



vehicle returns to Cambourne at 14:00 having left St Neots at 13:00.



Letting parents have a say on local maternity services

Healthwatch Cambridgeshire has found that local people don't all have the same chance to feedback on their experience of maternity care, due to inequalities in funding local Maternity Service Liaison Committees (MSLCs).

In a newly published report, Healthwatch Cambridgeshire has found that changes in legislation from the Health & Social Care Act 2012 has left the future of MSLCs hanging in the balance.

MSLCs were developed so that new and potential parents could work with maternity service staff to improve the care provided to pregnant women, their families and their babies.

We have two MSLCs in Cambridgeshire, one at the Rosie Hospital in Cambridge and one at The Parks at Hinchingbrooke. There are also MSLCs for local people who are cared for by Peterborough Hospital and the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Kings Lynn.

Local MSLCs have worked hard to improve the care that maternity services provide and used to be funded under statute by the local Primary Care Trust (PCT). This requirement ended with the Health & Social Care Act 2012, which replaced PCTs with local GP led Clinical Commissioning Groups.

In Cambridgeshire, this has led to an inconsistency of funding for local MSLCs. Whilst the MSLC in Cambridge is currently funded, the MSLCs at The Parks and at The Queen Elizabeth Hospital, receive no funding.

Sandie Smith Chief Executive of Healthwatch Cambridgeshire said "Our job is to make sure that local people can have a say on local health & care services. This is not just a local but a national issue that I think we were the first Healthwatch to spot."

"We want all new and potential parents to have the same opportunity to get involved in developing maternity services, which is not currently the case for people living in wider Cambridgeshire."

"We have asked Cambridgeshire & Peterborough CCG to look at this issue locally"

"We have also raised it nationally with Healthwatch England to look at why MSLCs have been left in this precarious position and what measures will be put in place to make sure that new and potential parents can have their say."

The Influence of Furniture on Love Exhibition: 14 September – 2 November 2014, Monday-Sunday 12-5pm

The Influence of Furniture on Love is an



exhibition in Wysing Arts Centre's 17th century farmhouse. The title of the exhibition is taken from an unpublished essay by economist John Maynard Keynes entitled "Can we consume our surplus or the influence of furniture on love" (1909), a handwritten copy of which is held in the archives of King's College at the University of Cambridge. In the essay, Keynes discusses whether it is possible for the rooms within which we live to "suggest to us thoughts and feelings and occupations?" Wysing's Grade II Listed farmhouse, which was built in the

early 17th century reputedly from timbers of ships salvaged from the sinking of the Spanish Armada in 1588, has hosted many hundreds of artists since the organisation was founded twenty five years ago. The farmhouse is where artists live, sleep and eat, and where together they discuss the works that they are developing during residencies and retreats. Wysing has invited artist Giles Round, working with Wysing Curator Lotte Juul Petersen, to transform the farmhouse into a public space; installing works by a selection of artists who have stayed there over the years in its rooms. A number of the works will remain in the house as a lasting contribution to the site, for future artists to enjoy. All the artists in the exhibition have been in-residence at Wysing over the centre's 25 year history:

An Endless Supply, Ruth Beale, *Juliette Blightman*, Ben Brierley, *Céline* Condorelli, Seb Patane, Florian Roithmayr, Phil Root, Laure Prouvost, Cally Spooner, The Grantchester Pottery, Philomene Pirecki, Elizabeth Price, Mark Aerial Waller, Neal White, Lisa Wilkens To bring the intimacy of the farmhouse into the public realm, a

series of dinners, hosted by artists in the exhibition, will make public some of the ideas and discussion that usually takes place in the privacy of the farmhouse. Taking place in Wysing's gallery, the dinners will be devised by the artists and will include events, performances and screenings.

Giles Round has had a close association with Wysing since he was first in-residence at the centre in early 2011. That same year, Round established the decorative arts company The Grantchester Pottery at Wysing, with fellow residency artist Phil Root, and subsequently both The Grantchester Pottery and Round have contributed to a large number of exhibitions and events at Wysing.

Friday September 12th - Grafham a walk around the reservoir 7 miles.





Your local GP Practice - Funding Cuts

The Government have decided to reduce funding to General Practices across Cambridgeshire. This will have a huge impact on Monkfield Medical Practice and will reduce funding by 50% in 2 years.



If this happens, MMP will suffer the highest loss of any practices in Cambridgeshire, because of the formula used to calculate GP funding and our unique patient profile. Unlike other practices we are only funded for 60% of our patients.

With the assistance of the Local Medical Committee it is MMP's intention to fight this decision and put forward a case for Exceptional Funding.

In the meantime we have to do something. The Royal College of general Practitioners and the National association for Patient Participation have launched a petition- A copy of which is available at the surgery and we would urge you to sign up if you agree. MMP Building Improvement

Section 106 funding has been agreed to enhance the fabric of the building and works will commence hopefully in September this year and will last for approximately 14 weeks.

This money <u>can only be used</u> on the fabric of the building. It cannot be used to fund any increase in Clinical or administrative staff. The hope is that by reconfiguring the existing building now, that in the future (GP Practice funding permitting) more GP's/Nurse Practitioners/Nurse or other ancillary staff required can be employed to further expand the services presently provided by Monkfield Medical Practice and other Health services who use our premises on a regular basis.

This may seem contrary to many of you given that at the very time GP funding is being cut we finally get the go ahead to enhance the practice and bring it up to CQC (Care quality Commission) standards for infection prevention control.



Free Dog Goodies

On the day advice will focus on positive reinforcement of good dog behaviour using treats and play. However, we also want to highlight a serious issue – dog fouling, we understand that the majority of dog owners do pick up but a minority are spoiling our green spaces.

Why is dog fouling a problem?

Dog fouling is not only unpleasant it is dangerous. The biggest threat to public health from dog excrement is toxocariasis.

What is Toxocariasis?

Toxocariasis is an infection of the roundworm toxocaracanis. The eggs of the parasite can be found in soil or sand contaminated with faeces and if swallowed, result in infection that lasts between six and 24 months. Symptoms include eye disorders, vague ache, dizziness, nausea, asthma and, in

extremely rare cases, seizures/fits. Toxocariasis most commonly affects children between 18 months and 5 years.

Whose responsibility is it to clear away dog fouling? It is the responsibility of the dog owner or the person in charge of the dog to clear up any dog foul left by their dog. If you fail to clean up after your dog you can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice, or if the case goes to court a fine of up to £1,000. The regulations state specifically, that being unaware that the dog has fouled, or not having a suitable means of removing the faeces is not a reasonable excuse for failing to clean up after your dog.
