

Cambourne Warm Hub opens

Every weekday morning Cambourne Church is opening its doors as a Warm Hub. From 9.30am to 1pm, Monday to Friday, anyone and everyone is welcome to spend time in a warm space with hot drinks and hot food - all free of charge.

"This is a partnership between Cambourne Church, Hope CIC and Cambridgeshire ACRE. While there will be some days when it is not open over the Christmas holidays, the plan is to operate as a Warm Hub for Cambourne throughout the winter until the end of March," said Revd Bill Miller, Minister, Cambourne Church. "A space for company and warmth in these difficult times. Why not come along and have a cuppa and chat?"

So what are warm hubs? Warm Hubs are being established in places such as libraries, community centres, church halls, sports clubs, cafés and other places that promise a warm welcome to anyone struggling to heat their home. Warm Hubs are free to use and will provide a warm



welcome to all. Some venues will also offer hot drinks, activities and other services, such as free wi-fi.

Warm Hubs will support vulnerable and isolated people, as well as those on lower incomes who are unable to pay their energy bills without compromising on other essentials, such as food, rent or hygiene, this winter.

Warm Hubs, established at a community level, provide access to services for those that are perhaps 'just managing' with the cost-of-living crisis and who are not necessarily familiar with the systems of support available to them.

The idea is to provide access to services at an early intervention stage, to prevent longer term hardship. Those attending the Warm Hubs can get practical tips and advice on saving energy costs and keeping safe and warm at home. They will also be helped to find out about more specialist advice and support available to them, such as cost-of-living grants or debt advice.

Warm Hubs will also be joined to programmes that support the provision of food such as food banks, community larders, batch cooking and pop-up community shops - with the aim of increasing local access to good quality and affordable food, so that no-one goes hungry this winter.

Winter is approaching and the temperature is starting to drop. The Town Council grounds team will be keeping a close eye on the weather forecast for temperatures falling below 0 degrees and will be out and about in the early hours gritting the major footpaths (to bus stops and school routes). The Town Council does not grit the roads. Adopted roads are gritted by Cambridgeshire County Council and the routes can be viewed online.

Meet the Town Coun<u>cil Team</u>

Ross McNaught Caretaker

Ross McNaught has been caretaker for Cambourne since April 2019. When he first started he was also doing some cleaning, but now that there is a team of cleaners he is able to concentrate on the caretaking role.

Ross is responsible for maintenance and protective maintenance, fixing things and preventing them from needing to be fixed in all the public buildings, involving a regular round of inspections. Ross' day begins at 8am, when he opens the Hub and though officially his work day ends at 3pm, he will close up the Hub when the last users leave in the evening.

The public buildings he looks after are The Hub, Sports Pavilion, Bowls Pavilion, two cricket pavilions and the Soul building. At the time of writing he was involved in dismantling the kitchen in the old Soul building and generally removing parts of the building prior to demolition; keeping useful items - such as security lights - to be used elsewhere and making ready the new Soul building for occupation. Ross must liaise with visiting electricians, plumbers, security companies etc and is on the end of the phone for any emergencies, such as heating problems, blockages, and so on.

He is also responsible for ordering supplies such as for cleaning and maintenance.



He recently re-painted the Hub main hall and meeting room, a job that took five coats of paint and just over a week to complete. Ross volunteered to help out with the Cambourne 10k run, helped set up for the Jubilee celebrations and also assists in setting up the hall ready for the u3a monthly meetings.

What he enjoys about his job is being out and about, meeting new people every day and the variety of the work, with every day being different.

How you can help care for your local reserve in the winter: - Please wear appropriate footwear so you can stick to the middle of the paths if they are muddy, or consider exploring elsewhere

- Please let us know if a fallen tree is blocking the path

- Consider finding out more about the management of our reserves by joining a practical work party. These happen nearby at Gamlingay, Hardwick and Waresley and Gransden Woods every couple of weeks over the autumn and winter, and at Cambourne Nature Reserve monthly throughout the year.





Discussions with Morrisons

In my time as MP, I've learned that Cambourne can put on fantastic community events. I've enjoyed the Annual Fete every year and welcomed invites to everything from small community gatherings to the Fireworks Night, which I'm told attracted hundreds of people to the free display!

Just one thing is missing from this schedule – a regular market. The town's Market Square, owned by Morrisons through the neighbouring store on Broad Street, has the potential to become the centre of our community.

The addition of a market would create such a hub, reinvigorate the town centre, adding to the experience of visiting the town and providing great opportunities for local businesses and residents to showcase their wares.

Unfortunately, despite some excellent work, the Town Council has been continually rebuffed by Morrisons, who insisted on such strict conditions that a market became untenable.

While I understand managers must act in the best interests of any business, I'm urging them to look at the wider picture and compromise in some areas to allow a number of trial markets to be held. This month, I will be writing to the Morrisons CEO and calling for meetings to resolve the issues once and for all. We should all be able to enjoy a proper market in the town sooner rather than later.

My meetings with key **local organisations**

I met the Business Development Director of Stagecoach to raise residents' concerns and arranged for a public consultation to be held on 20th January 2023 in Cambourne for residents to directly ask questions about the future bus services in Cambourne.

I also organised another public consultation where residents of Cambourne met Darryl Preston, Police and Crime Commissioner, who explained how communicating with the public helped him to work on grants and funding. I proposed to the District Council that the local groups of the town be a part of the Community

Support Partnership (CSP).

I met with Stephen Kelly, Joint Director of Planning and Economic Development for District Council, regarding new roads in the Cambourne West and especially the roads approaching the Village College, which is a concern for the parents and the college in Cambourne. Mr. Kelly also explained the upcoming proposals to expand the current GP surgery in Cambourne.

I have recently visited the GP Surgeries in Cambridge and Comberton after office hours and on the weekends and would like to propose similar facilities to start in Cambourne GP surgery as well to the County Council.

Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD)

Seasonal affective disorder (SAD) is a type of depression related to the Seasons. Symptoms can be more severe during the winter, which include a persistent low mood, loss of interest in everyday activities, lack of energy, feeling irritable or unable to concentrate and feelings of despair.

The causes of SAD are not fully understood, but may be linked to reduced exposure to sunlight during the shorter days. This may affect hormones produced by the body which are related to sleepiness and mood which disrupt the internal body clock. It can help to get as much natural

sunlight as possible and take the time to get outside during daylight hours and sit near a window when inside.

Regular exercise (outdoors if possible) is very important for our mental health and improving symptoms of low mood. Some find light therapy using a specialised light lamp helpful although it is not clear how effective this is.

It is important to speak with a GP if you think you might have any form of depression including SAD and you are struggling to cope. For those with significant symptoms there are medications and talking therapies available. Depression, including SAD, is extremely common and the most important thing is to know you are not alone and to find someone to talk to.

It is unlikely to have escaped your notice that Christmas is coming - the time when Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus. But, as any pedant will tell you, Jesus probably wasn't born on 25th December, so the whole thing is a barrel of nonsense: the co-opting by late-Roman political Christianity of pre-existing pagan festivals. As usual, the pedants have staggeringly missed the point.

Christians are not so much celebrating when He was born, but that He was born. Before lies the deep and gathering night, as humanity falls further from the ideals for which we were created - a time of suffering, injustice and despair. His birth represents the glimmering of a new dawn: not the end of night altogether (as can be seen in literally any newspaper) but an indication that the cold and gloom of winter will end, that humanity can and must do better, and that bright summer lies open before us. Obviously such a celebration would happen on, or just after, midwinter. It is not so much stealing the pagan festivals but overlapping with them - harmonizing with the hope that lies within the heart of all humanity. The night is passing; day shall come again! So however and whatever you celebrate this month, may hope illuminate your festivities and inspire you to bless and be blessed in the year ahead.



The Vine fosters Spanish links in Cadiz



Monkfield collaborates with SAW Project Team

MONKFIELD PARK PRIMARY SCHOOL

was delighted to welcome the SAW (Science, Art and Writing) Project to work with our Year 6. Run by the wonderful staff at John Innes Centre in Norwich, the children participated in real, cutting edge science in the classroom. In addition to working with the team of scientists, the children wrote poetry and produced some inspirational art with their resident artist and poet, all based on microbes and the incredible, microscopic world.

The students were also engrossed in their current cross-curricular topic on the theme of 'Remembrance'. This has

provided lots of opportunities for them to discover what life was like for soldiers and civilians between 1914 and 1918. They studied two wonderful texts: 'Archie's War' by Marcia Williams and 'War Game' by Michael Foreman, but the war was really brought to life by the visit of a real life expert, Martin Gebble from the 10th Essex Living History Group, who brought a range of original World War I artefacts for the children to examine and study. Martin gave demonstrations of the drills soldiers conscripted into the army in WWI would have had to carry out each day. The pupils also produced the little known delicacy of 'trench cake', a filling concoction of oatmeal, treacle and spices, made replica medals from clay, learnt some German and recreated the famous football match from Christmas Day 1914.

The children were so inspired by Martin's visit they decided to create their own museum for their families and friends to enjoy.





Challenging times ahead

CAMBOURNE VILLAGE COLLEGE: School life is typically busy. Since the half-term break each Year 11 student has had a personal interview with a member of the careers team or senior member of staff, along with their parents or carers, to discuss their plans for Post 16 progression. Applications for sixth form places are submitted in early January, and with mock GSCE and BTEC exams happening at the end of this term, things suddenly seem quite serious for our oldest pupils. It's exciting to think that this time next year, we'll be offering places in our own sixth form to applicants for September of 2024.

Building work on all aspects of the new development is going to schedule, and by working closely with the contractors, we're managing to keep disruption to a minimum. Alongside this excitement, the national climate for education is looking very challenging. For this year very careful financial management both within school and by the Cam Academy Trust means we should be able to continue teaching as planned until next July. After that, we'll do our best to maintain the breadth of curriculum and staffing levels we currently provide, but there will doubtless be some very hard choices ahead.

In the meantime, we'll enjoy the rest of this term. Years 7 & 8 will be performing a festive production of 'Father Frost' on 13 December. This is an addition to the planned performance calendar for this year; so many of our younger pupils applied for a part in next year's production of 'Chicago' that an additional event was planned just for them – and there will be an opportunity to hear our most talented musicians perform at our traditional Christmas concert on 15 December. *Claire Coates, Principal*



Cambourne Crescent's Arabic Language School and Islamic School students attended a science workshop at Cambridge Stem Cell Institute, a world leading centre for Stem cell research.

The children found the visit very exciting, enlightening and an educational experience. Activities that take place outside of the formal education system significantly interest children to have real essence of world.

Cambourne writer's experience

Even now, as a grown adult, I can still recall the cosy, happy feeling of when my mum perched on the end of my bed and read stories to me and my older sister, Debbie. We were just tots, but mum would read "Peter Pan", "The Ballet Shoes" or any Enid Blyton. Beatrix Potter's stories were firm favourites too, and I



can remember knowing them "word for word" and finishing mum's sentences on numerous occasions.

This love of stories instilled a desire to read more and, as a consequence, I could read before I started infant school. There I had an amazing teacher, Mrs Powell. Kind and inspirational, she nurtured my love of reading and this, in turn, encouraged me to start writing stories which Mrs Powell popped on to the classroom wall.

Now, all these years later. I have finally written my own children's book: "Fairies at Number 55" was inspired by a dream last summer when I awoke with such vivid recollections of a sweet family of friendly fairies on our very own Cambourne bridleway. They had names which I jotted down and retained. Then the stories just kept coming in to my head. Some of these were influenced by my walks with my two dogs. Early in the morning, before work, I might encounter a couple of foxes on the bridleway around Cambourne. Other times I saw acrobatic black squirrels in the treetops. Another very early, misty morning, I saw a young owlet watching us walk, from his perch on the V of a tree. These creatures have all made an appearance in one or more of my 11 short stories. Another character is my late, wonderful dog Skeet. He moved to Cambourne with us in 2003 and was very much loved by all that knew him. He just HAD to feature in my book. Indeed, it is dedicated to him amongst others.

Upon completion, I then considered that maybe I might have these published. I searched on the internet for publishers that might consider an "unknown", unproven author. I came up with just two, and submitted my stories to both. The first to respond favourably was Austin Macauley Publishers Ltd. They sent such an enthusiastic, positive response and agreed to publish my book. I was very flattered and accepted. Then, I was further delighted to be accepted by the second publishing house, AH Stockwells. However, having agreed terms with Austin Macauley, I was committed to them and embarked on a year's process of proofreading and editing, then choosing an illustrator to bring my characters to life.

And so, after a year's production process, my book was finally published on 30 September 2022. I am very much in love with my characters, and truly hope they will appeal to young readers. I have been delighted to be sent little video clips of young readers engaging with my characters and already choosing their favourites. The book seems to be doing well, and if so, I definitely have a sequel bubbling away. Watch this space. Tessa-Kate Curtis

Renters reminded to seek help on mould issues at their homes

People in South Cambridgeshire who rent homes in the private sector are being urged to seek help from the Council if mould issues are not resolved by their landlords. The reminder follows the tragic case of Awaab Ishak, a two-year-old boy who died following chronic exposure to mould at the family home in Rochdale.

In South Cambs, the District Council has a role in ensuring that homes in the private sector and the Council's own properties do not contain health hazards.

Most properties within the private rented sector in the district are in good condition, but the Council's Environmental Health team investigate any complaints.

Private Sector and Housing Association tenants can make a complaint about the condition of their home by emailing env.health@scambs.gov.uk

The following information is required:

- Their address
- The landlord's details
- What the issue is
- How long it has been a problem
- Photographs to show the issue

The Council has the power to take the appropriate enforcement action if there are issues that need to be resolved. This action could include writing to the landlord to ensure the issue is resolved, but the Council can also serve a legal notice to instruct works to be carried out.

The Council manages around 5,500 Council homes. Leading councillors have said that the Council takes reports of mould seriously and does not assume that damp is a consequence of the lifestyle of tenants.

Officers support people on the issue by: - Actively informing residents about methods to reduce damp and mould - Using specialist contractors to assess and remedy any issues reported - Encouraging all operatives to check for damp and mould when they are working in properties as part of safeguarding and welfare procedures

When any repair is reported, the Council also asks tenants whether there are other issues at their home.

The Council had already planned to carry out a stock condition survey on all Councilowned homes next year which will identify any issues with mould, or risk of mould developing to ensure proactive action can be taken.

The Council wants to ensure anyone renting is aware that the Council is there to help you if your landlord does not address your concerns. Homes should be a safe place for you and your family, so please contact them for help.

Birds must be caged during avian flu outbreak

Birds must be locked down as the country faces the biggest outbreak of avian flu. Poultry and captive bird owners must keep their birds inside as the country faces its biggest ever outbreak of avian flu.

South Cambridgeshire District Council is urging local bird keepers, including pet bird owners, to keep their birds in lockdown and use strict biosecurity measures to help protect their flocks from the disease, regardless of type or size.

The lockdown housing measures legally require all keepers to ensure their birds are indoors and to follow stringent rules, such as keeping the number of people entering the bird enclosure to a minimum and using specific footwear that can be cleaned before and after entering the

enclosure, just for dealing with the birds. Following restrictions already in force for Norfolk, Suffolk and Essex, avian bird flu has now been found in areas of Cambridgeshire.

To protect an outbreak of avian bird flu, the Department of Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (DEFRA) announced that from Monday 7 November all areas of England require the mandatory housing of all poultry and captive birds. This includes pet chickens and ducks.

Cllr Brian Milnes, Lead Cabinet Member for the Environment, said: "Scrupulous biosecurity and separating flocks in all ways from wild birds remain the best form of defence.

"Whether you keep just a few birds or thousands, from Monday 7 November onwards you must keep yours indoors. This is the best way to protect your birds from this highly infectious disease."

To achieve the requirements, birds must be kept in an area that is fully covered, so as not to allow wild birds to enter or their faeces to contaminate the area.

Failure to comply with the housing

measures set by DEFRA could result in a fine.

Over the last year, the United Kingdom has faced its largest ever outbreak of avian flu with more than 200 cases confirmed since late October 2021.

The introduction of the housing measures comes after the disease was detected at over 70 premises since the beginning of October, as well as multiple reports in wild birds.

The United Kingdom's Chief Veterinary Officer, Christine Middlemiss, said: "We are facing this year, the largest ever outbreak of bird flu and are seeing rapid escalation in the number of cases on commercial farms and in backyard birds across England. The risk of kept birds being exposed to disease has reached a point where it is now necessary for all birds to be housed until further notice."
