## Cambourne Parish Council District of South Cambridgeshire

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

The Annual Parish Meeting was held in The Hub on May 7th 2013. During the meeting reports from the Parish Chairman, Committee Chairman and Parish Clerk were presented to the Councillors and members of the public. In his report Parish Chairman, Dominic Plunkett said:

"When I was elected to the position of Parish Chairman in May I said it would be a year of consolidation but, as you will see in the following reports the Parish Council has continued to be busy at the forefront of all things affecting Cambourne. Cambourne has continued to take the initiative in the way it works to ensure the residents get the best facilities and services they deserve"

Cllr Plunkett went on to pay tribute to the contributions made by Clayton Hudson and Peter Drake whom had both left the Parish Council during the year. He also commented on the effective teamwork and dedication of all the Parish council staff. Cllr Plunkett reported on the achievements of the Parish Council over the last year including the sports provision, working with the schools, pushing for provision of yellow lines and the setting up of the Parish Energy Fund.

The Chairman of the Leisure and Amenities committee, Cllr Mrs Ruth Poulton, gave an overview of the progress, improvements and usage of Cambourne Leisure and Amenity facilities including the allotments, the burial ground, the sports facilities, playgrounds and community buildings.

The Chairman of the Planning Committee was unable to attend the meeting but a report was read on his behalf. A total of 79 planning applications had been considered during the year from the developers and residents a mix of both commercial and residential applications. The Planning Committee continues to work closely with the developers and the Planning Officers at South Cambs District Council. The Parish Clerk reported on the funding and expenditure over the last year and also explained some of the process in setting the precept.

The time has come...

For me to take a step back from the many voluntary roles I have undertaken on behalf of residents.

Two events have prompted this, one was the election results and I saw that as critical as decisions that are effecting Cambourne are somewhat beyond the local South Cambs administration (A unitary authority is happening already), I only lost by 15 votes, but that is little consolation. The second and main reason for my decision was the agreement to extend housing beyond the original concept and that is such is a major shift away from what we all bought into in terms of buying or renting a home here.

Councillors were issued with fait a' compli and as much as they might huff and puff their inaction over protecting local views was not evident and as I suspected one major player actually supported the move despite promising he would represent those views expressed on the consultation last summer for the local plan. He will no doubt be quite happy now having moved to Norfolk just before the election last year.

Most councillors were also happy because it has less effect on their community, even Waterbeach have perhaps 10 years to oppose that development.

They don't even consider the Cambourne expansion is in the green belt as they claim to have protected it?

We all made our views to confirm what we wanted but they seem to have more regard to newts than residents.

Localism is just a word they like to think is happening, just ticking boxes and then we do what we wanted anyway.

To be honest Cambourne was so successful the powers that be decided we can have more out of this.

I notice though that although the local plan was for 20 years Cambourne will get its expansion as soon as they can, but other developments will take much longer. Deliver-ability rules in our case.

However we are where we are and Cambourne has achieved a magnificent community which I am proud to have played a small part in.

It is a great place to live and I have confidence our excellent Parish Council will do their best to achieve a good result in providing more facilities. I would like to see the extension named Swansley Wood and not just Lower Cambourne to define what was the original concept, campaign anyone?

I still have a role if you want a light fixed let me know and I will continue running the car scheme. My role as trustee for the youth partnership still needs some effort to get that youth centre built! Anyone got half a million?

And I may be able to offer some support to the Cambourne Crier now they need someone to update their web site.

Also remember the Cambourne web site www.cambourne.info that I have funded and run for the past 11 years is still very active with information. I am not moving away and hope to remain here and my next enforced move may well be to the Cambourne burial ground which is the last remaining unfulfilled part of the concept!

# Preparing for the blessed month of Ramadan



The Muslim community in and around Cambourne will soon be preparing for the holy month of Ramadan which this year will start on Tuesday, the 9th of July and will continue for 30 days until Wednesday, the 7th of August. Although Ramadan is always on the same day of the Islamic calendar, the date on the Gregorian calendar varies from year to year, since the Gregorian calendar is a solar calendar and the Islamic calendar is a lunar calendar. This difference means Ramadan moves in the Gregorian calendar approximately 11 days every year.

Extra evening prayers will again be held at the Hub Community Centre led by volunteers from the community known as Taraweeh. The word Taraweeh comes from an Arabic word which means to rest and relax. The prayer can be very long (well over an hour), during which one stands upright to read from the Qur'an and performs many cycles of movement (standing, bowing, prostrating, sitting). After each four cycles, one sits for a brief period of rest before continuing -- this is where the name Taraweeh ("rest prayer") comes from.

Ramadan is seen as a great opportunity for all believers to re-establish their relationship with Almighty God. During this month, God opens the doors of guidance, mercy, and forgiveness and showers His blessings on mankind. In the Quran, God says Oh you who believe, Fasting is prescribed to you as it was prescribed to those before you, that you many learn piety and righteousness" (Q 2:183).

At the end of a long day, Muslims break their fast at sunset know as Iftar (Arabic: ??????), which refers to the evening meal. Iftar is one of the religious observances of Ramadan and is often done as a community, with people gathering to break their fast together. It is performed right after Maghrib (sunset) time. Traditionally, three dates are eaten to break the fast, in the tradition of the prophet Muhammed (PBUH), who broke his fast in this manner. The Muslim Community in Cambourne will be hosting Iftar at the Hub Community Centre on the 20th of July from 8:00pm which will open to all, including those of other faiths.

It is worth noting that the fasts of Ramadan can improve a person's health but if the correct diet is not followed, can possibly worsen it. The deciding factor is not the fast itself, but rather what is consumed during the non-fasting hours. Overeating can not only harm the body but it is thought also to interfere with a person's spiritual growth during this month.

### **Road Safety Campaign**

Way back in 1994, when the local authority, county council, planners and a consortium of developers first created their plan for Cambourne, they envisaged a rural idyll that was home to a range of household profiles, but in the main, to young families. To this end the first school, Monkfield Park Primary School was built in 1998, in preparation for what was to become home to the highest birth rate in the United Kingdom.

Whatever you feel about Cambourne, we can probably all agree that is a magnet for settlement for young or new families attracted by the proximity to the city of Cambridge, the wide open spaces, the play parks, leisure facilities and children's clubs that have increased in number and reach over the past 15 years. This is the reason I moved in to Lower Cambourne, heavily pregnant with my first child, having witnessed the first foundations being laid as I travelled from my parents in Essex to my home near Huntingdon.

The authorities, planners and developers envisaged Cambourne to be a place where people would work, live and be educated. They were wrong. The roads they built are narrow, most of the dwellings have impossibly short driveways, and the provision of off-road parking failed to cater for the at-least-one-car-per-adult ratio that exists in Cambourne. Their dreams for additional phases for the Business Park are still dreams, and over 95% of the residents of Cambourne do not work in the village. Instead of the vast majority of us walking, cycling, or scooting to school, or work, as the planners had envisioned, the vast majority of us are driving. And because the reality of our driving population was overlooked, lay-bys near the schools, as you will find in most places, were omitted from the plans. Better to have a nice wide green verge, surely? The Cambourne Planning Committee also decided to put a different sort of paved area into the roads where a natural pedestrian crossing might sit. They planned the houses and the schools and the facilities for the young families they wished to attract to Cambourne, but certainly not for their safety in getting to any of them. These are not crossings, they are death traps. No driver understands what they should do with them. Should they stop? Carry on? Do parents want their children to get used to expecting cars to stop on something that does not

resemble any sort of crossing the Department of Transport would recognise? And so the conundrum goes...

The planners also failed to see that, like all major trunk roads, when the traffic gets heavy on the A428 towards Cambridge, drivers look for an alternative route to cut 5 or 10 minutes off their everyday rush hour journeys. And since the 19 mph signs were removed, or people realised the speed limit was not actually enforceable, School Lane became the A428's rat run for many commuters. I understand the bending nature of School Lane is a natural speed deterrent for many, but not for all. Cut one corner, cut them all.

Particularly on bad weather days, the car parks near the schools fill up quickly, and those parents dropping off their children to school or breakfast clubs whilst on their way to work also try to cut corners, and park on the pavements, or worse, on the bends near the schools. So what we have is people parking inconsiderately on one hand, and hasty



commuters trying to make up for lost time, and the two of them are starting to cause problems, most importantly, to children getting to school exactly as the planners had intended – on foot, and on cycles. For when these children need to cross School Lane, or Jeavons Lane etc. to get to school, they, and their parents, risk their lives. I don't say this lightly, and like many others, I have seen too many near misses. I have seen people stop at the so called "crossings", wait for a gap in the traffic, or a car to stop to let them cross, only to see another overtake impatiently from behind, or for a vehicle travelling in the opposite direction refuse to stop in tandem. This is how a serious accident will occur.

I am pleased to say that, albeit late in the day, through the concerted efforts of our Parish Council, our Schools and a growing movement of support for the campaign I have started, step by step, action is being taken. The schools are doing their utmost to highlight the problem in their own schools, first by ensuring their own staff and contractors park in a car park, and also by reminding parents to plan ahead and park elsewhere. The Parish Council is also setting new wheels into motion in acknowledgement of the real concerns of residents and is investigating how to action the installation of nationally recognised crossings and speed reducers as quickly as possible.

If you feel as strongly as I do about the safety (or lack of) on Cambourne's roads, I urge you to join our campaign to help the Parish Council in their quest for safe crossings and road usage. You can join our FaceBook page – Making Our Roads Safer for Everyone, you can make a representation to the Parish Council, or you can email me directly – csfazackerley@gmail.com.

Our aim is to have properly recognised pedestrian crossings that every driver – resident or non- will recognise, and use appropriately, installed in as many appropriate junctions and crossing areas as possible and as quickly as possible. And we have to act NOW. Some people will tell you this isn't possible, and quote tales of bureaucracy, red tape, and "we tried this before but..." They may have been frustrated by unrewarded efforts and be justified in this thinking, but times change, reason can be appreciated, and the louder the voices, the more likely they will be heard. **Don't let the scream of a child be the one we all react to.**

BARBECUE SAFETY: The sun has finally arrived so I'm sure some residents will enjoy a tasty barbecue – but all barbecues can get out of control if care is not taken. Follow our top tips for a safe barbecue:

- Place your barbecues on level ground where it will not tip over.
- Site barbecues away from sheds, fences, overhanging foliage and the house.
  - Avoid positioning barbecues where people have to pass closely by it.
  - Keep children and garden games well away from the cooking area.
    - Never leave barbecues unattended.
  - When cooking is finished, ensure the barbecue is cool before moving it
- NEVER pour petrol or other highly flammable liquids over any barbecue.

Computer system change: On 2<sup>nd</sup> July we are changing our computer software.

In the lead up to the changeover we hope to keep disruption to our usual service to a minimum, but there will be times when staff will need to spend time training and times when some of our usual services may be delayed for a short while.

Prescriptions: We will need to reduce our repeat prescription work in the period from 24<sup>th</sup> June – 2nd

July. If your repeat prescription needs to be issued between these dates, please make your request before Friday 21st June. If you do not do this we can not guarantee that you prescription will be issued on time. In some cases the practice will issue two months' worth of medication to selected patients who are requesting now and who are likely to run out during this time. The second month issue will be what is called a post-dated prescription, which means that the date on the prescription is in the future and the prescription can only be used from that day onwards. This is a necessary safety measure.

Appointments: As part of the changeover, we will need to minimize some of our services. You will not be able to pre-book any appointments after the 25th June until we have the new system installed on July 2nd.

If you would like an appointment between 26th June and 2nd July, please call on the day that you would like to be seen.

#### Centre 33s Young Carers Project has been working with Young Carers in South Centre Cambridgeshire thanks to a £5,000 Heart Research UK Healthy Heart Grant.



Through the 'Happy Hearts' project 28 Young Carers have attended a selection of fun hands-on workshops to improve their understanding of heart health and give them the skills to lead heart-healthier lifestyles and reduce their risk of obesity and heart disease.



Barbara Harpham, National Director at Heart Research UK, says: "It's great to get this special group focusing on their heart health through this fun programme and receive the support they need to make positive lifestyle changes. Young carers do a fantastic job looking after others, but they also need to pay attention to their own health and the "Happy Hearts" programme will give them skills and eart research uk encouragement to do so."

Young Carers from Centre 33 highlighted the need for information about keeping a healthy heart as poor nutrition and physical health leads to an increased risk of heart disease. Many young carers are responsible for shopping and preparing family meals, often on a low budget, with little or no skills in doing so, so unhealthy foods prove an easy option for them. The workshops have varied from stress management, the impact of smoking, healthy cooking and recipe development, to golfing, gym sessions and fencing, and have seen young carers aged 8-16 years developing news skills and approaches to a healthy lifestyle alongside gaining knowledge about how the heart works and the causes of heart disease.

Many young carers have had the opportunity to try activities that they would not otherwise have done. The cooking and healthy recipes introduced new, low cost, quick and easy recipes, and the sports sessions introduced the young carers to local sports sessions that they can access. The young carers found the workshops on stress management really helpful as they have learnt new ways to manage stress, and how to recognise the signs of stress.

Through knowledge gained on the project the young carers have developed a young person friendly information leaflet, to help share with others the importance of understanding how the heart works and how to keep it healthy. The leaflets have been sent out to local young carers, schools, voluntary



organisations and GP surgeries. Helen Eves, Young Carers Project Worker at Centre 33, said 'The young carers have really enjoyed this project and have all gained knowledge about the importance of a healthy lifestyle. Thanks to Heart Research UK the new skills they have learnt will help them to have healthier happy lifestyles'.

#### District Council News

You are probably aware that county council has been leading on getting the A14 upgrade moving. Government has insisted on tolling and a local contribution from local authorities, this is their new model for the future and is not negotiable if we want the upgrade to go ahead. And if the A14 isn't upgraded, Northstowe will not go ahead over and above the 1500 that currently have planning permission, which means that thousands and thousands of houses will have to be built elsewhere in the county instead. I must say that I don't like tolling or our local contribution but ..... that is the deal and I'm told if we want the upgrade we must accept the funding model.

The trial Textile recycling collections in some areas have proved very popular - in the first day South Cambs collected 2 tons there were 1300 tons put in to land fill from our black bins last year, we just want to redirect that and reduce our landfill charges. It will be rolled out to more villages later this year. The RECAP Board for Waste and Recycling have agreed to form a joint committee for Cambridgeshire. This would hope to include Peterborough and offer all the Districts and County a proposal to work together and save significant costs. Onto what is called bedroom tax. It's actually nothing of the sort, it's a refusal by South Cambs to subsidise people to live in houses bigger than they need. Your money is better spent protecting our more vulnerable residents instead. Without a doubt the toughest area of the council is the Homeless Department and working with people facing eviction and the ultimate housing challenges of losing their home. South Cambs have an excellent Homeless team working with partner agencies to keep people in their homes.

South Cambs have completely overhauled their lettings policy to ensure we manage our housing stock in the most effective manner possible. Approximately 400 people have been removed from the waiting list as they did not have a South Cambs connection. The joint venture with Cambridge Future Transport is still ongoing and currently collating and assessing the responses to the questionnaire on Direct Response Transport sent out to most South Cambridgeshire residents. The delivery of new employment into the district culminating in the announcement at Granta Park that Astra Zeneca would be moving its headquarters and 2000 jobs to the area. Outstanding work by our planning officers delivering plans ahead of schedule enabling employers to take up grants and research funds offered. ## **CAMBOURNE CRAFT**

This month I thought we could make this mug – a convenient place to put your bits and bobs. I keep my car keys in them – but whatever you do please don't put in any liquids! You can use any type of fabric and I would suggest a heavier fabric for the outside and a pretty printed fabric for the inside.

**You will need:** Sewing machine, scissors, thread (colour matches the fabric colour), pins, 2 contrasting fabrics (colour and pattern of choice) measurements – 16 cm by 2 cm for the handle, the base circle 9 cm in diameter and 7 cm by 33 cm for the sides of the mug.

1.Cut out the pieces, base circle 9 cm in diameter, the handle and also the sides.

- 2. Using your other contrasting fabric cut a matching piece exactly the size for the sides of the mug. Stitch together by machine.
- 3. Using a blanket stitch attach the base circle to the sides.
- 4. Attach the handle at the top and bottom of the mug using a blanket stitch.

Easier - do without the handle. Challenge - personalise it with a hand embroidery name or a motif. By Sonia Mrowiec

## Cambourne Kitchen- Corn Cookies with Chocolate Chips & Walnuts -Louise Wilson

This recipe is one that anyone can do and would be really great to make with the kids. The ingredients can be found in most store cupboards and they are gluten-free as well. Give them a go - they take minutes to make. The mixture can be kept in the fridge until ready to bake and once cooked the cookies can be stored in an airtight container for freshness.

- You will need:
- 250g butter
- 200g sugar
- 80ml sunflower/vegetable oil
- - 1tsp gluten free baking powder
- 2tsp xantham gum (don't worry if you don't have this it will work without)
- - 100g potato flour (sometimes known as 'Farina')
- 400g cornflakes
- Plenty of chocolate chips and walnuts cut up into pieces.

**Method:** First, crush your cornflakes into a fine powder - this is probably easiest to do in a blender but if you don't have one put them in a large polythene bag and roll them with a rolling pin. In a large mixing bowl cream together the sugar, butter and oil until smooth, pale and fluffy. Add in the dry ingredients except the choc chips and walnuts and work it together. (Because there is no gluten in the corn you can be pretty rough with the mixture.) Make sure it is well mixed (using your hands is the best method) and press it all together until thoroughly combined. Add in the chocolate chips and walnuts and again work the mixture until they are evenly distributed. (You will find that the mixture is quite crumbly - it is not like a normal flour mix but don't worry this is normal).

Put the mixture onto a large sheet of baking paper and roll it into a long cylinder shape roughly 3" round. Use the paper to help you. Then wrap this in foil and then cling film and really squeeze the mixture so it is tightly pressed together. This will help when cutting it. You can bake them straight away or put the dough in the fridge to set slightly. When you are ready preheat the oven to 170°C (fan assisted) or 190°C (non fan assisted). Cut the cookies into rounds approximately 1½ cms thick and place on a baking tray lined with baking paper.

If the mix crumbles slightly don't worry just press it back together on the tray. Bake in the oven for about 10 mins or until you see them starting to turn a golden brown colour. They can be enjoyed warm from the oven or let them cool and they are equally delicious.

Enjoy these with a cup of tea, pack them up and take them on a picnic if the weather's right or have them with a scoop of ice cream and warm chocolate sauce for an indulgent dessert. Whatever way you decide to have them do give them a go - they're so simple and fantastically crunchy and tasty!



#### Wildlife Review May 2013

Everything is lush and green at the moment. I love the fresh green of new oak leaves. It is very similar to the colour of our new logo! There are lots of flowers emerging now, from bright blue speedwell to pink herb robert. If you need help identifying anything, just send me a photo.

With the mix of sunshine and rain we have had recently the grass has certainly benefited and started growing like mad. We have been out on the tractors at last, starting the regular mowing around the green spaces to keep the mix of different length grass that benefits lots of different wildlife.



Many people know that peacock butterflies need stinging nettles for their caterpillars to feed on. Of course large and small white butterflies like to lay their eggs on plants of the cabbage family, hence their common name. Some rare species depend on just one plant, like the chalkhill blue on horseshoe vetch. But many familiar species, like meadow brown, speckled wood and the skippers, need long grass for their caterpillars. You can help butterflies in your garden by leaving an area of long grass through the summer. Also make sure you have flowers blooming right through the season so there is always a nectar source for the adults.

The shorter grass patches are good foraging areas for many birds such as reed buntings, skylarks and meadow pipits. However, these birds need longer grass or scrubby areas to nest in, so we leave areas of Crow Hill uncut until we know they have finished breeding for the year.

We also use sheep to help us maintain some of the grassland in Cambourne. In the meadows around the south and east boundaries you may

come across them munching away. Grazing helps keep the bigger grasses and plants down while allowing some of the more delicate flowers room to grow and does not suddenly change the habitat but does it gradually over time. Please remember to close any gates and keep your dogs on leads around the sheep. Do give us a wave if you see us out on the tractors around Cambourne!


