## Regional building plans fall short of reality

Communication is key. Unfortunately, it seems this is a skill lacking in those who make decisions about our region.

Leaders stretching from Westminister to the local level are apparently not in communication with each other and several of them have written to Cambourne Crier about a recent government announcement.

Michael Gove, Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC, has outlined plans to deliver a million new homes nationally, focusing on towns and cities and starting with Cambridge. This follows a story in The Sunday Times recently – which the local council had no prior knowledge of reporting on government plans to turn Cambridge into Britain's 'Silicon Valley' by boosting building and adding as many as 250,000 new homes within 20 years.

The figure has come as a shock to residents, local authorities and indeed to our MP, given that none of them have been consulted about the proposal.



If DLUHC officials had spoken with local representatives, they would have been told categorically that development on this scale is impossible to deliver for many reasons, not least because we simply don't have enough water.

There's not enough water to cope with development under the existing local plan, nor the Liberal Democrat-led Council's proposed 57,000 new homes under its emerging local plan, nor the additional homes that East West Rail says are needed to justify its business case.

To suggest that 250,000 homes could be delivered in the next 20 years is a pipe dream. We know this because the Environment Agency (EA) is now objecting to all new major housing developments in South Cambridgeshire due to concerns about water scarcity. It is the first time in its history that it has intervened in a local planning process in

this way due to water concerns. It has officially classed the Cambridge Water area as 'seriously water-stressed' and now wants certainty that new major developments will not give rise to a further deterioration of local water environments - notably our rare chalk streams.

We have the district council questioning the government and our MP questioning both the government and the local council. A boost for business is great, but Silicon Valley is not a massive housing estate.

We are already dealing with a lack of infrastructure in the region. You need doctors and schools and shops and jobs. Simply building new houses with no or insufficient amenities is unsustainable. Particularly when one of the things most needed is water.

#### Bins and fly tipping

The grounds team have noticed an increase in the bins around the town being used for household rubbish as well as large items being dumped next to them. An example: large amounts of rotting meat have been found in bins. This is not the appropriate way to dispose of household waste. Large items must be disposed of at a recycling centre or arrange bulky collection through South Cambs District Council, or a licensed collector. Fly tipping is an offence under the Environmental Protection Act (1990) and offenders may face up to £50,000 fine and/or up to 5 years prison sentence.

#### CYP: District charity of the year

Its youth workers also engage young people in detached sessions in the community and deliver one-to-one sessions for those needing further support.

The charity's key aims are to inspire and raise the aspirations of young people in the local community, particularly those who are experiencing disadvantage in various forms including social and economic isolation, and challenging life situations.

Cllr Peter Fane said: "Cambourne Youth Partnership is a wonderful charity carrying out amazing grass roots support with our local 11 to 18-year-olds. I am delighted to be able to help by choosing them as our charity of the year.

## There is so much happening in Cambourne

There is so much happening in Cambourne!

Over the last couple of months, we've welcomed billions in national government infrastructure investment that will impact on Cambourne. We've seen the final legal challenge against the fantastic A428 dualling scheme come through, meaning the work on that £900m road upgrade can start.

I'm also working hard with the Department of Transport to ensure Cambourne gets its own station if East West Rail is to go ahead. I know how frustrating it is for people in Cambourne to go to work or school in Cambridge. These transport improvements will transform our lives.

Then we have the news that the new sixth form for Cambourne Village College will be open for students next year. It means that children from Cambourne will be able to study their A-levels in town, rather than travel to Cambridge or Comberton! I'm delighted that these improvements will make a huge difference in the town.

That's not to say I'm not looking to the next challenge. I'll be writing to the CEOs of Morrisons and the Post Office, asking if the two can come together and provide a permanent post office to replace the current temporary service. And, as ever, I'm supporting Councillors Shrobona Bhattacharya and Mark Howell in their work pushing the Pharmacy for clarity on its future and integrating with West Cambourne.

## **East West Rail and Cambourne station**

This month, the national government has announced their planned route for East West Rail (EWR).

This will be a train route which runs from Oxford to Cambridge, with stops in Milton Keynes, Bedford, Tempsford, Cambourne and Cambridge South, (Addenbrookes site). When asked about the timescale, EWR said they aim to have the railway built and running by 2030.

There is still much to confirm. There will be a period of statutory consultation to refine details of the route and infrastructure in the first half of 2024. However, as it stands, the railway station

for Cambourne will be just north of the A428.

EWR have confirmed that they will provide infrastructure to make sure that the station is accessible for pedestrians and cyclists most likely in the form of a bridge. When asked about power supply, EWR stated that electrification remains a possibility, but there is the complexity of connections to other lines and the need for high levels of early funding from central government at the start of the building process for this to happen.

As your local elected representative, I will work with my colleagues to endeavour to make sure that Cambourne residents and our surrounding communities get as much benefit from this scheme as possible. ## **Inflammatory Bowel Disease**

Crohn's Disease and Ulcerative Colitis are the two main conditions forming Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD). Not to be confused with IBS, (irritable bowel syndrome) IBD affects more than 500,000 people in the UK and causes ulcers and inflammation in the gut.

In Crohn's disease anywhere in the gut can be affected from mouth through to anus. In Ulcerative Colitis only the large bowel is affected.

The most common symptoms of IBD are diarrhoea (which can contain blood or mucus), cramping pain in the abdomen, tiredness, mouth ulcers, weight loss and anaemia (low iron levels).

Symptoms can also occur outside the gut such as eye inflammation and joint pain.

IBD is diagnosed using a combination of blood tests, stool tests and an endoscopy to look directly at the bowel which may show signs of inflammation. In some cases scans may also be needed to give further information.

Although IBD is a serious condition, there are many medications available to treat it including specialist anti-inflammatory drugs, medicines to suppress the immune system, steroids and powerful biological drugs. However, sometimes surgery to remove parts of the bowel is necessary. There is much research ongoing into IBD which aims to understand more about the condition, improve treatments and ultimately find a cure.



August is often a time for going away. It might be a seaside holiday, a city break or a hike in the wilds. Many avoid August because of the peak prices, but will nevertheless take a holiday at some point during the year. Taking a break is important. There is a strong Christian tradition that rest is part of God's intention for humanity. From ancient times it was commanded that one day a week should be set aside for rest and reflection. Bosses could not require labour on all seven days of the week. Even animals were allowed to rest. And this Sabbath day of rest was a shared experience with an acknowledgment of God at its heart. To be a workaholic was against the law.

This served many purposes. It was a protection against exploitation or a lack of self-care. It gave time for the worship of God. And it reminded people that well-being did not rely upon working every hour God sent. Some of the hours God sent were to be used for rest.

So can you manage to disengage from work this summer? Can you take a rest and switch off the work phone, even if you do not manage to go away? It is an important contributor to our well-being. #### Opportunity to Join our Patient Participation Group (PPG)

Monkfield Medical Practice wishes to establish a diverse and representative Patient Participation Group, which meets quarterly, to proactively represent patients and champion the practice as a pillar of the community. This will involve members in a quarterly meeting for which they will be required to read prepared documents. The group will also require a chairperson to co-ordinate an agenda for each meeting.

#### **Patient Association**

We also plan to form a Patient Association. This group will have fewer responsibilities than the Patient Participation Group, since members can contribute remotely by completing surveys etc.

#### Medical Records for Children and Young People

There is a general assumption amongst our patients that parents (or individual given parental responsibility) have access to their child's medical record or details about their clinical care until they are the age of 16 or 18. This is in fact not the case.

Children over the age of 12 are generally considered to have the capacity to give or withhold consent to release medical records. More specifically, those under 16 should demonstrate that they have the capacity to make these decisions. Where the child is considered to be capable, then their consent must be sought before access is given to a third party, in this case the parent.

Access can be refused by the health professional where they consider that the child does not have capacity to give consent/decline decisions. If the appropriate health professional considers that a child patient is Gillick competent (i.e. has sufficient maturity and understanding to make decisions about disclosure of their records) then the child should be asked for his or her consent before disclosure is given to someone with parental responsibility.

If the child is not Gillick competent and there is more than one person with parental responsibility, each may independently exercise their right of access.

In all circumstances good practice dictates that a Gillick competent child should be encouraged to involve parents or other legal guardians in any treatment/disclosure decisions.

MMP Practice Policy is to remove parental access to all those who turn 14 unless we have written consent from the individual to state otherwise.

# CVC celebrates 10th anniversary

**Cambourne Village College** reaches its tenth anniversary this September, surrounded by construction work as six further buildings are prepared for handover in the spring of 2024.

These consist of four further teaching wings, a dining hall and most of all a separate sixth form centre in September 2024. In fact, the College has only been free of building plans or construction for two of its ten years of opening, during which we've grown tenfold from our tiny first intake of 132 Year 7 pupils, to over 1,300 this August. Over the next five years, the school will continue to expand as each new Year 7 admits more to a final roll of 1650 in 2028; with up to 350 in the sixth form.

When we opened in 2013, the College had only five full-time staff with most of whom were shared with Comberton VC. With around 200 now employed, Cambourne is lucky to have one of the most skilful and committed set of teaching and support staff in the country; as reflected not only in exam results which have always been well above national averages, but also in the breadth of extra-curricular sports, music, drama, art and other activities.

And throughout this time, we've fully embraced our Village College status, enjoying sharing our facilities with the community on weekday evenings and at weekends.

I retire at the end of this year, with sports days, school productions, concerts and Activities Week rounding off the term

I've been privileged to have led the development of the school over the past ten years and thank our parents, Governors, the Cambourne Village College Charitable Trust and the Town and County Councils for their generous support over this time.

From September, Mrs Lynn Mayes will lead as the new Principal and I am sure the next phases of its development will be equally exciting!

# RELAS: more planes equals more problems

RELAS (Reject Luton Airport Stacking) has reiterated their message to keep complaining about the CO2 emissions from the existing flights, which are affecting the environment and the lifestyles of the residents.

Since February 2022 our rural and quiet countryside has been spoilt by the introduction of large numbers of passenger and freight aircraft, daily. There is no respite from this audible and visible blight which disturbs many in the area as a direct result of the imposition of the poorly considered programme, Air Deployment 6 (AD6); which was never about safety but simply about the expansion of Luton and Stansted airports. As you are aware, the Post-Implementation Review (PIR) closes on 22 September 2023, following which Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) will evaluate the feedback and objections before signing AD6 as permanent. It is very likely that you have noticed the significant increase in the number of jet flights over our region, as post-pandemic flights and summer holidays are returning.

Southern regions like Cambridgeshire, Bedfordshire and Huntingdonshire have been significantly affected. It is clear that the consultation process was deeply flawed. The consequential impact of AD6 was not disclosed, such as the increased use of the region's airspace that is not relevant to Luton or Stansted. Night flights in particular were not mentioned. The noise of the jets braking for a quick descent were deliberately omitted from all data analysis. This has been highlighted by aviation experts saying the poor design of AD6 by requiring rapid "scrubbing of altitude" and direction from the airline operators to their pilots which is acknowledged as bad practice.

Since March 2022, our local authority representatives have tried to meet and address the public complaints with the programme sponsors, London Luton Airport (LLA); National Air Traffic Service (NATS), and the oversight body, the CAA. It is apparent that these

bodies have refused to engage constructively and deal with residents, councillors or MPs. This is very frustrating as LLA and CAA deal with the complaints which is wholly inappropriate and unethical. The PIR was extended to 22 September 2023, thanks to the efforts of local MPs who debated the topic with the Transport Minister in January 2023. The LLA is 85 years old and intends to expand its operations, which means as many as 21 hours a day and a new passenger terminal to accommodate an increase in passenger numbers. It is not too late to reverse these changes, a review is ongoing and due to complete in September 2023. A campaign to improve or abandon AD6 is gathering pace and now has the support of a few local MPs.

RELAS was formed to oppose these changes and in addition to raising public awareness and engaging local MPs, is campaigning to get the AD6 abandoned or re-designed. The effects of noise pollution on health is significant, including irritation, stress, cognitive impairment, sleep disturbance and cardiovascular disease. Local MP Anthony Brown used a parliamentary debate on AD6 to highlight several cases of constituents whose health has been seriously affected.

While it is most important to ensure that your household makes at least one complaint if you are disturbed by noise, it is worthwhile repeating the process for additional interuptions. This could take the form of a specific email (copied to all parties) combined with an entry on LLA's website. Include details of the times when you were disturbed. Further emails could refer to your initial email. The total number of complaints will assist in indicating the magnitude of the problem and such evidence will be considered in the review process for AD6.

Tell your friends and neighbours about this campaign. Attend any public meetings and surgeries and make your views known. If you have any expertise please consider helping RELAS.

#### **East West Rail**

Dear Editor, Last month Anthony Browne MP talked about the work he had done in getting Cambourne a station on the East West rail line, but acknowledged that EWR's proposals were proving controversial. Having good transport infrastructure is important for this area. However, do people in Cambourne and the surrounding district realise just how much the population might grow with the coming of EWR?

Cambourne was originally planned as three villages, but is now forecast in the Local Plan to grow to about 28,000



people by 2041, but with no housing planned for north of the A428.

However, the Local Plan takes no account of paying for EWR.

EWR's latest report estimates that, with a station, Cambourne could grow by an EXTRA 53,400 people. Did you ever envisage the possibility of your village developing into a town of more than 80,000 people? EWR says that putting the station north of the A428 would not constrain development, although it would be separated from the village of Cambourne. So the beautiful countryside where you can presently walk and cycle will be lost to the thousands of houses that will be required to house these extra bodies and the scale of development will pose an existential threat to villages such as Elsworth and Knapwell, while Cambourne would become a huge town split by a four lane trunk road and a four track rail line. #### Local author has first book published

Lucy Purvey (née McDowell) spoke to me about her new book and the motivation behind it.

She has lived in Cambourne for 8 years and has been interested in writing for as long as she can remember. Having retired, she looked for something to do and eventually joined the local 'Words for Pleasure' group that meets regularly in Cambourne library.

There, she was greatly encouraged by the leader, Pat Callaghan, and has written many poems and rhymes, some of which have been published in local papers.

When I asked Lucy why she wrote the book, she told me that, in effect, the book wrote itself! She was on a walk round Cambourne and gradually the idea formed in her head until it was ready to be written down when she returned home. The story is intended for 6-9 year olds, the ages of her own grandchildren, and it has strong educational themes including ambition, hero-worship and inclusivity.

It was the first book Lucy had written for children - having previously written short stories for adults - and she told me she was inspired by Julia Donaldson, of whom she is a great admirer.

On re-reading the story, after a life-time in education, and determined not to 'dumb-down' for children, Lucy replaced some words with more interesting and challenging ones, such as 'injudicious', 'aristocratic' 'truffles' and 'forage', which she hoped might spark an interest in and love of words such as she has enjoyed.

Lucy's early life was on a farm, surrounded by animals and she found that the main character for her book, Quintus Porker, appeared in her imagination ready-made, probably from those early experiences.

This is the first of many stories she has written, all based on the hero, Quintus. Each story has a different subject, such as 'The French Lesson', 'The importance of Water', 'the School Quiz', and she told me



she would love to think that parents and educators will find a lot to talk about in her first children's story, entitled 'The Adventures and Education of Quintus Porker'



**Cambourne Town Football Club** is delighted to announce it is Cambridgeshire FA's Grassroots Club of the Year for 2023.


The award came on the same day that our Under 13 Reds team coach Mark King was also recognised as Cambridgeshire FA's New Volunteer of the Year.
