Cambourne residents question quality of bus services

Residents of Cambourne were given the opportunity to speak with Directors and Officials from the Stagecoach Bus Company at a Consultation meeting in January 2023.

David Boden, the Business
Development Director of Stagecoach for
East Cambridgeshire, addressed the
attendees of the meeting, organised by
Cllr.Shrobona Bhattacharya on behalf of
Cambourne Town Council.

The purpose of the meeting was to enable residents to share their views and ask questions about bus travel to and from Cambourne and in the wider area.

The meeting was well attended by residents from Cambourne, St Neots, Hardwick and Caldecote.

Mr Boden outlined the challenges that Stagecoach were facing against the backdrop of the pandemic, reduced government funding and potential challenges in the future. He emphasised the importance of covering costs, increased fuel prices and higher wages in



response to the audience's questions about the quality of service in the region.

Attendees were also encouraged to feed back about any issues they had experienced which caused concern.

The audience was informed that passenger numbers were reduced due to commuters working from home, insufficient revenue to cover the costs of the 905 bus service and not enough demand for the Citi 4 bus to be scheduled at 20 minutes intervals. The current losses were reported as being too great and without a minimum level of income, the timetable would not be covered or could possibly be withdrawn. As a result, when the bus service tenders are issued on 31st March, a decision has been made that Stagecoach will not be applying for all of them, and therefore couldn't comment

about the situation after 1st April 2023.

However, this meeting was held before the recent announcement that increased government funding will be made available to bolster bus services across Cambridgeshire. Whether this will affect the decisons made by Stagecoach has yet to be ascertained.

Stagecoach emphasised the need for more paying customers as well as support from the Councils. *Use it or lose it!*

Mr Boden also stressed that Stagecoach would like to support the community and surrounding areas and potentially a timetable that integrates with the train service. More information will become available over the coming months.

■ Dogs on leads and The Countryside Code of Conduct

Due to some recent concerns, we would like to remind dog owners to exercise their dogs on lead. Whilst we understand why owners may want to exercise off lead, particularly around the country park and lakes, it is important to remember that some people are not comfortable with dogs approaching them, or their dogs. Dogs off lead can also cause a disturbance to nesting birds and other wildlife. It also presents an opportunity for dogs to poo unnoticed and not being disposed of. The Town Council follows the Countryside Code:

The Countryside Code – Protect the Environment

- Take your litter home; leave no trace of your visit
- Take care with barbecues (where permitted)
- Do not light fires
- Always keep dogs under control and in sight
- Dog poo bag it and bin it, any public waste bin will do
- Care for nature do not cause damage or a disturbance

Road danger for West Cambourne residents

There are now more than 100 new Cambourne residents in West Cambourne. However, they currently have no safe route to travel between their homes and the rest of the town unless they use their cars.

District councillors Helene Leeming and Stephen Drew have spoken to many West Cambourne residents who explain their concerns about allowing their children to walk or cycle along the A1198 where there is no footpath, no street lighting and a 60mph speed limit. Residents using mobility vehicles have been forced to travel along the road to access services in the rest of the town.

Discussions have been held with South Cambridgeshire District Council's planning service who have taken up the cause of West Cambourne residents in discussions with the developers, Taylor Wimpey and Vistry.

However, despite the evidence of the problems being clearly communicated to the developers, at present there is no assurance that anything will be done until the "autumn" of 2023. This is not something that can wait that long, and every day residents of West Cambourne are both inconvenienced and unnecessarily put in danger if they have no alternative but to walk or cycle down the A1198.

Battery recycling

Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire households can now conveniently recycle used small batteries weekly, thanks to changes to waste collections.

Small plastic bags containing used batteries can now simply be left on top of green, black or blue bins for collection by waste crews on their usual rounds.

Residents of flats with shared bins should not leave batteries on these but can take them to one of the many public battery collection points at corner shop chains,



supermarkets, chemists and petrol stations as well as those at recycling points and Household Recycling Centres. Visit www.recyclenow.com to see all locations. By adding a dedicated bucket for household batteries to the side of each bin lorry, the process for collecting them for recycling will now be much easier and

more convenient, both for residents and our waste crews.

Please remember batteries should never be put inside your bin. It is important that batteries are recycled properly to recover the precious metal inside them, to keep hazardous substances from the environment, and to prevent fires in bin lorries or the sorting facility.

Most small common household portable batteries can be placed out for collection at the kerbside, including: AA and AAA,C,D and Button cells. Please do not include mobile phone, laptop batteries or those that are attached to a device. Search online for 'recycle small electrical items' instead.

Town Council warns of Band D tax increase

Each year in January all Town and Parish Councils prepare a budget for the following year.

This is always a challenging process for a developing town like Cambourne, but this year it has been a particularly difficult challenge with more pressures on the budget for 2023/24.

These include:

- A commitment to improve the play areas.
- A commitment to implement the 20mph speed limit and yellow lines in Cambourne in line with the action plan arising from the Parish Plan.
- Completing the landscaping to the Youth Building.
- Maintaining the support for youth

provision by providing a building and grant funding for Cambourne Youth Partnership, to provide youth clubs and other support for the youth of Cambourne, (this works out to £12.52/year on Band D households).

- Meeting the inflationary costs on electricity, gas, diesel and materials used to maintain the buildings and open spaces.
- Additional staff costs due to the National pay award for local government staff.
- Ensuring that the budgets balance over the next three years and meets the Risk Management reserves, which Councils are required to keep.
- It should be noted that many of the costs are fixed by third parties leaving us no discretion or control to alter them.

Cambourne Town Council looked at all options to try and minimise the increase due to the pressures on residents, brought about by the current cost of living crisis. Most options showed that greater increases would be needed in the future to provide a balanced budget.

Cambourne Town Council took the difficult decision to levy a precept of £665,388.00 on South Cambs District Council. This is a band D rate of £161.15 which is an increase of 10% which equates to an additional £14.65 per year (£1.22 per month). This was required to ensure that the Town Council is able to carry out the projects it has committed to and meet the risk management threshold for the next three years.

Although 2023 to 2024 has required a 10% increase to Band D, the next three financial years' budget balances with a 3% increase to Band D annually.

Robotics class starts with huge enthusiasm in Cambourne



People expect public services to run effectively

After twelve months of war and strife, where the pandemic became endemic and rocketing global energy prices caused a global cost of living crisis, I am sure we're all hoping for brighter times ahead.

I know for many the last 12 months have been particularly difficult. People rightly expect public services to run effectively. It is one of my top priorities for the weeks and months ahead to support the Government in action it takes to resolve these issues.

I have been particularly troubled by the obvious issues with ambulance services. Rightly, the

Government is taking action to resolve these issues. For example, NHS England has allocated an additional £150 million to address ambulance service pressures in 2022/23 and support improvements to response times through call handler recruitment and retention.

I appreciate that there is always more to do, and I will continue to push the Government to take further action. I am also meeting with Health Ministers to deliver a high cost of living supplement for NHS workers in Cambridge.

Elsewhere, I will continue to oppose the GCP's congestion charge, push the business case for East West Rail and work on aviation reform that works for residents of South Cambridgeshire.

Do not find yourself unable to vote

The current government has introduced a new law which will affect voters.

From May 2023, voters in England will need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations.

This will apply to: Local elections, Police and Crime Commissioner elections, UK parliamentary by-elections, Recall petitions.

From October 2023 this will also apply to UK General elections.

Acceptable forms of ID include: UK passport, Driving licence issued by the UK or an EEA state (including provisional driving licences), a Blue Badge, Older Person's Bus Pass, Disabled Person's Bus Pass, Oyster 60+ Card, Identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a PASS card), National identity card issued by an EEA state.

The full list can be found on the Electoral Commissions website.

If you don't have accepted photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate via the Electoral Commission website.

There is concern that this new law will disproportionately affect young people, renters who move frequently and people with low incomes. Please take time now to make sure that when the next election comes, you will not be denied your right to vote.

Eating disorder awareness week

Eating disorders are serious mental illnesses affecting an estimated 1 in 50 people in the UK, causing physical, psychological and social difficulties.

Although younger women are most likely to develop eating disorders, they can affect all people at any age. Some eating disorders are well known such as anorexia nervosa (keeping body weight low and often a distorted image of body size); bulimia (eating excessively followed by vomiting/ laxative use) and binge eating disorder (BED). There are also other, less well

known, conditions (see the weblink below).

It can be very worrying if someone you're close to may have an eating disorder and it is not uncommon for them to be secretive or defensive about their eating or weight.

Obsession about food, behaviour changes, distorted beliefs about body size, excessive exercise, disappearing to the toilet after meals and difficulty concentrating may also be noticed.

Eating disorders are serious but treatable conditions and full recovery is possible, particularly if help is sought early on. If you think you might have an eating disorder, remember it is an illness and you deserve support in the same way as if it were any other illness.

It is an ancient Mariner

And he stoppeth one of three.

'By thy long grey beard and glittering eye,

Now wherefore stopp'st thou me?'

So begins Coleridge's haunting poem of a sailor who, after an act of senseless violence, is tormented by a vengeful nature spirit and the reanimated corpses of his fallen crew. Returning home, he meets a priest and cries out, "Shrieve me, holy man." The priest replies, "Say quick...what manner of man art thou?"

Pancake Day is coming. But it is about more than debating whether chocolate, maple syrup, or sugar and lemon is best. Also known as 'Shrove Tuesday', it is the day when, just as Coleridge's mariner does, Christians traditionally seek to be shriven: to be given space to confess our mistakes and be forgiven.

Last month, Bill wrote about the need to allow God to change us for the better. A big part of that process is to recognise that we will certainly make mistakes. Christians believe there is hope in this. It is only when we recognise our mistakes, do our best to make things right, and hear another person tell us that forgiveness is possible, that true change is possible.

So as you munch on your pancakes, consider the priest's question to the mariner: what manner of person are you? It is, admittedly, a big question to ask during dessert, and the answer may not be comfortable. But it holds the key to a better tomorrow.

Sowing and reaping.

In a recent message, I spoke about sowing and reaping in the context of harsh consequences for foolish actions. A subject often set aside in today's culture but one that is needed for many aspects of life. Farmers and gardeners are already thinking about planting seeds. But before the carrots can go in or the broad beans be pressed into the earth preparation and cultivation must happen if you

want to have a good crop. The same is true with goals in life. What is in the soil of your life that needs to be removed? The stones of pride or arrogance? Maybe some roots of bitterness are slowly poisoning the ground. Some weeds of indifference that choke any decent growth. Identify and get rid or get around obstacles. But it does not end there. For when some things are removed other things should be brought in to take their place. Just like in nature holes will tend to be filled with something if left and you should be the one to choose what goes in your life.

Perhaps some food for the seeds or results you want. A fertilizer by taking some of the special stuff life throws at you and making it actually useful. Do you realise sometimes criticism or exposed failure can be exactly the fuel you needed to make a change? What next? You need to break up the ground that has been sitting all

Hosea 10:12 Sow to yourselves in righteousness, reap in mercy; break up your fallow ground: for it is time to seek

the LORD, till he come and rain righteousness upon you.

If you want the rain, that water of life to penetrate and revitalize you have to break up the clods or it just runs off. Then add the seeds you want. The choices you desire. Spare rooms needed for people from Ukraine



Have you got a spare room?

South Cambs District Council is working with Cambridge City Council to encourage new host households to come forward, to support people from Ukraine who are already settled in Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire. If you have a spare room and are thinking of hosting, please fill in the short form accessibe here: www.scambs.gov.uk/community-safety-and-health/support-for-ukraine/spare-rooms-for-people-from-ukraine/

The team will call you to talk about the scheme and help you decide whether hosting is right for you.

Rematching guests who are already settled locally

The scheme that was set up at the start of the conflict in Ukraine asked hosts to commit to a period of at least 6 months, and that time period has now passed. Although some hosts may be able to extend their hosting arrangement further, not all will be able to. We now need to ask more people who are happy and able to host to come forward.

By finding more people in our community to host, we can support people from Ukraine who are already settled to stay in the area where they have formed friendships, secured jobs, and where their children have started school.

We will work to rematch guest households with hosts who come forward in towns and villages to keep guests in the area where they have started to settle.

Support for new hosts

When we call you, we can talk about the wealth of support that is available to new hosts, such as the monthly 'Thank You' payments to help hosts cover the cost of having additional people in your household.

CVC access routes still in the spotlight

CAMBOURNE VILLAGE COLLEGE: In

......

March last year, we alerted our parents to the development of an additional housing estate next to Cambourne Business Park by the South Cambridgeshire Investment Partnership (SCIP). The SCIP proposal includes a bus and cycle link to our schools and West Cambourne from the Business Park road but misses the opportunity to make this a direct and simple route for all vehicles – and in particular, school traffic.

Building a short stretch of all-vehicle road from the Council offices onto Sheepfold Lane would solve all the problems created by the current plans to divert the existing school access through the residential roads of West Cambourne. We anticipate the

new route will cause long delays and serious congestion at peak times.

The planning application for the SCIP housing estate puts great emphasis on its environmental credentials and 'connectivity'. However, it misses a very simple opportunity to improve traffic flow and reduce CO2 emissions. To demonstrate this our in-house traffic survey recorded 1,215 vehicles visiting the school's campus on a mainly dry Wednesday in February 2022. From the Business Park roundabout, these journeys were estimated to have produced 430.402 grams-per-mile total of CO2. This is 25% higher than would have been produced if the Business Park link had been open. When our current access is changed to the longer route through West Cambourne, it's estimated that the CO2 emissions for journeys to our schools will be 66% higher than via the Business Park link route. This figure will be even greater if a one-way system through the school site is

introduced to manage the traffic flow, and it takes no account of the expected rise in school numbers as the secondary school expands.

Bourn Windmill restoration update

The restoration of Bourn Windmill is progressing well. The scaffolding was removed in December and the site has been largely cleared of building items. At a site meeting in January, the findings of the volunteer maintenance team's previous assessment visit was discussed.

There appears to be an issue with turning the mill as the tail is now about a foot or so lower at the point near the barns and the mill cannot make a full circle. The millwright will reassess the situation once the sails have been reattached. There are also some areas of rotten timbers which will be replaced in the buck, and some adjustment to the buck where the steps adjoin it.

The millwright has already begun to get the site ready to start on the repair, repaint and installation of the sails. He will be also cleaning and repainting the stocks. The buck, tail and steps will also be repainted. It is hoped that the outstanding works will be completed by the end of February, weather permitting.

You can view Bourn Windmill from the footpath passing through farmland that is accessed via the kissing gate directly to the south of Crow Hill in Cambourne.

Wildlife Trust Cambourne - join the Toad Patrol

Every year in February and March, amphibians migrate from their winter hibernation quarters to their breeding pond. In this area there are common frogs, common toads, great crested and smooth (or common) newts; palmate newts are less common in Cambridgeshire. While frogs and newts stay close to their breeding pond, toads may travel more than a mile to get back to their pond.

Amphibians are very important species in our wetlands (International World Wetlands Day 2 February worldwetlandsday.org) feeding at several different levels and prey for lots of different species. They are in decline for numerous reasons including climate change - affecting timing of hibernation and causing ponds to dry out in summer, plus the availability and accessibility of good quality habitat.

Toads are tied to their ancestral pond,



and, if it means crossing roads to get there, then they will. They are also coordinated in their migration and can move in their hundreds when conditions are right: this area has a few known crossing points:

- Broadway (road to Bourn) beside the airfield
- A1198 bypass at Papworth Everard, especially near the roundabout by the Indian Restaurant
- · Corner of Monkfield Lane and Jeavons Lane in Cambourne
- Monk Drive, Cambourne

Please slow down when driving these roads on warmer wetter evenings in late winter/early spring, and please get in touch if you know of other roads where there are numbers of dead amphibians.

The Wildlife Trust coordinate a Toad Patrol at the Bourn crossing: when it is above 5 degrees C and wet, volunteers walk the road at night with high vis jackets, buckets and torches. They pick up toads (and the odd frog) from one side of the road to transport them safely, closer to their breeding pond. Sky comes to life with a rainbow of colours in **Cambourne**


A successful kite festival took place at the Great Cambourne Cricket Pavilion on 15th January.

World Arabic language day

philosophers, and scholars wrote in Arabic, including Rumi, Avicenna, and Al-Ghazali, who have had a profound impact on the development of literature, science, and philosophy.

In addition to its rich literary tradition, Arabic has also played a key role in the development of science and mathematics.

Today, Arabic continues to be an important language and is one of the six official languages of the United Nations.

The Arabic Language Day is a way to celebrate the language, its culture and the people who speak it. It is an opportunity to learn about Arabic language and its history to appreciate its beauty and complexity.

Arabic Language School runs during term time on Sunday from 10:00 am to 12:00 pm at Cambourne Village College. The school also has a class for adults who are interested in learning the language. The language classes are open to everyone in the community.
