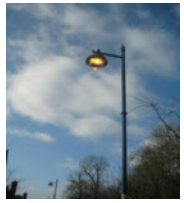

Chairman's report

2014 and 2015 will continue to be a period of consolidation as the Parish Council oversees and ensures that all aspects of the S106 agreement in respect of the 950 extra homes are met. At the top of the list of priorities regarding that is ensuring that the remainder of the £827,500 earmarked for increased healthcare accommodation at the medical practice in Sackville House is used appropriately.

Looking forward, the Parish Council continues to plan for the future. The Local Plan is probably the topic that concerns residents the most, with its proposals for 1,200 new houses to the West of Cambourne and 3,500 new houses in the form of a new village on Bourn Airfield. The Parish Council has been vocal in its opposition to these proposals but should they come to pass then it will work to ensure the best deal for Cambourne residents is achieved.

Other initiatives coming up are; working closely with the Cambourne Youth Partnership to increase the level of youth services in Cambourne, there is £225,000 funding earmarked for a new youth building, and continuing the process of increasing youth provision in Cambourne. A planning application for a sports area development including a new full-size 3g artificial turf pitch, new tennis courts, new cricket pavilion, additional junior pitches and an informal MUGA has just been submitted along with a plan to extend the Hub (See 'Community Notice Board' on facing page).

On a personal note I would like to pay tribute to the contribution made by my predecessor Cllr Dominic Plunkett, and the dedication of all Parish Council Staff who work hard on the resident's behalf.

Dear Editors,

We noted from the June 2014 issue of the Cambourne Crier that there is a petition to institute a dog-warden around Cambourne.

We understand completely the emotive issue regarding dog mess left around Cambourne, but as dog-owners that do pick up, we are irritated that a dog-warden should be required to reinforce this message, presumably as an added expense within our Council Tax.

As for dogs off-lead, we resent the suggestion that all dogs should be on leads; our dogs play and exercise without troubling other dog walkers or pedestrians and joggers, as we keep them close to us. Indeed, we always courteously put them on leads around anglers at the lakes.

However, the reason we felt compelled to write is that we have walked our dogs recently - on leads around Lake Ewart - only to have to dodge the fishing line and hooks of anglers fly-fishing!!! This cannot be acceptable on such a small lake and we were concerned that we and our dogs may have been injured by the action of the fly being "whipped" so close to our bodies. We have seen anglers fishing in this way several times and consider it is an accident waiting to happen. Is this allowed on our small fishing lake, and is it the fishing club or wildlife trust that permit this style, particularly having regard to the walkers, joggers, cyclists - and wildlife around the lake.

Anonymous Dog Owner

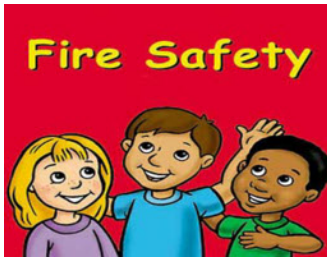
The Dog Advice Event held on 1st June was a great success.



Brett was kept busy with a constant stream of dog owners seeking advice. Some people wanted advice on how to walk their dogs without pulling, others wanted to stop their dogs barking aggressively at other dogs. Brett explained some of the reasons behind such behaviour and showed how owners could give their dogs clear signals to encourage good behaviour and with consistent training they could overcome all these problems. Where necessary, the correct leads and collars were fitted, as this is an important foundation for dog handling. Brett referred one owner to a vet for treatment of their dog's health issue and another person requested details of further dog training classes. Each person was given poo bags, a micro chipping leaflet and a leaflet explaining the new law regarding dangerous dogs and the risks to human health from dog fouling.

We would like to thank our sponsors Morrisons, Just for Pets and especially Cambourne Parish Council for their support. We will be holding another dog advice event on 10th August again at Lake Ewart. NURSE PRACTITIONERS

When you ask to make a routine appointment we will offer you the next available slot – this may be with either a Nurse Practitioner or a GP depending on availability. Below is some information from our two Nurse Practitioners – Jo Scoones and Jeremy Blakeborough explaining their role further:

- Nurse Practitioners are qualified nurses with extensive experience who have done an additional BSC (Hons) degree via the Royal College of Nursing.
- The degree is specifically designed to train nurses to become Nurse Practitioners with the ability to assess, diagnose, manage and treat patients presenting with a variety of conditions/problems equating to around 70% of the traditional GP role.
- They have also done an additional qualification in order to prescribe the same as a GP.
- Some NP's have also done additional training to specialise in particular areas:
- Jeremy specialises in Diabetes
- Jo specialises in Family Planning and Reproductive Sexual Health

Therefore, in most instances a Nurse Practitioner will be able to deal with your needs the same as a GP!

However, there are certain situations in which it may be more suitable to see a GP, *so if you suffer with any of the following, please specify that you need to see a GP when booking your appointment:*

- If you are pregnant and have problems with your pregnancy.
- Anyone with a history of multiple complex problems/heart problems.
- Medication reviews which are complicated.
- If you have an ongoing problem for which you have already been seen by a GP and things have not improved please continue to see the GP not the NP.

PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP

We are currently in the process of turning our 'virtual' group into a group which meets in person bi-monthly. The Patient Participation Group (PPG) is an opportunity for the local community to contribute to the development of wider NHS services and act as a channel of communication between the Practice and the patients. *The patient participation group will not provide a forum for individual complaints or the promotion of/campaigning for single issues.*

Meeting Report:

The first Patient Participation Group meeting was held on the evening of 25th June. Led by Dr Koo, it was a very useful and informative meeting.

One of the points raised was the low take up of text reminders of appointments. Having a computer system that can generate automatic reminders to mobile phones, the practice would like to utilize this more. Reminders would be sent out 24 hours prior to an appointment. In order to activate the system, they need the consent of each patient. So, if you make an appointment, let the receptionist know that you give permission for them to do this. If you don't have an appointment, or have made one online, you can telephone and give permission, or send them an e-mail.

As a result of the meeting, a hearing loop has been set up at the reception desk, and a mobile loop is also available to take into a consultation. Computer screens have also been tweaked, so that, when appointments are being booked, the staff can see any important relevant information, such as hearing loss. This should make things easier for all concerned.

Wildlife Review July 2014

Cambourne resident Ben Sockett has been working with us for the past 9 months while on a placement year from his degree course. Here he explains what

to look out for in Cambourne this month:

It's a fantastic time to take a walk through the meadows and parks around Cambourne. In contrast to last year, our mild winter and warm spring has allowed the wildlife around Cambourne to flourish. Many plants are in full bloom and some are already starting to seed such as yellow rattle a small plant with thin nettle-like leaves, yellow flowers and characteristic ball-like 'rattling' seed pods. There is also lots of interesting insect life to see such as butterflies, moths and bees all dancing around from flower to flower and bugs, beetles and spiders lurking underneath!



The lakes are also teeming with life. A young swan family have made their home on Whomping Willow Lake as well as countless damselflies and dragonflies darting around the water's edge. Reed and sedge warblers, two small birds, can also be heard making a racket on Whomping Willow and Lake Ewart. Have a listen to their songs on the RSPB website and see if you can spot them between the willows and reeds around the lakes.

Bee orchids have taken real a foothold in Cambourne this year and were seen in great numbers in the uncut grass verges near Lake Lambert and in the ridges and furrows of the Eco Park. Some surprise entries this year included a pyramidal orchid close to the Wildlife Trust office and a common spotted orchid near Haven Lake in the Eco Park.

Wysing Arts Centre at 25



To celebrate 25 years of the innovative arts organisation Wysing Arts Centre, members of the art and business worlds gathered together at the centre's rural location in Cambridgeshire for a day of studio

tours and a performance by the 2013 Turner Prize winning artist Laure Provost at nearby Longstowe Hall. The Wysing team conducted talks and artists Jamie Shovlin, Florian Roithmayr, Soheila Sokhanvari, Caroline Wendling and The Grantchester Pottery (Phil Root and Giles Round) invited visitors into their studios.

Wysing Arts Centre is an organisation fostering ambitious contemporary art in the UK. It has an international reputation for assiduous practical and academic support for artists through its pioneering residency and retreat programme. The centre creates a lively environment of ideas through a curated talks and events programme and collaborates with the local community and experts from The University of Cambridge.

Wysing has become known for supporting artists at all stages in their careers, many of whom have gone on to critical acclaim. Former artists in residence include Turner Prize winners Laure Prouvost and Elizabeth Price and this year's Turner Prize nominee James Richards will be in residence during the summer of 2014. Other artist residents include:

- Ed Atkins was in residence in 2012 and used his time and funding to make the critically acclaimed work *Us Talk Dead Love* that premiered at the Chisenhale Gallery in 2012. Atkins went on to receive Paul Hamlyn award in 2012, present celebrated work in the Venice Biennial in 2013. His solo show at The Serpentine Gallery opens in June 2014.
- US based artist Keren Cytter was in residence in 2013 where she developed the new work *Vociferous* in collaboration with the band Maria & the Mirrors and which was premiered at Wysing's music festival in 2013 before being performed at the ICA, London.
- Cécile B. Evans was in residence in 2013 where she developed the work *Agnes* – a spambot that interacts with the viewer or user – for The Serpentine Gallery's new online commission series.
- Emma Hart was in residence in 2012 where she developed work for her 2013 solo exhibition *Dirty Looks* at Camden Arts Centre.

- Andy Holden began working with Wysing in 2009 and in 2010 curated the music festival *Be Glad for the Song Has no End*, which is now an annual event and a highlight of Wysing's performance programme. Recent exhibitions include Art Now at Tate Britain, The *Zabludowicz Collection* and Spike Island, Bristol. He received the Paul Hamlyn award in 2012.
- Gustav Metzger was in residence for an extended period over the summer of 2013 where he began to develop ideas for new work that would later form part of his solo exhibition *Lift Off* at Kettle's Yard, Cambridge.
- The Grantchester Pottery were formed at Wysing in 2011 by artists Giles Round and Phil Root. They are a conceptual pottery and design team inspired by early modernist decorative artist's studios and transformed the ceramics studio at Wysing into an immersive art work. They recently had a solo exhibition at the ICA, London.
- Elizabeth Price was in residence in 2012 when she worked on her film *The Woolworth's Choir of 1979* ahead of her Turner Prize exhibition. She also began the major new film *SUNLIGHT* which premiered in a solo exhibition at Focal Point gallery's new gallery space in Southend in 2013. Alongside the Turner Prize she received a Paul Hamlyn Award in 2012.
- Laure Prouvost was in residence in 2011 where she developed new permanent works for Wysing's site. She has subsequently been in two exhibitions at Wysing. She won the Turner Prize in 2013.
- Cally Spooner was in residence in 2011 and used her time to develop a major new performance for KW Institute, Berlin. She returned to Wysing in 2013 to develop the work further and then performed it at the Metropolitan Museum, New York as part of the festival Performa 13, and later performed it in the BMW Tate Modern Live.
- Bedwyr Williams was in residence in 2010 where he developed a new permanent work for Wysing's site. He represented Wales at the Venice Biennale in 2013.

But I'm not daunted. We can do this, and I will give it my all. We are going to take Scrappy too (he's our Dog. He doesn't know this yet!)

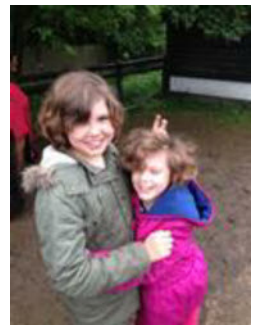

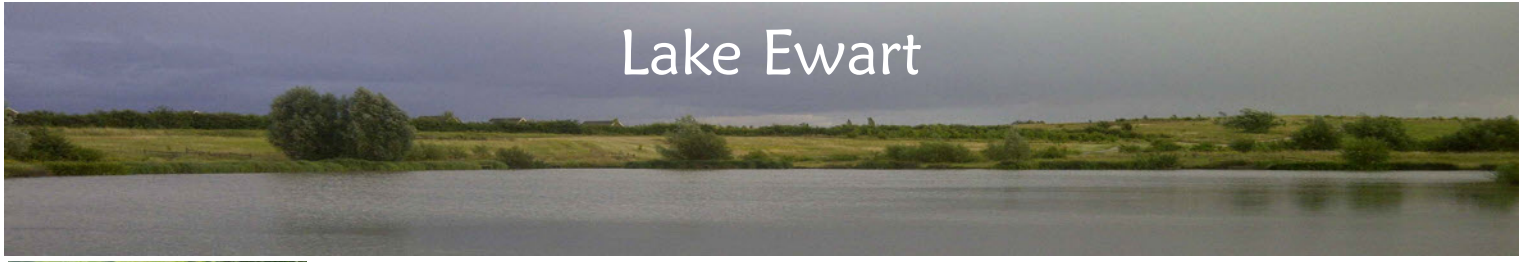
