Cambourne Village College access

The Town Council, County Council and the developers (Taylor Wimpey & Vistry) are working together to bring forward the completion of the cycle way on Swansley Lane to improve the safety of cyclists and pedestrians accessing and leaving the school site. The 20mph speed limit will also assist in improving safety on this road.

Business park access road

The Town Council, Cambourne Village College and the transportation and education department at Cambridgeshire County Council have raised the issue of completing the Business Park access through route to West Cambourne as an all vehicular road as this will provide a safer route to the school rather than going through the new housing development in West Cambourne on to Sheepfold Lane.

South Cambs District Council's initial response was that they were opposed to construction of new roads but after considering the strength of concern they agreed to review the situation with their highway consultant. (Continued on p3)

(continued from p2) 20mph speed limit

The Town Council submitted a private funding highway initiative application on 3rd August 2018. The County Council has been working on the design of the signage and any additional traffic calming that may be required to achieve a 20 mile per hour speed limit throughout the town. Cambourne was designed with all the housing parcels having a design of 15 or 20mph speed limits with only the main spine roads being designed for 30mph i.e. Back Lane, Broad Street, Lancaster Gate, Monkfield Lane, School Lane, and parts of Beaufort Road, Jeavons Lane, and Sterling Way.

The design work was put on hold by the County Council as they redirected staff to Coronavirus related tasks throughout the County. The Town Council has requested a timetable for the completion of the design process and when the consultation will take place ready for implementing. We will publish this once received. Our County Councillor is supporting us on this.

Potential regular market in Cambourne

The Town Council is working with South Cambs District Council Business Development team on the possibility of holding a regular market in Cambourne. Initially we are looking to hold this in the Hub Community Centre car park as there is space, toilets and it is an accessible location. This is in very early stages and further information will be given as it progresses.

Beaufort Road and Gladiator Road

Update on the adoption works to Gladiator Road (the next phase of spine roads to be completed in Upper Cambourne). It is estimated to take a year.

DA Cant will be starting the remedials and finishing works project in a few weeks time along all of Gladiator Road from the junction of Beaufort Road. There is a lot of work to complete: deep drainage repairs, new kerblines, breaking out existing binder before being finished to surface course. They are also busting out the concrete track and formalising that into its PROW hoggin finish and constructing the lit cycle-way link that runs behind Vine School playing field. It would not be safe to have that end open with all that will be going on, but when the project is complete they will be able to concentrate on formalising the adoption of all the infrastructure.

Cambourne Nature Reserve: March 2022

Spring is here, hooray! In hedgerows and scrub areas blackthorn is flowering, and hawthorn and elder leaves are out. Hawthorn and blackthorn are very common hedgerow bushes that are great for wildlife - they can look similar over winter, but chances are, if you spot a swathe of white in a hedgerow in March it's blackthorn, and a mass of green is probably hawthorn. Blackthorn flowers before it the leaves emerge, whereas hawthorn is the opposite. Elm is a common tree in the area which can be seen with pinkish flowers appearing in clusters during March; there are a few on the bridleway from School Lane into Oaks Wood. Before the summer migrants arrive in April, you can hear resident birds like blackbirds, chaffinches and yellow hammers singing their territorial songs, and great spotted woodpeckers drumming.

Several bird species nest on the ground near the lakes and in the grassy areas on Cambourne Nature Reserve - please keep dogs on leads to avoid disturbing them. Skylarks are another ground nesting bird found on the reserve which are in serious decline nationally.

Contractors have been on site recently replacing some bridges and repairing the potholes in Oaks Wood car park; please feel free to report any damaged infrastructures such as benches, fences or bridges. Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer



ranger to help with community activities such as litter picking, please do get in touch on Rebecca.Neal@wildlifebcn.org

In 1798, Wordsworth wrote a poem in which he invited his sister to go for a walk in the countryside.

It begins, "It is the first mild day of March: / Each minute sweeter than before..." and ends, "And bring no book: for this one day / We'll give to idleness."

We are privileged in Cambourne to have access to a tract of beautiful, well-managed countryside. Perhaps we are rather spoiled - it is easy to nip through the country park, on our way to school or the shops, and miss what a fabulous place it really is.

Such reflections bring to mind the words of another poem, originally in Swedish but translated into English as the hymn 'How Great Thou Art':

When through the woods and forest glades I wander And hear the birds sing sweetly in the trees; When I look down from lofty mountain grandeur And hear the brook and feel the gentle breeze:

Then sings my soul...how great Thou art!

I, like many Christians, find my spirit especially drawn to God while walking in nature - then, indeed, sings my soul, 'How great thou art!'

Whether this is something you experience or not, as the days begin to lengthen and the weather sweetens from the winds of winter into spring sunshine, why not spend a while enjoying the beauty of the country park? But just as Wordsworth entreated his sister to 'bring no book', leave the phone at home and spend some time - however brief - in idleness.

Grief may be delayed, but it is inevitable and needed if you are to progress. Emotions are messy, I do not like them much, but even the most detached person cannot run forever from those emotions. It may take a while, but it will come.

As it says in Ecclesiastes chapter 3 there is a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; A time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and

a time to dance. Yes for believers there is an eternal hope and we may deal with things a little differently, but regardless of your position please allow yourself and others a time for grief and help them when the time for getting back up comes.

The Wildlife Trust

The nights are getting lighter and there is real hope that we can look forward to a restriction free Spring for the first time since 2019.

This has given me the opportunity to get out and about in my constituency. I recently enjoyed a meeting with Craig Bennett, the CEO of the Wildlife Trust, at Trumpington Meadows.

We discussed how the Government can help to increase biodiversity, improve access to the countryside and adapt the planning system to find a sustainable balance between growth and protecting the environment. As we all know, this is a major issue and one that I am focussing on.

The Wildlife Trusts are promoting the concept of creating areas of protected "wild belt" land in our countryside, towns and cities, specifically

designated as places for nature recovery.

They are pushing for 30% of England to be in nature recovery by 2030. This could include anywhere from a river bank to a roadside embankment or a new nature reserve that would be given "wild belt" status and then managed to put nature into recovery. It would create more access to nature for people, the health and wellbeing benefits of which are well known.

I am particularly interested in how we can make this work in South Cambridgeshire. I would love to hear from the residents of Cambourne to learn how we can increase biodiversity in our region.

When plans are being drawn up to pave over our countryside it would be hugely beneficial for me to know my constituents' ideas to protect and enhance our natural environment. Please email me with your thoughts on this crucial issue.

Suffering from anxiety affects your life

Anxiety is common and unpleasant. More than just being about emotions like feeling nervous, fearful or worrying, it can affect how you physically feelings such as loss of appetite, aches and pains and breathlessness.

Anxiety can also cause change in behaviour such as not being able to enjoy things you might normally, enjoy avoiding certain situations and difficulties in looking after yourself.

When times of anxiety are particularly intense or sudden, this can trigger panic attacks. These are frightening episodes which may include a racing

heart rate, shaking, rapid breathing, a feeling of loss of control, tingling in fingers and toes and feeling sick. Panic attacks are extremely distressing but not dangerous.

Feelings of anxiety are nothing to be ashamed of and can improve. Talking about how you are feeling is the first step, either with someone you know or a charity or health professional.

There are other things that can help too; regular exercise in some form can make a real difference; eating well and avoiding too much caffeine; calming breathing exercises; mindfulness and taking things one step at a time by setting small targets that you know you can achieve.

A joint release on behalf of Cambridge **City Council, South Cambridgeshire District Council and the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service** came out on 7 February 2022.

It says that new planning guidance about how to better protect and enhance biodiversity when development takes place has now been adopted by the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service in a Supplementary Planning Document (SPD). The new SPD is a technical planning guidance document which carries weight in planning decisions. Building on front-line experience from local government ecologists, it was created to guide developers on how to fulfil existing "green" policies.

There is a growing need for up-to-date and accurate guidance on biodiversity regulations for planning which provides clarity on existing local policy and newly updated national policy. Greater Cambridge is one of the fastest developing areas in the country, yet has a relatively small amount of land managed for nature or wild spaces. As such, it is vital that biodiversity is protected and enhanced, both in terms of the amount of land managed specifically for nature, and the quality and richness of biodiversity throughout our urban and rural environments.

On 11 January, Cambridge City Council voted to approve the use of the **Biodiversity Supplementary Planning** Document when determining planning applications submitted to the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning team (the shared Planning Service between Cambridge City Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council).

On 7 February, the guidance was approved by South Cambridgeshire District Council's meeting of Cabinet. As both Councils need to approve the document prior to adoption, the **Biodiversity Supplementary Planning** Document is now adopted.

The new SPD will now be a "material consideration", meaning that it must be



considered and applied appropriately in planning decisions, alongside other existing considerations.

What is in the guidance?

100% of all new homes will require an integrated nest box for species such as swifts.

25% of new homes on housing developments will need to include bat boxes

Fences will need to feature gaps for hedgehogs and other species to roam more freely.

Green roofs will be encouraged, to create valuable habitats of flowering plants and grasses for wildlife in urban settings.

A reduction in artificial lighting which harms nocturnal species in their habitats, woodland edges, hedgerows and wetlands will be required.

Advice related to provisions in the Environment Act that give developers a two year window to transition from current rules around biodiversity, to new rules that will require a 10% increase in biodiversity as a result of development.

"The guidance in this Supplementary Planning Document will be a real help to applicants by showing how they can meet the policies of both Councils' Local Plans as well as relevant national legislation. It provides clear information on how developments can enhance biodiversity from the outset to ensure it is properly integrated into projects and that all developments help the environment."
