A Tribute to Peter Dare



Cambourne Parish Council is mourning the untimely death of Peter Dare, known affectionately to his colleagues as 'Grandad', on 30th October 2013 after a short but bravely borne battle with cancer. Peter was the Parish Council Caretaker, looking after all the Parish buildings and also worked as a Groundsman alongside the rest of the grounds team maintaining Cambourne's open spaces and sports

Peter, a Cambourne resident since 2007, leaves a wife, Wendy, and was a much loved husband, father, grandfather, son, brother and friend. His family meant the world to him and his passing has left a void in many lives.

Peter joined Cambourne Parish Council in March 2009 but before that he had many roles including, van deliveries, security at the Dorchester Hotel in London and mini cab driving, where he was known as Petrol Pete due to his ability to keep running out of it. Peter was a hard-working and respected member of the Parish Council team; his sense of humour and his ability to tell it like it is endeared him to those that met him. The tributes made to Peter at his funeral by his family and friends painted a picture of a man devoted to his family, willing to help anyone in need, generous and optimistic, but also somewhat rebellious with a wicked sense of humour.

Peter was a well known figure around Cambourne and was often to be seen out mowing on his favourite John Deere zero turn. This mower now has an additional name plate as can been seen in the photograph; so if you see it around the village take a moment to remember a man who gave so much to the community of Cambourne.

A Welcome to the New Coop store

ARTISTIC youngsters have given Lower Cambourne's new Anglia Cooperative foodstore a colourful launch.

Children from the Blue School at Hardwick, The Vine Inter-Church Primary at Upper Cambourne and Monkfield Park Primary at Great Cambourne used their skills to come up with artwork for a giant welcome banner which will be hung at the School Lane store.

As a 'thank you' the children were invited to help with the store's official opening on Wednesday (November 6), joining with Anglia Co-operative board chairman Harry Whitelock, store manager Jamie Asque, parish council clerk John Vickery and representatives of Cambourne Youth Partnership and the Wildlife Trust for Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northants to cut a ribbon. The pupils were also presented with gifts by Mr Whitelock and Mr Asque and their schools each received cheque's for £200 to thank them for their support. The youth partnership and the local Wildlife Trust will both benefit from the store's Token of Support fundraising campaign, which was launched on Wednesday.

Over the next six weeks shoppers will be given a green token at every transaction and will be asked to place it in a special container for the cause they wish to support.

At the end of the campaign the cause receiving the most 'votes' will earn a cheque for £300 and £150 will go to the other.

The store is also supporting Cambourne Village College's appeal to buy a new minibus, donating £100 in vouchers as a raffle prize at a fundraising quiz night later this month.

Clerk John Vickery gave the new store the thumbs-up, saying: "Residents will welcome the chance for choice. It's useful having convenience too – not everyone needs to do a huge shop.

"The new store also helps to give the village a separate identity – and hopefully it will reduce car usage, with people being able to walk to

A message from Anglian Water regarding surface water drainage rebates

Following meetings with the Parish Council it has come to light that a number of Cambourne residents may have been told incorrectly, by Anglian Water, that they were not eligible for the Surface Water Drainage rebate on their sewerage charges. Where this is the case, the rebate will be backdated to the start of the financial year in which they were misinformed.

Not all residents in Cambourne will qualify for the rebate, and in those cases the information they were given would have been correct, and so no adjustment needs to be made.

To help identify whether residents may or may not have been incorrectly informed, Anglian Water have provided the Parish Council with a map of the area showing which properties are served by our surface water sewers and from which date. Residents who believe they did receive the wrong information can apply for the backdated rebate by emailing AW at CustomerRelations@anglianwater.co.uk with their name and address, when they moved in, and when they were told they were not eligible. The rebates should be calculated within four weeks and added to their Cambridge Water account with any resulting credit balance being refunded.

Pumping Stations

Here in Cambourne, we rely on a network of pumping stations to take sewage safely away from our homes and businesses. Following significant investment and partnership working we are pleased that the historical issues associated with the pumping stations have largely been resolved.

Building on this work, we are now asking for your help... In recent months the pumps have been repeatedly blocked by household waste such as wipes and sanitary waste which should never be flushed. Most residents are unaware that this waste stops the sewer pumps from working effectively, increasing the risk of sewage flooding back into homes and spilling into the local environment.

Cambourne Parish Council is working with Anglian Water and a number of other organisations including Morrisons supermarket, housing developers and a number of housing associations to raise awareness about the problem amongst residents and provide advice on simple actions we can all take to prevent these 'avoidable' blockages and sewer flooding incidents.

Please dispose of sanitary waste and all used wipes, including baby wipes, facial wipes and household wipes in the bin, not down the toilet. With your help, we can help protect our homes and the local environment from the misery and inconvenience of sewer flooding and pollution incidents. Thank you.

Dog Fouling

Dog fouling continues to be a problem and a source of many complaints in Cambourne. There are over 40 dog bins around Cambourne, with another 10 to be installed; please ensure that they are used. Leaving dog mess on the pavements, the open green spaces and the sports pitches is simply unacceptable, anti-social and unhygienic. Please help us maintain a clean and safe environment in Cambourne. Bag it and bin it!

As we move into December, it seems that the pace of life at CamVC has slackened not a bit. COLLEGE We ended our first half term with the whole year group experiencing two 'Curriculum Extension Days', the students enjoying a day of sports here in our super indoor facilities and also visiting Ely Cathedral, where they learnt about its history, did some excellent

sketching and brass-rubbing, and visited the Stained Glass Museum. We are really privileged to be working with the cathedral team to create a stained glass installation for our entrance hall, to which every student will contribute a glass panel, fired in the kiln at school. This will be ready by the end of the school year and along with the DT project in which each pupil is designing and making a door plate, means that everyone is contributing to the beauty of the school.

Auditions are taking place for our first big production, the musical 'Oliver', and we have begun to plan for our residential visit to Beaumanor Hall next summer. All of the students have taken part in an excellent collaborative project with Cambourne Library, in which they each chose two new books for the library stock. We raised £284 for the CIN appeal, and have also been running a collection for the victims of the Philippines Typhoon disaster.

At the end of last half term, we met with the Year 6 teachers from our catchment schools to reflect on what had gone well in the transition from primary to secondary phase, and to consider how we could improve the process for the pupils next time round. We are already thinking about next year's timetable and relishing the thought of doubling our student roll in one day!

We continue to enjoy fantastic support from our parents' association, the 'Friends of CamVC', who will have held their first Quiz night – already a sell out – by the time this is published. 
We have collected autumn leaves from the garden and have used these to do rubbings to explore patterns. We have also enjoyed singing some

December marks the beginning of Advent and commences Sunday December 2nd and ends Monday 24th December. The word Advent derives from the Latin word meaning "coming". We are of course looking forward to the coming of the Saviour, Jesus Christ into the world. The advent wreath's symbolism of the advent of light into the world is clear. The gradual lighting of the four candles, one on each Sunday of the Advent season, combined with the liturgical colours of the candles help to symbolise not only our expectation and hope in Our Saviour's first coming into the world, but also in his Second Coming as Judge at the end of the world. The wreath itself is also symbolic. The circle of evergreen in which the candles are placed represents everlasting life. The seedpods, nuts and cones used to decorate the wreath are symbolic of resurrection, and fruits represent the nourishing fruitfulness of the Christian life.



Advent is a time of reflection. We are to look back at the birth of Christ in Bethlehem and we are also to look forward to the second coming at the end of time. We are caught in the juxtaposition between the two and recognise that God became man, in the humility, innocence and vulnerability of a baby. He came to bring us hope, truth and to show us how to live and love and to give meaning to our lives. He gave us a means of knowing him and following him after his death on the cross by establishing his Church to guide us, the sacraments to sustain us and the Word of God in the Bible to nourish us.

The readings from the Scriptures in Advent will turn our minds and attention to the end times and the Second Coming. We are fortified with hope and reminded to stay awake and be watchful so that he does not find us asleep with the slumber and cares of the world which do not last. The season of Advent brings us the magnificent vision of life and hope for the future given to us by Christ. 
What is a Timebank?

Wildlife Review December 2013

With the branches almost bare and cold grey mornings, it may seem like quite a drab time of year. But the advantage of the leaves falling is that birds are much more visible and the muddy or snowy ground is perfect for spotting tracks and signs of animals. If you take a winter walk over the Christmas holidays let me know about the wildlife you see.

If you would like to improve your wildlife knowledge our Wildlife Training Workshops programme for 2014 has just come out. You can find it on our website or call into the office for a leaflet. There are courses based in Cambourne and nearby on topics including geology, water voles, birdsong, small mammals and coppicing. It could make a good Christmas present for someone! If you want somewhere different to visit over the winter, why not try the Great Fen? This is one of the most exciting habitat restoration schemes ever undertaken in Europe. We're aiming to return 14 square miles of arable fields in Cambridgeshire back to wildlife-rich and people-friendly fenland. Already some of the rarest species in Britain such as otter, water vole and the scarce chaser dragonfly are returning since we began work. We now have a fantastic opportunity to transform another 182 hectares (450 acres) of land at the heart of the Great Fen at Engine Farm. Cambourne Mens Bake Club

You may have noticed, thanks to TV ads on since September, that it's nearly Christmas.

It goes without saying this is both a great opportunity for putting your baking skills through their paces and a very busy time too. So if time is short but you still want to impress family and friends, with your baked food, why not knock out some easy mince pies.

Now, you can do the thin filled type like grandma used to make but why not go big and make these deep filled no nonsense mince pies. This recipe will make 12 man sized mince pies.

Ingredients:

225g cold butter, chopped

350g plain flour

100g icing sugar, plus extra for dusting

410g jar mincemeat

Method:

- 1. Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Rub the butter into the flour and icing sugar with your fingertips, or blend in a food processor, until the mixture comes together in a ball you don't need to add any liquid or chill it. Knead briefly, then cut into 12 equal pieces.
- 2. Taking a piece of dough at a time, cut off two-thirds and press into the base and up the sides of a muffin tin hole. Repeat to make 12. Spoon the mincemeat into the pastry cases it won't completely fill them.
- 3. Now take the 12 remaining smaller pieces of pastry. Roll each into a ball and flatten to make a disc for the mince pie lid. Add one to each pie and tuck the pastry that comes up the sides of the tin down to seal it. Prick the tops with a fork a few times.
- 4. Bake for 12-15 mins or until pale golden. Cool in the tins for about 10 mins, then give the pies a little twist to stop them from sticking. When cool, carefully remove from the tins. Dust with icing sugar when ready to serve.
- 5. When cold these pies can be frozen ready to defrost and enjoy when required.

A Simple Indulgent Hot Chocolate

Okay, so we must finally admit that winter is indeed here. We've had a wonderful summer and autumn but now what we all like on those cold, dark evenings is something warm and comforting. Cue recipe. This is so easy to make and without being heavy it just gives you that lift you need when we get in from a long day. It's also great because it can often get so hectic over this festive period so something quick to hand can be a great fall back and relieve some of that tension.



Ingredients:

- 2 tsp good quality hot chocolate powder (plus a little extra for dusting) You could use 1½ tsp cocoa and 1-2tsp sugar instead
- 100ml boiling water
- 200ml milk (whatever your preference I have used whole milk but skimmed, semi or even dairy alternatives would be fine)
- A drop of almond extract
- A scoop of ice cream
- A dollop of whipped cream
- A small sprinkling of orange zest


Method:

In a tall glass or mug make a paste with the chocolate powder and water. Add the milk and heat in a microwave for about two minutes (you could just as easily heat in a pan on the hob). Add the almond extract and stir through. Top with the ice cream and then the cream and dust the top with a little chocolate powder and the zest of orange. Da dah! Done and ready for you to dive into.

The contrast between the cool top and the hot liquid is lovely and of course, the ice cream immediately starts to melt and create a delicious sweet creamy top.

Be creative. I have suggested almond and orange (a little Christmassy flavour) but you could add anything. Why not try a wee dram of something like Irish cream, whisky, brandy. Or non-alcoholic; coffee, ginger, cinnamon or mint. The sky really is the limit. So get indulging and enjoying!


Cambourne 4 have had similar success in the Katie Coulson cup, having won their latest match 13:12 and looking forward to the next.


