I'm here to put family and a sense of community back at the heart of Cambourne, with the pub being a place to meet, chat and spend a few hours in good

company. I can't wait to meet more of the locals and welcome anyone who wants to pop in and say hello.

"I'm also looking forward to bringing some festive cheer as we prepare ourselves for the Christmas crowds, so be sure to pop in for festive drinks or a sit down to take a load off all that shopping!"

Wildlife Trust BCN Update: Nov 2024

Our hedgerows are really diverse "edge" habitat for wildlife, providing shelter, corridors, and food. If you look after a hedgerow that needs cutting back, please consider leaving it until the berries have been eaten.

Winter migrants like redwings and fieldfares are often seen in large flocks feasting on the bounty! Here are some of the berries you might find in hedgerows this time of year. Please admire the autumn fruits without foraging on our nature reserves.

Hawthorn: small, dark red, slightly ovoid berries, with a dark circle at the end. There are two types of hawthorn in our area, the less common midland hawthorn is found in some of our ancient woodlands. The berries look similar to common hawthorn, but they have two seeds per fruit. Rose: large, deep red, ovoid berries, on thorny stems.

Black bryony: large, shiny, bright red, spherical berries on a climbing plant.

Sloes: single purple/blue berries often with a matt coating Ivy: spherical clusters of green berries ripening to black over winter. These berries are important for wildlife as they are a food source later in the winter.

Coming along to our events is a great way to support the Trust, and to meet staff and volunteers to chat about our work. Our annual Christmas Fair is on Friday 29th November 3-7pm at our head office in Cambourne. You can buy nature-related Christmas gifts, take part in a festive raffle, entertain your children with some sustainable crafts, and enjoy a mince pie!

Another way to support our work is to volunteer. Please get in touch to ask about opportunities to do practical work, support our community work, or be involved with indoor tasks.



Remember, remember to celebrate safely!

Bonfire Night is a very popular fixture in the calendar but while it can be fun, there are lots of potential hazards so it's really important to keep you and your family safe. Help support your local community this year and go to an organised firework display instead of holding one at home.

In the wrong hands fireworks can cause injury and damage to property. They are explosives and as such should be treated with respect and only used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and the firework safety code.

Firework safety tips

Only buy fireworks with a CE mark. Light fireworks at arm's length using a taper, stand well back and never go back to a lit firework. Never throw fireworks or put them in your pockets or clothing. Light sparklers one at a time wearing gloves, and place used sparklers in a bucket of water. Never give sparklers to children under five. Keep your pets indoors throughout the evening.

It is illegal to sell fireworks to someone under the age of 18 or to light fireworks in a public place.

Respect your neighbours - don't let off fireworks late at night and remember there are laws to follow. Visit www.cambsfire.gov.uk to see what organised fireworks displays are happening around the county.

Bonfire safety

Lighting a bonfire in a garden presents a significant risk if it gets out of hand, so residents are encouraged to think twice before having their own displays and lighting bonfires. Not only this, but the smoke can also aggravate neighbours with respiratory problems.

If you do decide to have a bonfire, please follow our top five tips:

- 1. Build your bonfire well clear of buildings, garden sheds, fences and hedges.
- 2. Never use flammable liquids to start a bonfire, and never burn dangerous items such as aerosol cans, paint tins, foam



furniture, or batteries.

- 3. Don't leave bonfires unattended. An adult should supervise it until it has burnt out. If it has to be left, damp it down with plenty of water.
- 4. Always keep a bucket of water or a hosepipe nearby in case of fire
- 5. Check the weather avoid lighting bonfires in high winds.

Fair funding for Primary Health in Cambridgeshire

Returning to Parliament this month after recess, it was a great privilege to make my maiden speech as the first ever MP for St Neots and Mid Cambridgeshire.

I was particularly pleased to be able to do so in a debate on Lord Darzi's investigation into the NHS in England, as access to healthcare services was the number one issue that constituents raised during the General Election campaign. This is especially pertinent to Cambourne, where growth and a funding freeze in Cambridgeshire have made GP access increasingly difficult. The problem of funding stagnation is not only a problem for health

services either – one of the most egregious examples shared with me this month was of funding still based on 2023 population figures.

Securing fairer funding for primary healthcare in Cambridgeshire is a priority for me, and I will continue to push for this in Parliament.

I also met with the Cambourne High Street developer this month, who told me that their proposed design is the only one that can deliver a functional high street that is commercially viable. I know how much residents are desperate to see progress – and I am too. However, like a number of people, I remain concerned about the design of the streetscape and the priority given to motor traffic. I have further meetings planned with the Greater Cambridge Planning Service to understand their thinking and see if modifications are possible.

Gallstones

The gallbladder is a small organ which stores and concentrates a liquid called bile made by the liver. Bile helps us digest fats in our food and is released by the gallbladder when needed. Gallstones are small stones that form in the gallbladder - usually made of cholesterol. Gallstones are more likely to happen in those who are female, overweight and over 40 years old.

Often people have gallstones and they do not cause any problems but sometimes a stone may move and become trapped in an opening (duct) in the gallbladder. This can cause intense and sudden pain, usually in the right side of the tummy, below the ribs.

The pain is called biliary colic and can last several hours and may come on after eating fatty foods.

Sometimes the gallbladder may become inflamed, which is called cholecysitis. If this happens then you may develop a high temperature, the pain may be constant and there may also be yellowing of the skin or eyes (jaundice). It is important to report these symptoms to a doctor. It is possible to live normally without a gallbladder, so if the problem is caused by gallstones then it may be suggested that the gallbladder should be removed by keyhole surgery.



Did you watch the recent BBC documentary 'Slavery on the High Street'? It revealed that for years a house in Cambourne was being used to hold modern day slaves. I was left feeling nauseous and shaken. I will not be the only one asking myself, "How could that happen here?" and "Why didn't we see what was happening under our noses?"

We can educate ourselves to recognise some of the signs and red flags. There are various courses and websites giving such information, for example www.ourwatch.org.uk/modern-slavery/spotting-the-signs.

I am reminded of a story in the Bible about the brothers Cain and Abel. There is a famous line when Cain asks God, "Am I my brother's keeper?" The question is never explicitly answered, but the implication is clear. We have a duty of care one for another.

A few of you may remember Carrie Pemberton-Ford. She was the minister who first helped to establish Cambourne Church 25 years ago, working to build community among the earliest residents. In more recent times Carrie has devoted herself to countering human trafficking, and she founded the Cambridge Centre for Applied Research in Human Trafficking where she still works. Carrie has dared to look at evil and suffering, and not to turn away. It is so much easier to turn a blind eye, but that is not an acceptable option. As the philosopher John Stuart Mill once said, "Bad men need nothing more to compass their ends, than that good men should look on and do nothing."

Peacehaven Baptist Church: Pastoral Thoughts

Remembering those who served.

Once a year, we take time to remember those who fell in service to their nations. This day commemorates the armistice of the Western Front in World War I, which took effect at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918. We mark this remembrance on the second Sunday of November, gathering around memorial stones and monuments, often engraved with the names of the

fallen. Parades and special events are held, not as acts of idolatry but as solemn commemoration.

Much like the stones of the ephod, the brazen censers, or the altar of stones taken up from the Jordan in Joshua chapter four, these monuments serve as tangible reminders. They invite future generations to ask, "What do these stones mean? Whose names are inscribed here, and why?" Such memorials help preserve the memory of those who gave their lives in service to their country.

As you may know, I hold great respect for veterans, both fallen and living. They all stepped forward when called and pledged

themselves to serve others. I find great meaning in visiting places like Duxford, learning about the sacrifice and service of these individuals. I understand their commitment, having made that pledge myself. As a dual national, I served in the USAF during the first Gulf War, and our unit suffered casualties. Sacrifice, patriotism, and love for those who share righteous values are noble when pursued in a righteous manner.

However, some in society argue that respecting veterans or having national pride is wrong. They claim it's divisive, that any joy in one's nation is misplaced. The irony is that they have the freedom to express these views because veterans and patriots - who valued freedom more than life itself - fought and bled for that right. Their sacrifices secured the freedom to speak, whether wisely or foolishly. So, this month, take time to remember those who sacrificed for you. Some did so on foreign battlefields, others in our cities, and one made the ultimate sacrifice on a hill far away, on an old rugged cross, so that you might have the chance for true freedom in Him.

Scout and Guides HQ scheme receives significant council grant

More than £360,000 in grants were allocated to boost rural life in South Cambridgeshire by the Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF), which is aimed at supporting rural communities and businesses in building long-term resilience.

A £90,000 grant was allocated to Cambourne Town Council towards creating shared activity space in the planned modular building so that the local Scout and Guide groups and the Cambourne shedders which do not have a permanent home have a setting where they can meet and call home.

The latest round of grants takes it to a total of 26 projects in the district to receive money from Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) which is the lead authority for the Fund, while South Cambridgeshire District Council is responsible for grant scheme delivery and allocation.



Cambourne residents' 25 years of memories

In response to our article regarding 25 years of Cambourne, one of the first residents of Cambourne has kindly written to us with their memories of 24 years ago.

Dear Editors,

We moved here in June 2001. The removal vans had not long gone, when Pam and Roger Hume turned up on their bikes to bid us welcome and give us an information pack.

It was how the community was nurtured.

The pack told us that the church would meet in the Doctors Surgery waiting room. So we joined the church and soon after the minister advised me that local churches and the local authority had given money to buy Cambourne's first community building.

It turned out to be two temporary class rooms in the old school, which, after much helpful cooperation from the authorities and much prayer we managed to turn it into the Ark (so named as it was delivered in a gale to a sea of mud).

In those day we were called pioneers and every one mucked in.

There are some wonderful stories how the person with the right skill was available at just the right time to convert the building into the Church, which had two rooms, a kitchen and toilets.

It was dedicated to the the retiring Bishop of Huntingdon. During the week it was used by many different groups.

Those who benefitted from it were sad to see it go, as it brought back such happy memories.

More memories

There are two early memories of Cambpurne that are quite unique. My husband and I moved to Cambourne in April 2000 and in 2003 an artist in residence was appointed with a view to using the arts as an "innovative way of marketing Cambourne". One of the four events was a house party, where invited guests were encouraged to draw, paint and interact with each other. There was even a naked man on the bed upstairs, who did place a towel strategically when he realised children were present. (Not that that stopped them from drawing him as he was). At the end of the project, which culminated with an exhibition at the business park and Wysing Arts, we were given a copy of the resulting publication Glasshouse, which I still have.

Several years later The Hub, a much needed community space, was finally built. To celebrate, the developers invited residents to a 'Strictly' evening. Camilla Dalyrup and Ian Thwaite, who were both involved in the show, came and performed a few show dances. After that they taught us several dances (at one point I danced with Ian Thwaite, who was very kind). The rest of the evening we were able to use our new skills, dancing to a live band.

Moving from Cambridge, I was unsure we were making the right move but I have loved living here and seeing Cambourne develop, though not always in the way we would have wanted. Despite this, I believe we have kept a good sense of community and am certain we made the right decision all those years ago.

Students have their say on climate action

Young people were encouraged to find solutions for local climate and environment action when South Cambridgeshire District Council held a meeting in a school for the first time.

Comberton Village College hosted the event with around 40 students taking part in morning workshops on five themes of water resources, circular economy and fast fashion, sustainable food, biodiversity, nature and green spaces, and air quality.

This was followed by an official meeting of the District Council's Climate and Environment Advisory Committee (CEAC) where young people put forward questions and suggestions for debate.

Cllr Brian Milnes, South Cambridgeshire District Council's Lead Cabinet Member for Environment, was at the school and said: "Young people are the driving force of our future, and their voices are crucial in shaping how we tackle the climate emergency."

The event was arranged following a recent Young People Task and Finish group, where the District Council committed to holding a CEAC meeting in a school. Comberton Village College was chosen to host the event as it is a key member of the Cambridgeshire Sustainable Schools Network.

Cllr Dr Lisa Redrup, District Councillor for Comberton, and a member of CEAC who attended the day, said: "The students were so engaged with the work we're trying to do and had fantastic ideas. The students should be proud of what they came up with - amazing work all around!"

Peter Law, Principal at Comberton Village College, said: "We were delighted to welcome students from local schools to join with us, the District Council and our MP to discuss local solutions to the international climate crisis."

Comberton Village College boasts a low carbon heat network thanks to two ground source heat pumps, which take the secondary school completely off oil heating and replaces oil boilers that were approaching the end of their life. The pumps extract heat through a network of underground pipes in the college car parks and is one of the largest ground source heat pump networks in a UK secondary school.



The project was a result of the Cam Academy Trust working in partnership with Cambridgeshire County Council and Bouygues Energies and Services. As well as reducing carbon, the project will save the college around £931,000, over the 20-year equipment lifetime.

South Cambridgeshire District Council is committed to helping make the district Net Zero by 2050. Councillors declared a climate emergency in 2019 and a Climate Emergency Toolkit was created for local residents, businesses and community groups who want to take action. Cllr Brian Milnes, Lead Cabinet Member for the Environment, said: "By coming together, we are not only showcasing innovative solutions but also demonstrating our shared commitment to a sustainable future."

The Local Climate Action Conference and evening fair are open to everyone. Speakers will include Cambridgeshire County Council, Joolz Thompson of Community Climate Action UK, the Centre for Climate Engagement, Cambridge Retrofit Hub and Elisabeth Goodman Spain of Sustainable Shepreth. The 2024 event has been arranged following the success of last year's inaugural Local Climate Action Conference attended by residents, councillors and climate action groups, who shared their ideas and vision for the future of a net zero district. Attendees were impressed at the local knowledge about climate change and ideas on what we can all do to make a difference.

One of the District Council's core visions is to help the district become net zero by 2050. As part of this, it set up a Zero Carbon Communities grant scheme in 2019 and has given more than half a million pounds to 82 projects locally, aimed at reducing carbon emissions and engaging communities on climate change such as tree planting, energy efficient heating and lighting and tackling food waste.

Grand Garba Nights Light Up Cambourne


