drivers who suddenly rush in, that will cause the accidents.

I have been on site here early and personally witnessed, on a number of occasions, some very near misses. Whilst those drivers are not speeding, they are indeed driving too fast for the conditions. I'm very sure that nobody wants this to be their child when it can so easily be avoided, and if this is allowed to continue, a serious accident will be inevitable, it's just a question of time.

Parking on the pavements also has huge repercussions for the walking public who have to walk around cars, into the road with prams and buggies, as well as the huge damage cars and lorries cause to the paving, which is not designed to be parked on, this costs all the retail stores more in their annual service charges to repair.

Parking in this area is indeed for customers to Caxton House only, 4 hours maximum. It has been an issue in the past with bus commuters, and has been resolved with the advent of clamping by Hyline Security, for drivers overstaying. Pay & Park meters were proposed, but rejected by the retail tenants.


Parking is, and always will be an issue in Cambourne, something the Parish and District council are constantly and tirelessly working on for the safety of all residents, and visitors to the village.."

### The Children of Jeavons Wood 'Remember'

In a letter to the Crier, County Councillor for the Bourn Division Lister Wilson explains the Primary School catchment areas in Cambourne, and dispels a few myths regarding which schools you can apply to send your children to

### 'Catchment Areas' and choosing your child's first Primary School

On 7th. November Cambridgeshire County Council issued the following:

".. Parents in Cambridgeshire who have a child born between 1 September 2007 and 31 August 2008 are reminded that they must submit an application for their child to start school in September 2012.

The process, which opens on 14 November 2011, can be completed online at <a href="www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/admissions">www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/admissions</a> or by returning a paper form, which can be obtained from any primary school and returned to the Admissions Team at Cambridgeshire County Council.

The completed form must be received by the Admissions Team by the close of business on the national closing date, 15 January 2012.

If parents submit their applications late - or do not make an application - there is a risk that their child will not offered a place at one of their preferred schools, including their catchment school, as other children's applications (those received by the deadline) will be processed ahead of theirs.."

I print this knowing that by the time you read it, there will not be much time to make your Application if you haven't done it. We do our best to make everyone aware of the process but the County knows that there will be some who miss out, mainly because they move to Cambourne after the deadline. Please contact me if this applies to you.

There are 3 Primary Schools to choose from.: The Vine (an inter-Church faith school), Jeavons Wood, and Monkfield Park. From September 2012 Jeavons Wood will be in a splendid new building surrounded by trees. If you look on-line you will see where the Catchment Area boundaries have been drawn for the Primary Schools in Cambourne:

So what does this mean for you? First of all, I am opposed to the setting of Catchment Areas for any schools. This is because I have an unshakeable belief that people should be able to make choices for themselves, not have someone else tell them that they can't. So if a resident of Lower Cambourne wants to choose The Vine then they should be allowed to even thought it means passing the fronts of two other schools to get there. In the same way, parents in Upper Cambourne should be able to send their children to Monkfield Park.

Looking at the Catchment Areas set down in September 2007, you might think that a family from Upper Cambourne couldn't send their child to Monkfield Park because they live in the Catchment Area of The Vine and Jeavons Wood. This is not the case. You can make a free choice. In fact, The Vine is open to all Cambourne residents wherever they live. This is because it is a faith school and some parents want this kind of education. Many children from Lower Cambourne already attend The Vine. So my demand for parents to choose is met.

There is only reason where I would accept the enforcement of Catchment Areas and that is if one school is full. The maximum size of each Primary School in Cambourne is 420. At the time of writing, for September 2012 none of the Schools is full and so parents can send their children to the school of their choice. For the record, Jeavons Wood will have 206, Monkfield Park 406 and The Vine 406. Some parents may also choose Hardwick which will have 245.

Making Catchment Areas is done for purely practical reasons i.e. to make sure one school doesn't face over-large classes whilst another has empty rooms. But I would also support competition between schools so that popular schools are allowed to expand and failing ones close. All Cambourne's schools are thriving and very popular so this doesn't apply here.

The County Council as Education Authority must also follow the DfE Code:

- "...2.40 The 1997 Rotherham Judgment confirmed that there is nothing unlawful in the principle of admission authorities operating catchment areas as part of their oversubscription criteria and thereby giving priority to local children whose parents have expressed a preference for the school. However, admission authorities must not guarantee places to parents in a local catchment area, in case the pattern of preferences expressed does not allow this guarantee to be met. In drawing up catchment areas, admission authorities should ensure that they reflect the diversity of the community served by the school, and must not exclude particular housing estates or addresses in a way that might disadvantage particular social groups. A catchment area does not prevent parents expressing a preference for the school if they do not live in the area.
- 2.41 Local authorities and admission authorities must not suggest that parents are required to express a preference for the school in whose catchment area they live, or that they have been allocated a place at that school before they have expressed a preference. Local authorities must be clear that parents have a statutory right to express a preference for any school they choose, although they must explain the possible consequences of not expressing a preference for a school in whose catchment area they live.."

So I can emphasise that catchment areas only really come into play when a school is oversubscribed and then the County has to determine priority for admission against the published criteria (which includes Catchment Areas).

If parents living in The Vine/Jeavons Wood joint catchment area want to apply for a place at Monkfield Park they can do so and we have a duty to try to meet that preference. However, if Monkfield Park is oversubscribed they would be lower down the priority list than someone living in Monkfield Park's catchment area.

# Carrot and Marmalade Ale Drizzle Cake with a Cream Cheese Frosting

I know what you're thinking (my mother thought it too!), "Ale! In a cake?!", but trust me this really works. I've deliberately chosen an ale which has a hint of honey in it but I do believe that this will work will most medium ales. I've been inspired to 'think British' and to think, more specifically, about using beer/ale in more adventurous ways than just the standard beef and ale pie, and this is what came into my head. I gave it a try and think it's well worth sharing with you.

### For the cake:

- 250g butter/margarine
- 250g caster sugar
- 5 medium eggs (approx 250/300g)
- ½ jar marmalade (standard 454g jar)
- 3 tsp ground mixed spice
- Zest and juice 1 large orange
- 3 medium carrots finely grated (approx 250g)
- 450g plain flour
- 3 tsp baking powder

### For the syrup:

- 500ml ale (I used 'Humdinger' ale which is made in Manchester)
  - 100ml water
  - Zest of 1 orange
  - 450g caster sugar
  - Squeeze lemon juice

### For the frosting:

- 300g cream cheese
- 2dsp icing sugar
- Some of the syrup

### Method:

- •Line the bottom of a 10 inch square cake tin with baking paper and pre-heat your oven to 180°C.
- Pour the ale and water into a saucepan with the zest and bring it to the boil. Turn down to medium and allow the liquid to reduce by half. When ready take off the heat and leave to cool.
- •In the meantime, add your butter and sugar to a large mixing bowl and beat until light, pale in colour and fluffy (this first stage is really beneficial so give it some time). Gradually beat in each egg until fully incorporated. Then beat in the marmalade, zest and juice of the orange, mixed spice and carrots. Once mixed sift in your flour and baking powder and use a spatula to fold in, being careful not to overwork the mixture.
- Pour the cake mix into the prepared tin and place on the middle shelf of the oven.
- •Whilst the cake cooks, turn your attention to the syrup very simple. Once the ale has cooled add a squeeze of lemon juice and tip in the sugar. Leave to the side.

• After 40 minutes test to see whether the cake is cooked by using a skewer or knife pushed into the centre. If it comes out clean the cake is ready; if not, place the cake back in the oven and check every 5 minutes until the skewer/knife comes out clean. When you are happy it is thoroughly cooked take the cake out, prick it all over and spoon half the syrup mix evenly all over the cake (whilst it is still hot) making sure you reach all the corners and scooping up the sugar that settles at the bottom of the pan (this is important as it will form a crust). - Now leave the cake to cool.

The frosting is optional but it is a delicious accompaniment. In a separate bowl beat the cream cheese. Add about 4 tbsp syrup a little at a time (this makes it easier to mix) and beat in the icing sugar. Serve a little on the side of the cake. If you have any syrup left over, use this to drizzle when you serve.

This cake really is a lovely treat and a nice alternative to a Christmas pudding. It's much lighter but still has a lovely hint of that familiar Christmas taste that we all love to include in at this time of the year. If you don't fancy the frosting you could serve it will a little crème fraiche or yoghurt to add a little acidity for balance. You can also serve it warm if you prefer.

- •Clear away debris to discourage over-wintering slugs and snails.
- •Continue winter digging and forking over (unless like me you prefer not to dig).
- •Check the garden for plants etc that might need protection over the winter.
- Collect up dead leaves (start a bag of leafmould if you've got a spare corner where you can leave it for a year or so).
- Protect patio plants from wind and rain damage.
- start planning for next year by looking through seed catalogues.

# Papworth Astronomy Club News

Papworth Astronomy Club's November meeting included a talk given by Dr David Green, a senior lecturer at the Cavendish laboratory in Cambridge. Dave gave us a very well-delivered combination of historical astronomy and modern research on supernova explosions. He described the remnants of a number of supernova explosions that were recorded by earlier civilisations, notably the Crab nebula. He described the way the ancient Chinese plotted the constellations, noting that they sometimes consisted of only a single star. Current research focuses on radio observations of the structure of the supernova remnants.

The December talk will an observing session (weather permitting), led by Dave Eagle. Dave will give a brief presentation of objects that are visible in the night sky at this time of year before we move outdoors. If the weather is poor, we will stay indoors and Dave will show us some of his images from previous sessions. Join us on **Wednesday 7th December at 7:30pm.** All are welcome. If you have your own telescope, you can bring it along but equipment will be provided.

Advanced warning that Dr Alan Aylward of University College London will be the speaker at our January 4<sup>th</sup> meeting. He will give us an update on his group's research into exoplanets. Have we found another planet like Earth yet? This meeting will be supporting the BBC's Stargazing Live programme, which is returning with a second series in the new year.

All meetings will be at the Vinter Room, Papworth Everard. The Vinter Room at the entrance to Vinter Close (it is the building with the clock tower). Entering Papworth Everard from the south, take the first left after the traffic lights into Elm Way, past the fire station, and then take the second left into Vinter Close. From the north, take the first right after the library into Elm Way, past the fire station on your left, then take the second left into Vinter Close. The meeting room is accessible to wheelchairs.

# Hints, Tips and Info for Runners



### From the Run Leader of Cambourne Runners – Run in England Group

Now that the dark evenings are upon us it is worth considering wearing some Hi Viz running gear when you go out for your run. Why not kill two birds with one stone and keep warm too by getting a hi-viz long sleeve top combined with a hat. If you don't fancy running around looking like you are radioactive, buy tops, leggings or shorts that incorporate reflective piping and panels. If you can't afford to invest in a whole new set of running gear just for the winter, then go for the cheaper option of a hi-viz bib or tabard and combine it with your existing run clothing.

So, you've got your reflective gear and you are ready to go. Now is the time to consider where you are going to run. Routes that are fine and familiar in daylight can be very different in the dark - that easily avoided pothole in daylight becomes an invisible ankle breaker in the dark. Avoid trail routes, or wear a head torch if you need your trail running fix. If you run along roadsides, then run in the direction of oncoming traffic. That way you can clearly see what is coming towards you and take evasive action if you need to.

By taking a few precautions and investing in some hi-viz kit, running doesn't have to be off the agenda and can be carried out safely during autumn and winter. Get out there and embrace the darkness!
