Cambourne teenager races to a podium finish

Cambourne resident and professional racing driver Daryl DeLeon added to his trophy cabinet and list of titles by being crowned Motorsports UK, British Endurance Championship, 2023 overall Champion.



This year Daryl raced in several championships, including British Touring Cars, but the 18 year old also raced a Porsche 991 Carrera Cup Car in The British Endurance Championship.

Daryl drove alongside Bradley Thurston, the car's owner, Daryl being the professional driver in the Pro/AM (professional/amateur) driver pairing.

The championship was a close fight right up until the last round of the season, where Daryl and Bradley started the two hour race at Donnington Park back on the 14th of October with only a two point lead over Championship rivals Mat George and Chris Jones in their Mercedes GT.

In difficult mixed weather conditions Daryl eventually crossed the line to take the class win and win the British Endurance Championship overall title by just four points, but he didn't get his hands on the trophy until he was officially presented with it at a prestigious award ceremony on 11 November.

Cambourne's only teenage professional driver is still weighing up offers in British Touring Car, Porsche Carrera Cup or British GT for the 2024 season but whatever Championship he decides to race in, we look forward to following his progress and *Cambourne Crier* and residents of Cambourne wish him every success.

Youth Building

Make wild resolutions with the Wildlife Trust



Happy New Year! Practical conservation work often happens in the autumn and winter to reduce the impact on breeding birds and other wildlife. It's also the time of year when deciduous trees are dormant, with energy drawn back into the roots, trunk and larger central branches, so management has a smaller impact on individual plants. When carrying out work that requires heavy machinery, the Wildlife Trust also take the ground conditions into consideration - Like large-scale forestry work in our woodland reserves happens early autumn before it gets too muddy.

Here on Cambourne nature reserve our monthly volunteer work party carry out a mixture of habitat work and maintenance on visitor infrastructure. Recently, they have been opening up a path through Great Common Wood (between the cricket pavilion and Sirius Lake), to enable easier legitimate access for more people, and hopefully help reduce anti-social behaviour.

Our hardworking volunteer wardens also joined Cambridge Conservation Volunteers to do some hedgelaying along Crow Dean bridleway, led by our knowledgeable, long-serving wardens of Hardwick Wood nature reserve. Hedgelaying is a traditional craft used to encourage thicker growth of hedgerows at the base,



whilst reducing the height to make them easier to manage: a difficult skill, because the main stems of bushes are cut through, but not all the way. The stems are then laid down on top of each other, and in the spring, the plants will grow new branches.

Several regular work parties take place in the special woodland nature reserves of the West Cambs 100s: Hardwick Wood, Gamlingay Wood and Waresley & Gransden Woods, doing mostly coppicing work over the winter months. Throughout the year, our community rangers are out on these reserves helping people to use the sites sustainably, picking up litter, and submitting wildlife records.

As a Trust we rely on volunteers to multiply the effect of our conservation work, and on our members whose membership helps fund, for example, the purchase of tools, and monitor the impact of management on our reserves. The rollout of electric vehicles in the UK

I recently gave evidence to the House of Lords climate change select committee on the UK's support for the take up of electric cars and the roll out of the charging network.

The number of pure electric cars sold jumped 45% last year. Our rollout of electric vehicles is similar to France and Germany, and ahead of Southern Europe and North America.

I will legislate to ensure that 80% of all cars sold are zero emission by 2030 - this one piece of legislation will reduce carbon dioxide emissions by 400 million tonnes over the next decade, and will be the single biggest measure the

Government has taken to tackle climate change. We would not be able to do this if we were in the EU, as it infringes single market rules.

I attended a breakfast event hosted by EV Network with electric car charge point operators to discuss how to accelerate the UK's electric charge point network. The number of charge points increased by nearly 50% in the past year and there are now over 50,000 public charge points (in car parks, service stations, or the sides of streets), of which about a fifth are rapid charge points (50MW or over). The members of ChargeUK, which represents the industry, are investing over £6bn in expanding the network.

Still on the subject of cars I met residents for a coffee morning in Cambourne, to talk about local concerns and regulation of self-driving cars.

The best part of being a district councillor is having the opportunity to serve your community.

This regularly involves attending meetings and ensuring that the needs of Cambourne residents are at the forefront of the minds of officers of the Council and other bodies when decisions are being made.

However, the other side of this work is when I am contacted by residents who need support with specific issues that are affecting them either individually or as communities.

To give a couple of recent examples, in the last couple of months:

I have been able to help residents in West Cambourne to get their bin collections sorted during the ongoing construction work which has led to bins being missed, as well as being able to help residents in Broad Street to have the leaves which have beem dropped by the beautiful avenue of trees that adorn the entrance to our town, swept up by the district council's street cleaning team.

It is often easier for councillors to get this work sorted as we can make direct contact with the district council due to our elected role.

Tired all of the time?

Feeling tired all the time is incredibly common.

There can be physical causes of unexplained tiredness, particularly if there are other symptoms such as change in weight, blood loss, snoring breathlessness, change in bowel habit or other gut symptoms, peeing a lot or extreme thirst.

Conditions including anaemia, thyroid problems, sleep apnoea, pregnancy, diabetes, coeliac disease and vitamin deficiencies can all result in tiredness.

Psychological causes of tiredness are common. Anxiety can affect sleep and anxiety, stress and depression can lead to feeling more tired than normal.

Lifestyle factors can also lead to tiredness with shift work, children and simply not getting enough sleep playing their part.

Alcohol can significantly affect sleep, causing waking in the night and reduced quality of sleep.

Although feeling tired all the time is common, it isn't normal, so talking things through with a GP can be helpful and reassuring.

There are also many other things that can help such as recognising the importance of sleep without distractions (such as phones), cutting out caffeine (gradually to avoid headaches), managing stress, maintaining a healthy



Cleaning up the Mess. Well, January has arrived and with it a chance to do a little purging in our lives. I do not know about you but several bits from last year deserve no part in my life this year. I want to leave certain aspects of 2023 back there and keep on walking forward.

Now we can adjust and improve but some things need more than we can do. We turn for help as believers to the Lord. I cannot tell you what an improvement is made at times when I put away all distractions and spend time in prayer and bible reading. One of my favorite passages is in Psalm 119 and verse 9 Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? By taking heed thereto according to thy word. Like a refreshing breeze, it cleans and places things in perspective. The word tells of saving faith not in ourselves but in the Lord. 
