FUNDRAISING EVENTS

Everyone Active's Cambourne Fitness and Sports Centre has raised over £200 and donated over 100 toys and food items for sick children and people in crisis this Christmas, following a series of fundraising events. The events included a Christmas food bank, in association with the Godmanchester Baptist Church for the Trussell Trust, a toy box appeal for the Sick Children's Trust and a Christmas jumper day for colleagues on 12th December 2014, which saw thousands of people across the UK donate £2 to wear their jumper and help raise funds for Save the Children.

The centre made their own donations to the charitable causes, by contributing $\pounds 1.00$ for every toy that was donated for the Toy Box Appeal. The centre's general manager, Shane Railley, also personally contributed 50p for every donation made.

Shane comments: "Unfortunately, there will be thousands of people in a crisis situation this Christmas, including many children spending the day in hospital. We wanted to show our support for such worthy causes and try to help make Christmas a more enjoyable time for everyone this year.

IF YOU HAVE DIFFICULTY GETTING AROUND - UNABLE TO USE A BUS AND NO ACCESS TO A CAR Taxi Card - a little used benefit to Cambourne residents is the developer funded taxi card scheme. It gives access to a taxi at 30% of the normal fare. Buying vouchers in advance they are used in the same way as cash. The taxi company get the full fare later, not all taxis are able to offer the service but you will get a list of

participating companies. A look back at 2014

The start of the New Year is a good time to reflect back on the work of the Parish Council during 2014. Some of the work undertaken includes:

Public open spaces and play areas

Repairs were been undertaken to equipment in the Great Cambourne Play area and the Eco Park Play Area has been resurfaced and new equipment added.

Traffic matters

Following a public consultation yellow lines have been installed on Brace Dein and Lancaster Gate in the vicinity of the Vine School. The yellow lines were installed following concerns regarding children's safety during school drop off and collection times in consultation with the Vine School and the developers. The Parish Council has also worked with the developers and Cambridgeshire County Council to progress the programme of road adoptions in Cambourne.

Events

Staff

In 2014 the Parish Council took on an Apprentice Groundsman and an Apprentice Office Administrator. Both roles have provided local school leavers with an opportunity to gain a recognised qualification whilst earning with the potential for a full time role at the end of the apprenticeship period. The staff continue to update and enhance their skills by attending training courses and conferences.

Volunteers

In 2014 the Parish Council began a Volunteer Litter Picking Scheme in response to requests from members of the public. Volunteers are asked to read and sign a risk assessment and provided with a hi vis vest, a litter grabber and protective gloves. The scheme currently has 10 volunteers who litter pick in various areas of Cambourne. The introduction of the scheme has seen a dramatic reduction in the litter around Cambourne and has freed up the grounds staff time to focus on other tasks. This is just a small sample of the work undertaken by Cambourne Parish Council during 2014 and we look forward to continuing this work and rising to the challenges that 2015 will bring. John Vickery - Cambourne Parish Clerk

Early Christmas present for Jeavons Wood Primary School children as playground opens PTA funded play equipment proves welcome addition to Cambourne primary school

Friday 19th December 2014. Jeavons Wood Primary School Children were treated to an early Christmas present on their final school day of 2014. New play equipment was opened and parents and children were given their first chance to inspect the equipment and enjoy a mince pie.

Children at the school were involved with the design of the trail, which has a range of activities for 4-11 year olds, and have been eagerly following its construction in the playground. The 9 activities have been constructed on an all weather safety surface so that children will be able to use the equipment throughout the school year.

The play equipment has been funded by the Jeavons Wood School PTA who have been fundraising since the school opened in 2008 in temporary buildings. Just under 400 pupils attend the school, which is now settled into its permanent purpose-built site on Eastgate in Great Cambourne.

"Raising the money for the Trim Trial was a huge undertaking and it's great to finally see the benefit of everyone's hard work! It shows what a great community and supportive parents we have at Jeavons Wood." Commented Emma Williamson co-chair of the PTA.

"The Children are very excited about their new play equipment" said Sue Wright Acting Head Teacher. "The project shows the pride and dedication that children, parents and teachers have in our school community and I am delighted to see this new addition to our excellent facilities".

Letter to Everyone Active Cambourne

I write to raise concerns regarding the management of the above facility and recent corporate Facebook posts/comments.

Like many Cambourne residents I am very pleased to have such a high quality facility provided by our Parish Council, however, as the accountable officer for the company who administrates this facility on behalf of the Parish Council I would ask that you review the following matters, I am copying this letter to the Parish Council and would request that any response is also copied in this way.

1. Christmas and New Year Opening Hours The opening hours for the festive period have recently been posted on the facilities facebook page. For many users of the facility 24 December, 29 December, 30 December and 31 December are normal working days but the opening times of the facility preclude use of the facility in any form. I can understand the desire to keep costs to a minimum with regard to staffing costs on a bank holiday but the above days are not bank holidays. The centre is also closed on 27 December which is not a festive day or public holiday so I can not understand the logic of closing on this day. - Name and address provided.



Update for the Petition Reinstate a Dog Warden

76 Signatures (some voicing their views) has now been submitted to the South Cambridgeshire Council Offices. As we all know it has been an on going issue for some time now regarding out of control dogs and dog fouling in Cambourne. Some of us are responsible dog owners, keep our dogs under control and clean after them. Unfortunately there is a minority that don't, therefore spoil it for the rest of the community. - Name and address provided.

If any one would like to update themselves on the new dogs laws they can be found on gov.uk under keeping your dog under control in public.

Out of control - Your dog is considered dangerously out of control if it injures someone or makes someone worried that it might injure them.

A court could also decide that your dog is dangerously out of control if:- it injures someone's animal, or the owner of the animal thinks they could be injured if they tried to stop your dog attacking their animal.

A farmer is allowed to kill your dog if it's worrying their livestock.

Penalties - You can be fined up to £20,000 or sent to prison for up to 6 months (or both) if your dog is dangerously out of control. You may not be allowed to own a dog in the future and your dog may be destroyed.

If you let your dog injure someone you can be sent to prison for up to 5 years or fined (or both). If you deliberately use your dog to injure someone you could be charged with 'malicious wounding'.

If you allow your dog to kill someone you can be sent to prison for up to 14 years or get an unlimited fine (or both).

If you allow your dog to injure a guide dog you can be sent to prison for up to 3 years or fined (or both).

Peacehaven International Playgroup and



Cambourne Ladies International Club

Cambourne Ladies International Club and later Peacehaven International Playgroup has been a great success. Since its inception in 2010 it has striven for excellence in meeting a need in the varied community here in Cambourne. Its founder Laura Bangs wanted a place for people of various nationalities to be able to meet and for the parents and children to be able to socialize in an environment specifically designed to welcome all parents and particularly those who may be new to the country. First, it was more of a coffee morning for mothers who could have the children play in a decent place and be able to hold an adult conversation with mothers in a similar position. As at times it is easier to have the child play with other children than for you to be the sole focus of attention. As a mother of a young child herself and not being native to England, Laura worked with others and was able to see many folks come together that may not have met without this group.

As time went by, a simple playgroup developed naturally its own focus. As Laura was an art teacher and our own child and others in the group had grown to school age, it adapted and a new group emerged, an after school art club.



Now Laura chose Peacehaven Baptist Church as the sponsoring entity for the new group as we were already an established name in the community. The group was able to get many grants over the years to assist in the effort, including from the Cambourne Crier and the district council. In a recent meeting, with one of the council workers he asked about the impact of church sponsorship had rather than direct governmental control. And the truth about it is that in many countries the people are naturally resistant to the government and distrustful because of corruption and political motivations. Because some of the people living here came from places of dictatorships and political turmoil and persecution. And the local church was often the spiritual and social heart of

the community, so people from those nations were more likely to respond to outreach on the local level from a church organized playgroup than a state led one. With the people in attendance over the years representing a truly global mix of nationalities and languages, it was great to see them integrate as a group and focus on a universal subject of helping the children. However, as is often the case, failing health and other concerns meant Laura could not continue with the large commitment of time and energy and as there was no suitable replacement for leadership, the groups had to close. We would like to thank those involved with these groups for your efforts and wish you all a Happy New Year.

Of course, if they feel you do need to see a GP they would advise you to do so. With your help in this way we can make sure that appointments are available for those who really need them.

The NHS Friends and Family Test

The NHS Friends and family test is a way of gathering your feedback so we can continually review our service. It is based on one simple question "How likely are you to recommend our GP practice to friends and family if they needed similar care?" Your feedback will help us learn more about what you think about your experience – what you like and what you think we could improve. The feedback forms are available in reception with a box to post it in once completed. Data will be published monthly on our website and within the practice.

Monkfield Park



Primary School and Care & Learning Centre

This term we have implemented the new National Curriculum across the school which has seen the children encounter some new and exciting topics. The end of term always provides us with time for reflection and to think about the memorable learning opportunities we have experienced and the many successes and achievements we have enjoyed.

The children from our fantastic Reception classes took part in an Autumnal walk around the school grounds to collect all manner of natural objects. Some of these included fruit, pine cones and leaves of different shapes, sizes and colours. The learning didn't stop there, however. The children used their collection of objects to sort them into groups, depending upon their properties as part of the maths learning back in class.

Year 2 have had a fantastic time with the chicks and have used these to inspire their learning. How a fossil is formed

First the organism dies and sinks to the bottom of the sea. Then the flesh decays and the bit that decays is the fatty bit. (Oliver)

The skin decays or gets eaten by small creatures. Only the bones are left. (Charlie)

After, sediment starts to cover the skeleton but some bones are still exposed. The skeleton starts to get more covered by different layers of sediment. The sediment is starting to cover all the bones. All over the skeleton is covered and the sediment is starting to flatten the bones. The sediment is made out of lots of mud and sand. The sediment starts to turn to stone. (Jessica) Gradually the sediment compresses down. There is some little streams called ground water and it washes all the bones away and the little pieces of stone replaces all the bones of the skeleton. (McKenna)

The mould gradually gets filled with rock. The skeleton compresses even more and is now a fossil. (Sara)

Finally the fossil rises up to the surface, it can be caused by an earthquake or a newly formed mountain. (Rebecca)
