

Cambourne Choir Crosses Borders in Lockdown!



In July, the Cambourne Community Gospel Choir rose above the restrictions of social distancing, to create two on-line group recordings - one of them an international co-production with a choir in Rwanda.

"It was always my ambition to record something this year" said musical director Steve Gaze. "Ironically, it's the limitations of Covid that have made this incredible project possible. It would never have happened otherwise." Cambourne Community Gospel Choir initially created their own arrangement of "Lord I Lift Your Name on High" with each choir member recording their own part individually, along to a guide track provided by Steve. Steve then combined them, adding the band and a guest saxophonist, again recorded separately.

Finally, the music was put into a video featuring stills of the group's previous performances.

The second venture quickly followed,

involving a collaboration with The Prince of Peace Choir from Kigali, Rwanda, with whom the choir had met and sung with when they visited the UK last year.

Cambourne Community Gospel Choir recorded the choruses of "Siyabonga" (a song in English and Zulu), as well as learning to sing in Rwandan in just three days, for another section of the piece.

The Rwandan choir, having some semi-professional musicians and in a less restrictive lockdown, were in charge of the verses and the accompanying instruments. The whole project was turned around within 2-3 weeks from the outset! The resulting recording, and accompanying video, was circulated to all the Anglican churches in the Diocese of Ely.

Cambourne Food Market

We have made the decision to go ahead with the Cambourne Food Market in line with government guidance. The event will take place on

Bank Holiday Monday 31st August at the Hub Community Centre car park. We will be joined by a variety of street food vendors and market traders from 12pm until 4pm. Social distancing must be adhered to. We will be monitoring the number of people coming in and out of the car park to ensure it is possible to social distance. There will be no seating areas and we ask that all food and drink be consumed at home or at a nearby open space. A list of the traders attending will be published on the Town Council Facebook page and website.

Using playgrounds and outdoor gym equipment safely

As of Saturday 4th July, playgrounds and outdoor gym equipment were re-opened for use. To help prevent the spread of Covid-19, please follow the guidance below:

Playgrounds

Where possible, 1 adult to accompany 1 child (we appreciate this cannot be possible for single parents, or if you have more than 2 children)

Social distancing of at least 2 metres must be maintained from people outside of your household. At least 1 metre+ for equipment where it is not possible, such as the swings.

One child on equipment at a time

Please refrain from eating and drinking in the playground

Parents/carers: we advise bringing hand sanitiser or wipes to clean children's hands after using equipment

Avoid touching your face. Cough and sneeze into a tissue and dispose of in a

litter bin. Use your elbow if you don't have a tissue.

Litter must be disposed of in a bin or taken home

Outdoor gyms

Social distancing of at least 2 metres must be maintained between people outside of your household. At least 1 metre+ for equipment where this is not possible.

Please bring a towel and hygiene products to wipe down equipment before and after use

Avoid touching your face. Cough and sneeze into a tissue and dispose of in a litter bin. Use your elbow if you don't have a tissue.

Please refrain from eating and drinking near equipment

Litter must be disposed of in a bin or taken home

For both playgrounds and outdoor gym equipment, we ask that users apply common sense. If you feel a facility is at capacity, wait until people have left or return later on.

Exercising and socialising safely around Cambourne

The Government advice changes regularly , particularly on what we can and cannot do. At the time of writing, outdoor exercise and socialising remains as:

Ensuring there is at least a 2 metre gap when walking by people, exercising with others or when meeting people outside of your household to socialise.

You can meet in a group of up to 6 people from different households or 2 households can meet (for example: 2x families of 4).

We know that many people will already be adhering to the guidance and the Town Council thanks you for your efforts.

Cambourne volunteers continue to help those in need

South Cambridgeshire MP Anthony Browne spent Saturday morning of June 27th meeting with the Cambourne Volunteer Task Force (CVTF), who have come together from across



Cambourne to assist those in the community.

Anthony was given insight into what the group have been doing since the pandemic began. He also helped deliver some food packages and spoke to some of the recipients about how lockdown has been for them, as well as finding out how important this voluntary support is to them.

The volunteering group has been running for the last four months and has over 75 volunteers. CVTF includes members from Cambourne Crescent, Cambourne Church, the Town Councillors, community groups, local supermarkets and residents. Over the last 4 months, volunteers have served over 600 requests from Cambourne and neighbouring villages. Many food parcels are delivered weekly. CVTF also offers grocery



deliveries, prescription collection for anyone self-isolating or shielding. The volunteering group started with a mission to not neglect anyone who is in need, especially the elderly and vulnerable in Cambourne. The team of volunteers has continued to ensure that they are there for anyone who needs them.

CVTF's most challenging and important task has been the preparation and delivery of food parcels to residents in Cambourne and its surrounding villages. Currently they are delivering around 70 bags of food each week. This effort is massively supported by Morrisons through their weekly corporate donations. Thanks to Vanessa Williams and the store manager Michael laonnou in particular, CVTF has been a major recipient of these donations. The donations have gone a long way towards sustaining the volunteers' efforts and fulfilling the increasing demand.

CVTF are also grateful for the help of many other staff members including Tom and Luke (pictured below) who were instrumental in facilitating CVTF collections. In addition, Morrisons kept the donations trolley for people to contribute within easy access.

Morrisons has also been helpful in putting up CVTF signs for those in need to reach out. Lately, they have also been preparing donation packs with the food items most needed for food parcels for people to buy and donate. Thanks to the efforts of Morrisons staff, people know they are donating the right items.



Morrisons has also taken other steps to help the community. In the early days of lock-down, when certain items were difficult to obtain, Morrisons managed this by putting limits on the number of items people could buy in a single shopping transaction. These restrictions were lifted as soon as supply matched demand. The hour immediately after store opening was also reserved for NHS staff to help our heroes and heroines at the heart of the battle against Covid-19.

As we emerge from lockdown we must once again begin to look ahead to Christmas and resume our fundraising efforts to ensure that our great town sparkles with lights giving hope, joy and positivity as we end a difficult year.

In case you didn't know, Light Up Cambourne is a voluntary committee of Cambourne residents who love Christmas and we make it our business to think about the festive season all year round! We are the people who bring you the beautiful lights adorning the trees in Great Cambourne and organise a memorable switch on event outside Morrisons at the end of November every year.



We are small group of less than a dozen but everyone works hard and dedicates their time to ensure that we've raised enough money to allow us to bring a little festive cheer at the end of every year. We are also lucky to be supported by Cambourne Town Council whose excellent ground staff dress the trees with the lights each year.

Under normal circumstances, we need to raise £7,000 annually to cover the cost of the lights and the hosting of a switch on event. This money is raised through fundraising events which we usually hold at the Hub every few months and at the annual Cambourne Fete.

Whether we are able to host our traditional switch on event this year remains undecided due to the restrictions around public gatherings due to COVID-19 but we are still committed to lighting up Cambourne as usual.

Before our world got turned upside down, we kicked off our 2020 fundraising drive with an extremely successful Murder Mystery evening in partnership with our friends at Strictly Murder. The night was a sell-out and a great evening was had by all. We look forward to doing it all over again early next year. This event on it's own raised £1,000 towards our total so it was a great way to kick off the year. Sadly our planned Bingo and Quiz nights for

March and May had to be cancelled. Since then, we are now able to take stock and consider more ways of fundraising for the remainder of this year; and we are following the advice closely and hope to be able to reinstate these events in the coming months, along with being creative in coming up with new ideas. One of those new ideas is to hold a Cambourne-wide Garage sale! We know many of you have had time to have a clear-out over the past few lockdown months and so may be looking at ways to sell on your items, particularly as charity shops may not all be accepting donations as yet, you are wary of visiting them or self-isolating. Participating sellers would set up stalls on their driveways or their front gardens on the weekend of 22nd August. Light Up Cambourne would coordinate and publicise the locations of all of these stalls in order for buyers to be able to find you. In return we ask for a donation to our fundraising efforts for being involved.

Rather than a traditional car boot, this would be COVID-secure as it's not encouraging large groups to congregate in one locale and it is outdoors. Sellers can trade whatever they wish and also, more easily accept payment by contactless or card using a card reader device connected to their home Wi-Fi. If we get enough interested sellers we will hold the event over two days across different parts of the town.

Healthwatch is the independent champion for people who use health and social care services. The sole purpose of Healthwatch is to understand the needs, experiences and concerns of people who use health and social care services and to speak on their behalf.

Healthwatch is keen to ensure everyone can get access to Health and Social Care Services when required and feeds back on both good standards and also where standards need improvement.

The NHS published its 'Long Term Plan' in January 2019, setting out its key ambitions over the next 10 years.

The top issues people told us they wanted

Improving Transport Infrastructure

Transport continues to be high on my priority list and lockdown hasn't stopped me from putting Cambourne's case forward. In fact I have been in contact with a Minister very recently.

Work continues towards getting a train station placed to the North of Cambourne, as well as a fast, reliable bus route which blends seamlessly with the planned route for the CAM metro.

It would be remiss to spend more public money adapting or rebuilding when we could do it right the first time.

I truly believe a holistic overview of our area and clear transport governance is the only way of

- services to focus on were:
- easier access to GPs
- more information and support to stay well
- care closer to home
- not to be digitally excluded

Since lockdown and the Covid-19 pandemic Healthwatch has extended its interest to include access to care during lockdown, particularly for people with long term or serious conditions which require regular medical treatments.

This doesn't mean stopping or delaying anything, it simply means all transport streams working together.

With this in mind, I am joining colleagues to push once again for more slip roads at the Girton Interchange - not quite "all access" but the plans being put forward would enable Cambourne residents to come directly off the M11 onto the A428 and also access the M11 from the A428 relatively simply. I hope you agree that would be hugely better than our current standstill on Madingley Hill!

Irritable Bowel **Syndrome**

Irritable bowel syndrome (IBS) is a common, long-term condition affecting the digestive

system. Common symptoms of IBS are abdominal pain and cramping (often relieved by having a poo), changes in bowel habit (diarrhoea, constipation or both), bloating and excessive wind (flatulence). Symptoms may have a significant impact on quality of life and therefore can affect mood. As stress can trigger IBS this can lead to a vicious cycle. Diet is often a significant factor. Keeping a food and drink diary may help identify individual triggers. High levels of insoluble fibre such as bran, nuts, fruit and vegetable seeds and

skins can make symptoms worse and these foods may need to be reduced to a manageable level. Factors that can generally help IBS symptoms include eating regularly, drinking plenty of water, exercising and taking time to relax and reduce stress if needed. Cutting down caffeine, fizzy drinks, alcohol and processed foods can also help. If you develop IBS type symptoms for more than a few weeks it is important to discuss this with a healthcare professional. There are many things that can be done to manage symptoms and some other medical conditions may need excluding. This is particularly the case if you develop persistent looser poo, pass blood in your poo or are losing weight without an obvious reason. New Government Assistance for All Businesses

The Government's 'Plan for Jobs 2020'

The Government has announced a range of new initiatives in its new 'Plan for Jobs 2020'.

Job Retention Bonus

This is a one-off payment to employers that have used the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme (CJRS), of £1,000 for each furloughed employee who remains continuously employed until 31 January 2021.

KickStart Scheme

The Kickstart Scheme will create high quality 6 month work placements aimed at those aged 16-24 who are on Universal Credit and are deemed to be at risk of long-term unemployment. Funding available for each job will cover 100% of the relevant National Minimum Wage for 25 hours a week.

Traineeships

Additional funding will be provided this year for traineeships, to fund high quality work placements and training for 16-24 year olds. The Government will fund employers who provide trainees with work experience, at a rate of \pounds 1,000 per trainee.

Apprenticeships

There will be a new payment of $\pounds 2,000$ to employers in England for each new apprentice they hire aged under 25, and a $\pounds 1,500$ payment for each new apprentice they hire aged 25 and over, from 1 August 2020 to 31 January 2021.

Form the Future.

Sector-based work academy placements

There will be additional funding this year to triple the number of sector-based work academy placements in England in order to provide vocational training and guaranteed interviews for more people, helping them gain the skills needed for the jobs available in their local area.

Careers advice

An additional £32 million will be provided over the next 2 years for the National Careers Service so that 269,000 more people in England can receive personalised advice on training and work. Supporting unemployed workers into jobs

Additional Department of Work and PensionsSupport

The Government will expand and increase the intensive support offered by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) to young jobseekers, to include all those aged 18-24 in the Intensive Work Search group in Universal Credit.

Work and Health Programmes

£95 million will be provided this year to expand the scope of the Work and Health Programme to introduce additional voluntary support in the autumn for those on benefits that have been unemployed for more than 3 months.

Green Homes Grant

The Government will introduce a Green Homes Grant, providing at least $\pounds 2$ for every $\pounds 1$ homeowners and landlords spend to make their homes more energy efficient, up to $\pounds 5,000$ per household.

Temporary Stamp Duty Land Tax (SDLT) Cut

The Government will temporarily increase the Nil Rate Band of Residential SDLT from £125,000 to £500,000. This will apply from 8 July 2020 until 31 March 2021

Eat Out to Help Out

The Government will introduce the Eat Out to Help Out scheme to encourage people to return to eating out. This will entitle every diner to a 50% discount of up to £10 per head on their meal, at any participating restaurant, café, pub or other eligible food service establishment. The discount can be used unlimited times and will be valid Monday to Wednesday on any eat-in meal (including on non-alcoholic drinks) for the entire month of August 2020 across the UK. Participating establishments will be fully reimbursed for the 50% discount. Businesses that want to take part in the scheme will have to register through a website that opens on Monday 13 July.

Temporary VAT cut for food and non-alcoholic drinks

Temporary VAT cut for accommodation and attractions

From 15 July 2020 to 12 January 2021, to support businesses and jobs, the reduced (5%) rate of VAT will apply to supplies of accommodation and admission to attractions across the UK.

Construction Talent Retention Scheme

The Government is funding a Construction Talent Retention Scheme to support the redeployment of workers at risk of redundancy. This will help retain construction skills and match talented workers to opportunities across the UK.

Ecover Initiative

EDUCATING OTHERWISE: 'We moved from Australia in 2005 and have been a part of the Cambourne community ever since. While our children initially attended local schools we had always planned to travel with them and experience the world in a very immersive sort of way, which in part led to our decision to home educate in early 2016. We home educate our Teens focusing on "Life Skills" and while they learn the literacy and numeracy skills that all schools teach, they have taken a keen interest in Science, Technology and Art so we provide various opportunities for them to learn in these areas.

During 2017 we appeared on Channel 4's "How to Live Mortgage Free" television series, detailing our transition from "House life" to "Bus life" when we converted a London bus into an accessible tiny home. Our latest adventure "Pre Covid" was a stint house-sitting around the UK. We lived in 20 houses over about nine months, caring for 38 dogs, 10 cats, 46 chickens, 35 fish and 2 tortoises, while integrating into new communities and experiences, from high wire to skiing and rock wall climbing to indoor sky-diving. We've spent lockdown refitting our bus for an epic drive across the planet. The teens are helping prepare for the new adventure, working on the new build and getting involved in planning the trip. Mum Educates at Home



EDUCATING OTHERWISE: 'It is a choice, normally to educate at home. However, over the last few months all those of you who normally send your children to school have had to do this too.

The circumstances of our home education have changed a lot over this period of lockdown. We normally get out and about every day and do something with other home edders at least once a week. We also tend to visit nature reserves, museums and other places of interest. Over the years we have visited an active Roman Archaeological Site, Industrial Archaeological sites, Civil War Sites amongst others. We have been to the filming of the Christmas Lectures, we have been on biological field activities and geographical field activities. We have visited very many Zoos and Wild Life Reserves and learned how to scuba dive as well as going on a weekly water sports activity, where we monitor the wildlife as well as get some exercise. All of this activity has been curtailed during the last 3 months. About 4 weeks into lockdown, we decided as a family to share our home science practical class with you all on YouTube. We do this in the kitchen. This required that we learn about lighting and presenting very quickly. In addition, my son had to upskill his directing, scripting and video editing skills.

As such we have produced many practicals that you can do in your home which support the national curriculum at KS3 and 4 and will support those doing IGCSE too.

EDUCATION Children of Cambourne Shine in Science Projects

The 5th Cambourne Science Festival turned global with 125 projects which children submitted. It has been renamed, 'Global Cambridge Science Festival' (Virtual) and has earned accolades from all over the world. The simple projects addressed complex theories and problems, encouraging many to start experimenting at home. Due to the huge demand, organisers had to conduct a second 'Global Cambridge Science Festival' on 6th June to accommodate 40 more projects. The total duration of the combined events was 11 hours.

More than 250 visitors logged in to observe and assess the projects. Expert comments were received from Dr. Sudhakaran Prabhakaran (University of Cambridge), Anthony Browne, MP, Prof. Anil Gupta, (National Innovation Foundation, India), Mark Howell (Cambs County Councillor), and Dr. Christos Papavassiliou, (Imperial College London).

The event was organised by the local charity CamCare UK, supported by Cadence Design Systems and MediaTek and CFRS UK.

CERC: More than 30 children up to age 14 of the Cambourne



Electronics and Robotics Club (CERC) participated in a project organised by the European Space Agency (ESA) Astro-Pi Mission Zero. 6350 teams comprising students and young people from 25 countries had their Mission Zero programs run on the Astro Pi computers onboard the International Space Station (ISS). Teams wrote simple programs to display their message to the astronauts onboard. Each participant received a special certificate from ESA signed by an astronaut confirming the successful run of the program and stating the location of ISS when the program was run.

The entries from Cambourne were supervised by Mr. Andy Fell, a Senior Consultant at TTP. The tutor of the club, Dr. Sujit Bhattacharya, who previously worked with Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) and European Space Agency (ESA) said, "We are proud of the children who have sent their codes at such a young age to the astronauts onboard the ISS and congratulations to all the teams for their collaborative efforts."For more information about the Global Cambridge Science Festival and ESA Astro-Pi Mission Zero and for children interested in participating in future science projects, contact Cllr. A number of the families set up amazing tea parties in their houses and gardens and made their own tiger guest.

Year 1 sewed pictures to tell the story of 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. Making bird nests was also great fun! Year 2 did lots of learning using objects that they found around the house. In Maths they counted pairs of socks, made

tally charts of objects found in the kitchen and practised their counting going up and down the stairs. In Year 3 DT included designing Pizzas and in history they learnt about Egyptians with some pupils having their own Egyptian day at home. In June, Year 4 had a fortnight where their focus was on wildlife and being outdoors. Their activities involved making a wildlife habitat in the garden, writing a persuasive leaflet about protecting wildlife, looking for shapes and angles in nature as well as creating natural sculptures inspired by Andy Goldsworthy. The remote Mini Olympics was great too. Designing Anderson Shelters, paper aeroplanes, smoothies and creating Manga drawings was just some of the topics in Year 5. Year 6 enjoyed their Marble Run DT project, recently studying "Twelfth Night" and preparing their leaving song.

There have been lots of competitions, engaging the children with designing book covers, solving problems and writing stories. We discovered that The Vine website has been truly International during this time with visitors from every continent including our link school in Kenya, a bilingual school in Italy and a Spanish Catholic school which has been directing their parents and teachers to our Remote School Pages to support their pupils. Well done to all our families! You have been truly amazing through these unusual times.

(That said, Year 10 were less-thandelighted at being provided with individual packs of traditionally-printed test papers for their usual end-of-year exams week!)

Cambourne West - Work Begins



Roads are already taking shape - looking east towards Cambourne Village College from the A1198

The cones are up, the diggers are out and kerbstones are going into place the work on Cambourne West has well and truly started! The £240 million development which will eventually add 2,350 homes to the Cambourne area is underway People travelling to Cambourne Village College will be well aware of the works on Sheepfold Lane, which are set to continue until next April. This is to provide new infrastructure, including a gas pipeline, to the North East access to Cambourne West. The road is also being re-routed where Sheepfold Lane currently turns left towards the school. Developers ECL have engaged with the school and the Town Council to identify a two week period in the school holidays where the road can be rebuilt with minimum disruption, during which time a temporary road will be provided to maintain access.

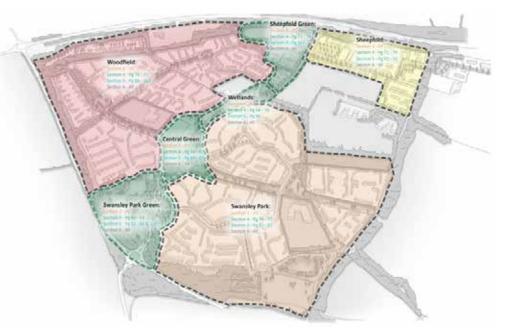
Planning approval was granted in June for the work to begin on the first 200 homes. This gives the green light for phase one of the initial development which will eventually total 783 homes in the area which will be known as Sheepfold. During this phase they will also make a start on the Swansley Park area. The first 200 homes will include 61

affordable properties comprising both shared ownership and rented homes.

Cambourne West is a joint venture between The Vistry Group, Taylor Wimpey and housing association Metropolitan Thames Valley Housing. The Vistry Group, previously known as Bovis Homes, also includes the recently acquired Linden Homes.

Properties will range from one-bed apartments to five-bed houses. As part of

it's section 106 financial contributions, Vistry, will also spend more than £15 million on community facilities and improvements, including a community centre, sports pitches and allotments. £9million of that total will go towards education, including two new primary schools and an extension to Cambourne Village College.

Gunfire erupted around me as I dove under the wire. Crawling through, I got a mouthful of sand and a good look at the bottom of the boots of the guy in front. We cleared the section and made a dash for the water. I knew I had to get as far as I could across this, so I grabbed the rope and swung for all I was worth. I did well, not only clearing the water but was airborne passing over the soft sandy landing zone. I landed on the hard pavement beyond, but I hit the ground running and I did not stop.

Now it has been many years since that time and most of the uniform won't fit. But the lessons I learned have stayed with me. One of them is to avoid eating sand, another one being when it is time to move, do it with determination. There may be barriers or obstacles in the way. 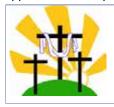

Two French pleasures to brighten your summer



ANCHOVY DIP: Ingredients - 60g Anchovy fillets and oil, 2 cloves garlic, 1 medium red onion, 2 tbsp red wine vinegar, 1 large tbsp of parsley and black pepper to taste. To make the dip put all the ingredients into a food processor (except for the oil and pepper), and blend. Gradually pour the oil in until it forms a thick sauce. Add pepper as needed to taste.

This can also be done with a mortar and pestle crushing all the ingredients and then adding oil to thicken and pepper to taste. Chill for at least 30 minutes in the fridge. Serve with crudites and slices of grilled or toasted slice bread.



TAPENADE DIP: Ingredients - 1 clove of garlic, juice of 1 lemon, 3 tbsp of capers, 6 anchovy fillets, 250g of black olives, 4 tbsp of chopped parsley, 4 tbsp of olive oil and salt and pepper to taste.

To make a rough textured tapenade simply mix all the ingredients together; add enough olive oil to form a paste while mashing with a fork or potato masher. For a smoother texture, tip the garlic, lemon juice, capers and anchovy into a food processor and process for about 10 seconds. Add the olives and parsley and gradually the olive oil to make a paste.

Residents urged to keep caring by binning face coverings and PPE correctly

People in Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire are being asked to make sure disposable face coverings and masks are put in their black wheelie bins at home, to help control the spread of Coronavirus.

Masks and gloves cannot be recycled -please put in your general waste bin The Greater Cambridge Shared Waste Service, a partnership between Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire District councils, is expecting a rise in disposable face coverings in waste collections as they become mandatory in shops from today (Friday 24 July).

The service has already seen disposable PPE such as face coverings, masks and gloves in the blue recycling bins, despite none of these items being recyclable.

With a rise in use expected over the coming weeks, waste bosses are urging

people to keep caring by disposing of the items correctly, which will help ensure recycling is not contaminated and control the spread of the virus.

Disposable PPE can be put in litter bins outside of shops, but if there isn't one they need to be taken home and put in the black bin.

Advice has been published on the Government's website, and it is important to remember that if you are suffering from Coronavirus symptoms, any medical waste and PPE should be bagged separately and left for three days before going into your black bin.

The councillor responsible for waste, said: "Face coverings are mandatory in shops from today so this is a timely reminder that we all need to do our bit to ensure we dispose of them properly. Washable cloth face coverings are more environmentally friendly than disposable ones, which cannot be recycled and end up in landfill. We have already seen disposable masks in our blue bins and we want to avoid a rise in their usage over the weeks ahead – which could mean recycling becomes contaminated. If we all do our bit, we can keep caring for one another and our environment too."
