Covid Testing for some at the Hub

Rapid result testing for key workers begins in South Cambridgeshire

Residents who are key workers or cannot work from home are being urged to have regular rapid result tests to help track cases of Coronavirus and drive down transmission rates. Sites have been set up across the county offering rapid result tests to people aged 18 and over who have no symptoms of Coronavirus, including The Hub, High Street, Cambourne.

Tests will be offered from the week commencing 1 February, 8am to 8pm. People are being urged to take tests twice a week.

Around one in three people who are infected with Covid-19 have no symptoms and could be spreading the disease without knowing it. Broadening testing to identify key workers showing no symptoms will mean finding positive cases more quickly, which helps break chains of transmission.

To book a test visit www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/rapidtesting. Dr Liz Robin, Director of Public Health for Cambridgeshire, said: "We not only need people to have these tests regularly if they are leaving home for work, we also need them to act responsibly when they get their result. If you test positive, please isolate at home with other members of your household and ask for help if you need it. There is lots we can do to help you to self-isolate, including offering grants to those who will struggle financially or help with accessing food shopping, fetching medicines and so on."

The NHS Test and Trace Service will also get in touch with you to offer advice and ask about contacts. If you test negative, please continue to follow national guidance and limit all nonessential contact with others. While the rapid test identifies many people with the virus it doesn't identify everyone - so following the lockdown rules and other Covid-safe behaviours is essential even if you have a negative test."

The process of taking a test takes on average 15 minutes from arrival to departure. Results are known within an hour. People with symptoms will not be tested at the rapid testing sites. Anyone with one or more of these symptoms - a high temperature, a new, continuous cough, or a loss or change to sense of smell or taste - should book a test at nhs.uk/coronavirus or by calling 119.

National Lockdown - Town Council update

Following the Prime Minister's statement on Monday 4th January and the government's instructions on staying at home and away from others, the Town Council has closed the following facilities:

" The Hub Community Centre (except for essential services allowed to continue)

" The Blue Space (except for essential services allowed to continue)

" Sports, Cricket and Bowls Pavilion (except for essential services allowed to continue)

' 3G, MUGA and Sports Pitches

- " Outdoor gym and Trim trail
- " Skatepark
- " Basketball court

" Tennis Courts (including Monkfield Lane)

The Council will reopen these venues as soon as the restrictions allow.

Playgrounds will remain open unless the Government enforces them to close.

A reminder that you can exercise in a public outdoor place:

- By yourself
- " With the people you live with

" With your support bubble (if you are legally permitted to form one)

" In a childcare bubble where providing childcare

" Or, when on your own, with 1 person from another household

Budget 2021 - 2022

Cambourne Town Council has to consider the budget for the next financial year and submit it to the District Council at the end of January each year. This has been even harder this year due to the effects of Covid-19. The Council has had to close all of its facilities throughout most of the year this has meant there had been a deficit of approximately £76,000 since 1st March 2020. The Town Council was able to get a £50,000 grant from South Cambridgeshire District Council under the parish support scheme.

As such, the Council has to consider carefully how it spends money on new projects as it has an impact on the Town precept.

When considering the budget for 2020 to 2021, it was apparent that if the Council wanted to maintain the current service level and budget for inflation, a pedestrian crossing, additional funds for the replacement of the skatepark, contribute the final funding for a 20mph speed limit in Cambourne and take account of the deficit over the last financial year and potential reduced income in 2021-2022, the Council would have to look at increasing the current Band D.

The budget includes the construction of the Youth Building and the first floor of The Hub both of these are funded by grants and s106 monies that have to be spent on these projects or be refunded to the developer or grant making body.

After reviewing the above considerations, it has had to increase the Band D point by 3% to £143.23, and increase of £4.14 per year (34.5p/month). Therefore, Cambourne Town Council will be levying a precept of £551,700.00 on South Cambs District Council.

Setting the Band D rate at £143.23 will allow the Town Council to continue to maintain and improve the level of service it provides for the community.

East West Rail Survey

The East West Rail project will create a direct route from Oxford to Cambridge with a station near Cambourne. Although the exact location hasn't yet been decided, below is a map of their preferred corridor showing a station to the south of Cambourne. Cambourne Town Council (CTC) is arguing for the station to be sited north of Cambourne, directly accessing the A428, not shattering our Country Park haven or generating unsustainable traffic on our surrounding roads. Wildlife Trust Cambourne Nature Reserve 2021



Cambourne Nature reserve might look as if it's still asleep, but the first hints that winter is not forever, are out there now. This time of year is a good time to spot catkins - the clusters of (often dangly) flowers found on tree such as willow, alder, birch and hazel. The flowers are often wind pollinated so don't look very flashy as there is no need attract bees. They can be seen on trees in early winter and start to open during January and February. There are willow trees in the wet areas of the reserve, and some of these produce furry buds which turn into yellow catkins.

The berries in the hedges have mostly been eaten by the thrushes and blackbirds now, so we'll be giving some areas a light trim soon to keep the branches from overhanging the paths too much.

If there are any other areas that need the odd bramble stem cutting back, please get in touch and we can get our super team of volunteer rangers on the case.

If you are looking to get outside with the family over half term, try the next self-guided trail which will be available via our BCN website in early February www.wildlfebcn.org/events for only a few pounds.

And the Trust run an engaging series of Wildlife Training Workshops covering a whole range of topics in the natural world to learn about, from dormice to dragonflies, bees to birdsong, there's something for everyone www.wildlifebcn.org/getinvolved/training-workshops

Project to Save Bourn Windmill

Those of you who have taken a walk over to admire the iconic Bourn Windmill since December will have noticed that its four sails have been removed. They have been stored safely. In the meantime, the buck (body of the mill) is now supported and surrounded by scaffolding.

Last year rot was found in the wooden beams that support the mill. So now a project is underway to establish the extent of the problem with an aim to eventual repair and the ultimate re-opening of the windmill.

This ancient monument is essential to preserve, as it is one of the oldest windmills in England. In fact, it is estimated to be at least 385 years old. Also, there are only around 50 of this type of open trestle post mills remaining in the UK!

The local charity Cambridge Past, Present & Future who own the mill launched a 'Save Bourn Windmill Appeal' to raise funds for this work.

Council Support for South Cambs Residents During Lockdown

Council Reminds Residents that "We are Here for You" during Latest Lockdown

As people are being urged to stay at home under new National Lockdown restrictions, South Cambridgeshire residents struggling during the pandemic are reminded of the support available to them via the District Council.

The new guidelines are that no-one should leave or be outside of their home except where necessary to shop for basic necessities for themselves or a vulnerable person, to go to work if they cannot work from home, for exercise within a household or support bubble, or for medical assistance or to avoid injury, illness or risk of harm. Those in eligible sectors can also attend education or childcare.

South Cambridgeshire District Council has a wide range of support available and details of how to seek help, especially for those in the vulnerable, elderly or clinically extremely vulnerable categories.

The Council is supporting community organisations, parish councils and voluntary groups that are helping local residents to get through the pandemic by assisting with food and emergency supplies, priority shopping deliveries or accessing self-isolation payments, and there is also financial help available to local businesses with Government grants that can be claimed via the Council. The Council's Sustainable Communities and Wellbeing Team is continuing to work hard organising and securing funding for free meals schemes in the community which are delivered to elderly and vulnerable residents.

They provided almost one thousand Christmas lunches to the most in-need families, vulnerable and elderly residents. So following its successful meals scheme in the summer with the C3 Church group it will soon relaunch and expand to help more households.

There is a wealth of information on the Council's website at www.scambs.gov.uk/coronavirus covering everything from information webinars, links with organisations in the voluntary sector and how to access financial or practical help.

The Council is also distributing the Government's Winter Support Grant scheme by using its £30,000 share of the grant pot allocated to the county to support local charities and community organisations. This includes:

- Cambridge Online which provides data packages or devices to children in families who currently have no internet access, enabling them to get online to learn and keep up-to-date with school work; and,

- Cambridge Council for Voluntary Service (CCVS) to whom parishes and community groups can apply for sums of up to £500 for local projects to provide food, fuel and essential supplies.

Time to Talk -Challenging Mental Health Stigma

Time to Talk Day is in February this year. Time to Talk is part of the Time to Change charity which promotes good mental health and challenges stigma and discrimination. Many people with mental health conditions report that they are misunderstood, ignored and sometimes verbally abused because of their condition. Sadly this can lead to delays in getting support and can worsen isolation. It can also impact on relationships and employment. Time to Talk Day highlights an opportunity to talk about mental health and suggests that small conversations can make a big difference.

More of us than ever are at risk of struggling with our mental health. Even though we might not be able to meet in the ways we used to, finding any way of communicating is better than nothing, particularly if we take time to ask after each other's wellbeing and take time to listen. The stigma will only ever be broken down if we recognise that, like physical health, we all have mental health which may be better or worse at different times in our lives. Although we can never fully understand how someone else is feeling, we can take time to listen to one another and make talking about mental health an ordinary part of our conversation.

During the first two weeks of December Cambourne Church was a regional drop off location for the Samaritan's Purse UK Operation Christmas Child Appeal. On the 15th December, 16 crates of packed shoeboxes were collected to bring joy, love and hope to children in need around the world. These shoeboxes were donated by members of the Cambourne community and other churches and groups in the surrounding villages. Concern about Footpaths in Cambourne Country Park

I am writing this as a concerned resident of Cambourne to see if anybody else concerned about the continuing deterioration of our Country Park footpaths?

In Cambourne we have great open spaces and we used to have great footpaths. Sadly they are now deteriorating extremely quickly with the onset of winter. I was informed that the maintenance of the parks is carried out by the Wildlife Trust and the Council have passed on the comments contained here, but nothing has happened.

In some places our footpaths are a complete disgrace. There are areas around Cambourne where what was a 4 foot wide gravel surfaced footpath has been turned into a 20 foot mud footpath as more and more people are having to walk off the footpath onto the surrounding grass to get out of the mud and thick puddles and of course these areas are now themselves





becoming just puddles and mud or where there are footpaths over bridges or between trees there is now just thick mud which can't be bypassed. On Crow Hill for example the footpaths are disappearing as almost no serious thought has been given to taking the surface water away from the footpaths! By the way the photographs were taken after about 5 days of dry and sunny weather. When it has rained they are much much worse.

All households understand the adage 'a stitch in time saves nine' so surely in this day and age as an initial emergency measure it would not be difficult or too expensive to have a lorry drive along whilst tipping appropriate surfacing material followed by a roller to a least remove the worst of the mud and surface water. Those of us who have houses on gravel cut-de-sacs do this every few years.

It makes one wonder if our town clerk or members of the Council ever use our footpaths?

(Editorial Note Having spoken to the town clerk he said they do not actually control the paths in the wildlife park and they are managed by the developers and wildlife organisation)

Cambourne Soul Recording Studio

Over the past few months, youth work in Cambourne has continued to adapt to the evolving needs of young people, within the guidance of the National Youth Agency.

We have been able to maintain our work with those young people who need support the most, through some groups and one-to-one support, but we've also spent time developing our recording studio space.

The recording studio had previously been housed in a metal container behind the youth centre, but the restrictions around COVID meant that this space no longer gave us the flexibility we need to run music sessions. At the same time, space has become available in the main building as we've been running much smaller groups, and so the decision was made to move the recording studio into the main building and expand its facilities. Led by one of our volunteers, we've transformed our IT room into a studio control room which can double as a rehearsal space, and are putting the finishing touches on a sound booth. As it becomes possible to run more sessions and activities in the months ahead we are looking forward to using these facilities as we create opportunities with young people to overcome disadvantage, promote inclusion and develop wellbeing.

We're very grateful to the volunteers who





give their time and energy to support our work in Cambourne - those who get involved directly with young people and those to help behind the scenes with projects like this. South Cambridgeshire District Council Urges Businesses to Apply for Lockdown Grants

Businesses in South Cambridgeshire can now apply for the latest round of Government financial help for closures through to Spring.

South Cambridgeshire District Council, which is administering the business grants, has opened applications for local businesses suffering from the most recent lockdown restrictions -Tier 4 restrictions from 26 December to 4 January, and the latest

National Lockdown. There are several different Government grants available for these

periods 1. For the Tier 4 period in South Cambridgeshire, which ran for ten days immediately after Christmas, affected businesses (including non-essential retail, leisure, personal care, sports facilities and hospitality businesses) can apply online for the LRSG (Closed) Tier 4 grant scheme. The eligibility criteria and payments are structured in a similar way to previous grants given during earlier restrictions.

2. For the National Lockdown, which started on 5th January, three new schemes are available. Businesses which applied for the Tier 4 grant do not need to re-apply but will be contacted automatically by the Council. Those which haven't applied for earlier grants should fill in an online application form.

3. The new Local Restrictions Support Grant (Closed) Addendum: 5 January onwards covers the current 42-day period

for business closures up until 31 March 2021, with one-off payments ranging from £2,001 to £4,500 depending on the rateable value of a business which must have been registered for business rates on 5 January 2021 and required by law to close.

Those receiving this grant will also be entitled to an additional one-off Closed Business Lockdown payment for the same 42-day qualifying restriction period which will range from £4,000 to £9,000 and will be paid automatically.

4. The Council is also receiving additional funding to allocate at its discretion under the Additional Restrictions Grant scheme and will make initial use of these funds to provide top-ups to those most in-need businesses in the District which are eligible for the Closed Business Lockdown Payment.

The application closure date for the new grant schemes is 31 March 2021 with final payments being made by 30 April 2021.

In the meantime, businesses can also still apply for various earlier grants via the Council website covering the following: Local Restrictions from November 5 to December 2; Christmas support payments for wet-led pubs (final applications must be received by January 31, 2021); and Tier 2 Restrictions imposed in South Cambridgeshire from December 2 to 25.
