Covid-19 test for ALL

All people now have access to a free lateral flow test twice a week. On site testing is available for adults and children over 12 (under the supervision of a parent or guardian), providing results within 30 – 40 minutes. The Hub Community Centre, Cambourne, is one of six rapid testing centres in Cambs. You can book a test at <u>www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/rapidtesting</u> or you can turn up at The Hub Community Centre between 8am and 7pm, Monday to Friday, or 9am and 5pm on Saturdays. At home testing kits are also available for collection from the test centres. Help prevent the spread of Covid-19.

Thank you, Litter Pickers!

A huge thank you to the volunteers that signed up to the litter picking scheme we advertised in our March Crier article. The recruitment had around 30 people (and counting) sign up from young primary school ages all the way up to retirees. We now have over 80 volunteer litter pickers. Already, they have made a huge impact keeping Cambourne clean and litter free and have certainly been keeping our grounds team busy with collecting up the full bags. One of the litter pickers was fed up with the bush 'decorated in dog poo bags' and very kindly removed 50 bags which frustratingly was less than 100m away from a dog poo bin. He created his own sign to direct the offender to the nearest bin and since then no bags have been found in the bush. We know most residents are responsible dog owners, but a reminder to those who clean up after their dog, to please dispose of the bags correctly by putting in the nearest dog bin or general waste bin. Summer is fast approaching, and you don't want to be looking at, or smelling warm dog poo bags on your walks around the town.

We have more litter picking equipment on order, so if you would like to become a volunteer litter picker, please email <u>community@cambourneparishcouncil.gov.uk</u> for sign up information. We are looking to organise a community litter pick in the summer. When using the village greens, play areas and open spaces in Cambourne please follow the Country Side Code:

The Countryside Code: Protect the Environment

- Take your litter home leave no trace of your visit
- Take care with BBQs (where permitted) – Do not light fires
- Always keep dogs under control and in sight
- Dog poo bag it and bin it, any public waste bin will do
- Care for nature do not cause damage or disturbance

East West Rail

East West Rail launched the second nonstatutory consultation on 31 March – 9 June. This focuses on some key areas, the one affecting Cambourne is the proposed 5 route alignment options for the section of East West Rail between Bedford and Cambridge, with an emerging preference for the 2 alignments via a station to the North of Cambourne. It also focuses on opportunities to improve the experience for customers such as better facilities both at stations and on board the train. It is in your interest to participate. We issue your books in advance to keep our staff and customers safe by reducing the contact time needed at collection. They will show on your account until you collect them and you may receive an email reminding you. If you do not wish to collect, they will still show on your account until we check them in for others to be able to order. IT Facilities: IT facilities are available by appointment only and for essential use, (i.e. applying for jobs/benefits etc) with a limit of one 45 minute appointment per day per customer.

Printing and photocopying: Please bring the correct change to drop into the coin box, 20p per page of A4 black and white and 75p per colour page.

Businesses urged to apply for Government Restart Grants



South Cambridgeshire businesses affected by the post-Christmas national lockdown can now apply online for the Government's Restart Grants.

The Restart Grants funding scheme was announced by the government on Wednesday 3 March 2021 and is designed to support businesses (including non-essential retail, leisure, personal care, sports facilities and hospitality businesses) that are predominantly reliant on delivering in-person services for the general public.

The funding scheme has two strands. Under strand one, grants of up to £6,000 will be paid to non-essential retail business premises to help them to reopen safely. Under strand two of the scheme, grants of up to £18,000 will be allocated to hospitality, accommodation, leisure, personal care and gym business premises, which may open but will be more impacted by restrictions when they do reopen. The level of grant that will be paid under both strand one and two will depend on the rateable value of the premises on Thursday 1 April 2021.

All grants require an online application form to be completed. Details of the Restart Grants and how to apply can be found on the website: Restart Grants - South Cambs District Council www.scambs.gov.uk/coronavirus-information-for-

businesses/financial-support-for-business/restart-grants The application process allows pre-payment checks to confirm scheme eligibility and to allow the appropriate level of grant to be identified. The application closure date for the Restart Grant funding scheme is Wednesday 30 June 2021 and final payments will be made by Saturday 31 July 2021.

South Cambridgeshire District Council's Business Support Team Leader, Adele Gritten said: "The latest funding of government grants will help our local business community recover from the national lockdown. Since the start of the pandemic we have allocated £34,000,000 of Government grants to 4,638 local businesses. Our staff are working incredibly hard to get this Government money to as many eligible applicants as quickly as possible. We recognise the challenges local businesses are facing and our priority is to support the recovery of our local economy as restrictions ease."

Wildlife Trust: Cambourne Nature Reserve

The Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs and Northants is pleased to be working in partnership with Comberton Village College Adult Education over the summer term – the college is contributing towards the cost of some community work so the Trust is able to offer some short informal courses at no charge.

All the courses are outdoors, in small groups, so they can be more sociable and support wellbeing, and will offer a chance for people to discuss volunteering opportunities. The courses in Cambourne are as follows:

Wild Babies: a programme of 5 sessions with activities designed for parents or carers with babies under 18 months.

Little Bugs: a programme of 5 sessions with activities for preschoolers aimed at helping parents and carers become more comfortable taking their children outdoors into nature.

Wildlife for Beginners: a series of three guided walks with a focus on identifying common wildlife.

Wildlife Strolls: a series of three guided walks enjoying whatever nature comes along.

The individual sessions will continue with Wild in the Woods family sessions on Wednesdays during school holidays, selfguided activities and other guided walks through the year. All of these have a discount for Trust members.

This time of year is busy for wildlife: hawthorn and wildlife rose is in flower in hedgerows and the yellow flowers of lesser celandine may still be in the woods. Most birds will be feeding young so it is especially important to keep to the paths and keep your dog under close control. Birds such as skylarks nest on the ground and can be easily disturbed. The Trust don't encourage people to feed swans and ducks on the lakes as it can be stressful for animals to be brought together in large numbers, especially during breeding season; and can contribute to poor water quality. Please remember that bread is not very healthy for birds, so try peas, green leaves, birdseed or rice.

Calling all passionate gardeners: spend the evening with BBC Gardener's World's Adam Frost on Thursday 20 May, 7pm-8.30pm. In an entertaining online talk about his inspirational career, Adam believes that creating your own outside space can have a beneficial effect on health and that this philosophy drives his passion for gardening. <u>www.wildlifebcn.org/events/</u>2021-05-20-evening-adam-frost-my-passion-gardening

An appeal to gardeners

Dear Garden Owners,

I am one of Cambourne's hedgehogs, recently woken up from hibernation. I would like to meet other hedgehogs that might be living in other gardens. However, it is very tricky to get from one garden to another.



What is needed are gateways, so we can get from one garden to the other without the need to

cross dangerous roads. Lots of my cousins have lost their lives. Since our hedgehog numbers are in dramatic decline, we would like your help. If you could make a passage at the bottom of your fence of about 13 x 13 cm, so we can get underneath that would be excellent. We hedgehogs travel around 1 mile each night in search for food or to find a mate.

We are great at keeping the number of slugs and snails or beetles in your garden under control, so that is great news for both of us.

Once you have made your 13 x 13cm gateway, there are other things you can do to help us:

- Leave an untidy corner in your garden: a woodpile or leaves
- Have some drinking water available (please NO milk, our tummies get very upset from it)
- We love dry dog or cat food (not fish based)
- Make your pond safe for us with a ramp, so we can get out
- Tidy up litter and netting, so we don't get stuck
- Stop using chemicals, especially slug pellets (which are poisonous for us)
- Before cutting your grass, please check we are not hidden in it
- Maybe create a hedgehog house in which we can hibernate or sleep during the day

Can you help buck the trend, let hedgehog numbers increase, and make Cambourne the best ever place for hedgehogs to live in? If you see one of us out during the daytime or injured, please contact 07505 651968 or e-mail: swcc@sheprethwildlifepark.co.uk

East-West Rail: the latest consultation

Many people have contacted me in response to East West Rail's latest public consultation. This issue is of the utmost importance to me and I am aware of the impact that EWR's proposals would have on the people of Cambourne.

This consultation raises a number of concerns, including the prospect of embankments, bridges and cuttings, new junctions, additional tracks and the separation of rural communities. I know that these issues will be very worrying for residents living near the proposed route; particularly here in Cambourne where there are two possible routes running either to the north or further south.

However, I am glad that a station to the north of Cambourne has become part of East-West Rail's emerging preference.

I know many local representatives have been involved in a push to ensure Cambourne gets the station it deserves and want to pay tribute to the involvement of the town council in particular.

Having the station to the north will be less environmentally destructive than to the South, and aligns better with the A428 transport corridor.

This is something I have been heavily involved with and it is good to see that East-West Rail can and will listen. I will be taking meetings with East-West Rail, campaign groups and parish councils over the next 10 weeks, but want to urge every resident to engage with this debate. Where do you want to catch a train?

Until 9th June, you have another opportunity to have your say on the East West Rail

proposal. Cambourne is in Project Section D and there are five shortlisted routes: two with a station to the north of Cambourne and three to the south. To see more detail and to respond to the consultation go to www.eastwestrail.co.uk

Throughout April, our MP Anthony Browne hosted a series of public meetings. At the time of writing, these events hadn't yet taken place, but my understanding is they should still be viewable on Anthony's Facebook page once you've read this column.

There also appears to be one final East West Railway public session on Section D, taking place on 11th May, 2pm-3pm. You can see the joining instructions on the East West Railway website, www.eastwestrail.co.uk

I have always been open with my views on transport for Cambourne and after attending numerous meetings over the past few years, I am still of the opinion that a station to the north of the town is the best option for us. We could create a travel hub for train, metro and bus with easy access for Cambournians as well as residents of other parishes. Having a central hub straight off the A428 would avoid the inevitable rat-run that would ensue were the station to be to the south. between Cambourne and Caxton. This is not something I would like to see happen!

May is Stroke Awareness Month

A Stroke can affect anyone at any age and happens when the blood supply to part of the brain is cut off. This can cause damage to the brain affecting how somebody can move, think or feel. The impact of a stroke depends on which part of the brain is affected and how big the damaged area is.

Strokes can have several causes, most commonly a blockage (related to fatty deposits in the blood vessels) cuts off the blood supply to part of the brain. In some cases the blockage and symptoms can be temporary - called a transient ischaemic attack or TIA. A stroke can also be caused by bleeding around the brain.

To recognise the symptoms of a stroke use the FAST test:

F - Facial weakness: can they smile? Has the mouth or eye drooped?

A - Arm weakness: can they raise both arms? S - Speech problems: can they speak clearly and understand you?

T - Time to call 999.

Although these are the most common signs of stroke there are other symptoms including sudden changes in weakness or numbness on one side, difficultly speaking, sudden change in vision, memory, confusion or sudden severe headache.

A stroke is a medical emergency and you should call 999 straight away. The quicker someone receives treatment, the better the chances for a good recovery.

Exploration through books: As a home educating family we make allowances for child-led learning, in line with our kids' individual interests, which has turned out to be very literature-based this year. The SE5 Seen as the best all round Scout being both pilot friendly and a potent fighter, it was also the aircraft preferred by many of the Aces.

The Sopwith Triplane Used to good effect by the Royal Naval Air Service on the Western Front and was in action a good year before the better known German Red Barron Tri Plane.

British, French and German aircraft and tactics were presented and video clips shown.

It was interesting that the American Air Force used mainly French Fighters, as their aircraft industry had not yet developed.

Officially a single seat aircraft was called a scout and a twoseater such as the Bristol Fighter was designated a fighter.

The Vine Inter Church Primary School recently applied to the Cambourne Crier Community Fund for assistance to set up their Community Gardening Wellbeing project.

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The Cambourne Crier Community Fund - originally set up by Roger Hume, founder of *Cambourne Crier*, has the aim of financially assisting any inclusive charitable project which will help improve the lives of the people of Cambourne.

The Community Gardening Wellbeing project will be created within the grounds of The Vine Inter Church Primary School and is open to anyone wishing to take part in gardening activities; such as propagating plants, growing fruit and vegetables and willow weaving. It is hoped that, in particular, this might benefit people suffering from Ioneliness, isolation, bereavement, depression or anxiety.

Ramadan - the month of giving

The Muslim holy month of Ramadan is one of the holiest months of the Islamic lunar calendar. It started on Tuesday 13th April. Ramadan is the 9th month of the Islamic calendar and it is a time when Muslims across the world will fast between dawn and sunset. Fasting is the fourth of the five pillars of Islam and comes just

after charity. In Floriography - the system of coded messages hidden in a bunch of flowers - the month of May is associated with the lily of the valley. Traditionally, children born in May were said to inherit this flower's qualities, which included sweetness, humility and the return of happiness.

This last quality puts one in mind of Song of Songs. Perhaps the strangest book in the biblical canon, Song of Songs (aka Song of Solomon) is a love poem, bordering on the erotic, which the twelfth-century monk Bernard of Clairvaux described as 'the very music of the heart...[which] only the singer hears, and the one to whom he sings.' In Chapter 2, one of the lovers who narrates the song, describes themselves as being like 'a lily of the valley' and, shortly afterwards, we read:

Arise, my love, my fair one,

and come away;

for now the winter is past,

the rain is over and gone.

The flowers appear on the earth;

the time of singing has come.

It has been a long winter, both literally and metaphorically. We have been distant from those we love and most will have celebrated birthdays and Christmas, weddings and funerals, with only a Zoom window to bring us together. Dark days indeed. But with more and more of us being vaccinated, there is renewed hope that the days of winter are passing. Flowers are appearing on the earth and the time of singing has come. Soon, God willing, we may arise and away.

Recently I have been doing financial reports and itemizing all the things I needed to purchase to continue ministry online as the Hub is still being used as a testing centre. Any purchase for future profitable (not necessarily monitary) venture could be called an investment. We do it all the time with business and in our homes.
