Anniversary celebrations:

A BRIEF HISTORY OF CAMBOURNE

The first brick was laid in the construction of Cambourne in 1998 and the first house was sold and occupied in 1999. The new town was originally going to be named Monkfield, after the farm on which it was situated. This is commemorated by Monkfield Lane in Great Cambourne, Monkfield Medical Practice and the village pub, The Monkfield Arms.

However, the name was eventually created from the names of Cambridge and Bourn. However Cambourne gained a letter 'e' on the end of Bourn.

Cambourne has seen just four MPs since 1999 starting with Andrew Lansley (Conservative) who was elected in 2017, followed by Heidi Allen in 2019 - who was originally elected as a Conservative before co-founding and joining Change UK then finally joining the Liberal Democrats. Anthony Browne was elected for the Conservative Party in 2019 and in 2024 Ian Sollom was elected for the Liberal Democrats.

The population of Cambourne in 2001 was a mere 1,200 people, increasing to 8,200 10 years later in 2011 with the latest census in 2021 putting the population at over 12,000 residents.

Cambourne is also home to people of many ethnic backgrounds and different religions and their events and celebrations are widely reported in *Cambourne Crier*, which itself has a multi-racial editorial team including members from Asia, the Caribbean, the United States, Eastern Europe and the UK. Former MP Anthony Browne, when interviewed by *Cambourne Crier* in 2021, was proud to hold up Cambourne as an example of people of all backgrounds living together in harmony.

It was widely reported in the media in the late 2000s that Cambourne had a higher percentage birth rate than India, China, Indonesia, Brazil and the USA due to the high proportion of young couples choosing Cambourne as their home.

We look forward to the 25 year celebrations throughout the year, made special by you, the residents of Cambourne.

Wildlife Trust BCN update: October 2024

There are so many great facts about traditionally scary wildlife. Here are a few that didn't make it into my spooky family night walk over October half term. These species can be found on Cambourne Nature Reserve and surrounding countryside.

Labyrinth spiders are common in rough grass and hedgerow. Their webs are dense flat sheets and have a funnel at the back where they hide. Did you know, spiders have reflective eyes?

Bats are one of the few UK animals that truly hibernate (along with hedgehogs and dormice). Common pipistrelles are still a mystery...ecologists don't really know where they roost in winter, but they know they need spaces that are consistently cool like

Short-eared owls arrive in the autumn and stay over the winter. They can sometimes be seen hunting in open areas in the daytime, although they are mostly nocturnal. They spend the day resting on the ground.

Crows usually hang out individually or in pairs, and are all black with a black beak. Rooks are often in large groups, they have a grey base to their beak and look like they are wearing feathery short trousers!

Toads spend only a short time in water, around breeding time in early spring. They spend the winter dormant, buried in mud or compost heaps, or hiding in old mouse burrows, they can be woken by warmer weather. They are a similar size to frogs. Girls are bigger than boys.

Our volunteer work parties spend time on habitat management over the winter as this is the time that causes least disturbance to wildlife. There are other options for volunteering including a new opportunity to help toads in Papworth Everard. Please get in touch if you are interested in helping out.



Winter Fuel Payments

September, as I write this, is a strange month for MPs with a brief return to Westminster before another break for party conferences.

The return to Westminster was dominated by the government's decision to restrict the Winter Fuel Payment to only those in receipt of Pension Credit - a decision I voted against. There is potentially a case for means testing the payment, but the pension credit mechanism chosen by the government is poor and will result in hardship for those on and around the boundary.

A House of Lords committee looking at the decision concluded that "the policy seems to be being introduced at a pace that does not permit appropriate scrutiny" and that they were "unconvinced by the reasons given for the

urgency". I sincerely hope the government takes a better approach to their decision making around the upcoming budget.

Following the Lib Dem party conference I was asked by Ed Davey to take the role of Lib Dem spokesperson on Universities and Skills - which I was delighted to do. There are significant challenges for both higher education and the provision of skills and training both locally and across the UK. My primary focus however, will continue to be on our constituency. Here in Cambourne, I am arranging to meet with the developer of the High Street proposals. Like the Town Council, which voted against supporting these plans, I have some significant concerns and everyone in Cambourne deserves to know how the issues raised will be addressed because it's well past time we had a High Street.

Good to talk at **Cambourne fete**

I recently had the great privilege to be part of the Cambourne Fete, organised by the Town Council. We were blessed with a lovely day of autumn sunshine and it was fantastic to see so many fellow Cambourne residents enjoying an afternoon at this community event.

I was helping to run the 'History of Cambourne' stall with Councillor Helene Leeming, and we welcomed hundreds of people during the afternoon who came to look at the photos of the development of our town from its earliest days in 1999 through to today, in our 25th year as a community. It really does feel as if we are on the cusp of a huge step forwards for Cambourne and I will be doing all I can to get these improvements in place for us all.

Cancer of the womb

Cancer of the womb (uterus) occurs most commonly after the menopause. Usually it develops in the lining of the womb (endometrium) and may be described as endometrial cancer.

The main symptoms of cancer of the womb are vaginal bleeding or spotting in someone who has been through the menopause or bleeding between periods or unusually heavy bleeding. Other symptoms may include pain or swelling in the area of the pelvis, lower back pain, blood in wee or pain during sex. Although these symptoms may be caused by other less serious causes, it is

important to mention them to a doctor.

Cancer of the womb is affected by high levels of oestrogen. This can be the case for those who are overweight; those with polycystic ovary syndrome; those who went through the menopause after 55 years old or with some types of hormone replacement therapy (HRT).

There is also an increased risk of womb cancer in those with diabetes; a family history of cancer of the bowel, womb or ovaries or those who have previously had radiotherapy on their pelvis. Risks of womb cancer can be reduced by keeping a healthy weight, eating and exercising well and talking through the best options for HRT with your

Shining a Light on a Dark Night

I wonder how many different sources of light can you think of? I'll give you three to start: 1) the sun, 2) a night light, 3) a lighthouse...

Did you know that in the Bible Jesus describes himself as a light, in fact, he says he is "the light of the world" (John 8.12). A light that gives life, like the sun. A light that helps us feel safe, like a night light. And a light that guides us, like a lighthouse. What's even more special about Jesus' light is that it always shines in the darkness and never goes out (John 1.5).

There's a song we sing in Young Church where we encourage each other to "let your light shine!" To reflect Jesus' light to others and to share our hope for the future - hope for a world without darkness and pain. So, here's our plan...







Take Charge and Be Safe!

Over the last year or so, Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service has seen an increase in fires involving lithium-ion batteries. E-bikes, e-scooters, mobile phones, laptops, game console controllers, cordless tools and garden machinery, all use lithium-ion batteries that can heat up and catch fire if not used correctly.

Keep safe by following our top tips for charging safety: Charge batteries when you are awake and alert, do not charge e-bikes and e-scooters in escape routes, only use the battery, charger and cables supplied by the manufacturer, before you go to bed, check anything still charging is switched off, do not overload sockets.

Lithium-ion batteries can't be disposed of in your regular household recycling. Doing so can cause fires, either in the refuse vehicles or at the waste processing centres. Never put any kind of battery in with your household rubbish or recycling! Any kind of battery can cause a fire if not

disposed of correctly and safely. This includes vapes or other e-cigarettes as well as standard batteries.

Fires involving batteries cause damage to refuse vehicles and roads, as well as significant delays to bin collections and road closures.

Children are getting ready to explore the cosmos on a smaller scale. CERC is participating in the European Space Agency (ESA) endorsed CanSat competition for the second year!



20 years of Parkrun

This October marks the 20th birthday of Parkrun. It started back in October 2004 when 13 runners and five volunteers turned up at Bushy Park in London for a free, timed, 5km run on a Saturday morning. Since then, more than 9 million people have registered for Parkrun. There are now more than 2,300 Parkrun and Junior Parkrun events taking place every week around the world. This includes our own Cambourne Junior Parkrun.

Parkrun is a global health and wellbeing charity that aims to get more people physically active, be social and be outdoors. It's fun, inclusive and completely free to access.

You don't need to be a fast runner to take part, with plenty of slow runners and walkers taking part each week. Every local event is run entirely by volunteers, and volunteering at parkrun can be a fun way to socialise and make friends.

Although Cambourne doesn't have a 5km parkrun, there are many a short drive or bus ride away. This includes four events in Cambridge - the nearest of which is Storeys Field at Eddington as well as events at Wimpole Estate and Pocket Park in St Neots, amonast others.

You can see many Cambourne residents venturing out to one or more of these events each week. All 5km events are free, open to all ages and abilities and take place at 9am every Saturday morning.

We are lucky enough to have a 2km Junior Parkrun right here in Cambourne. It takes place every Sunday morning at 9am on the sports playing fields and is open to children aged 4 to 14. Parents are also allowed to join in with their children, if they wish.





Cambourne Junior Parkrun celebrated its third birthday at the end of July. In its first three years, more than 600 local children have completed a total of over 4,000 runs.
