

Wildlife Trust BCN Update: April 2025

Volunteers of the Wildlife Trust BCN Cambourne work

party were busy over winter. With help from Cambridge Conservation Volunteers, local Youth Rangers, and staff, they have been laying a hedge in Upper Cambourne. Hedge laying is a traditional craft which involves cutting and bending shrubs and small trees to create a living fence. This benefits wildlife by creating structural diversity, with thicker areas closer to the ground enabling birds to nest and small animals to move under cover. Hedge laying at this spot is also allowing more light to penetrate adjacent woodland which will encourage woodland plants to grow.

Volunteers have also installed a new bench near the solar farm on the perimeter bridleway. The Wildlife Trust BCN is planning to install more benches along this path as well as by Whomping Willow lake in the upcoming months.

Last year, Cambourne Work Party volunteers started to repair flooded areas of the bridleway around Cambourne. This work is ongoing, and we will resurface badly affected areas as well as digging more drainage ditches to deal with more regularly occurring flash flooding.

If you are keen to improve your local nature reserve for people and wildlife, please consider volunteering. There are volunteer opportunities that support practical work, surveying, and community work, as well as other areas. Find out more at wildlifebcn.org/get-involved/volunteer





Primary Health Care in Cambourne

I recently visited Monkfield Medical Practice where I heard that the fast-growing population in Cambourne is not matched by the funding given to its GP surgery, nor by the size of the surgery's building space.

The surgery is clearly doing their best to provide patients with good access to healthcare; they are now using their limited space better and so are able to offer more appointments. But they need a longer-term solution.

I will be making representations later this month to the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Integrated Care Board, who set the healthcare strategy for the area, in order to address these issues and work towards getting fairer funding for these surgeries. An issue regarding child maintenance service was raised at one of my recent surgeries, when I met a constituent who had been having issues with the Child Maintenance Service (CMS) that went back years – their payments were constantly missed and unenforced, leaving them in and out of arrears.

They were hitting a brick wall when trying to contact the Service about this.

In late February, I led a parliamentary debate on fixing the CMS which gathered support from MPs of all backgrounds.

By raising this crisis directly with the Government, I hope we will be able to effect much needed change for both paying and receiving parents.

Local Government Reform for South Cambs

The organisation of the councils that serve Cambourne is going to change as we move to a unitary authority by the end of the current parliament in 2029. A unitary council combines the services currently provided by a district council and a county council. Some services will be transferred to parish or town councils.

At present we have Cambourne Town Council, South Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridgeshire County Council. We also have an elected mayor for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough running the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority as well as the Greater Cambridge Partnership managing transport strategies. A number of options are on the table for the South Cambs, including a Greater Cambridge unitary of Cambridge and South Cambs or Greater Cambridge plus East Cambridgeshire or Greater Cambridge plus Huntingdonshire. These will be reviewed by the government based on representations from the existing councils and local residents before a decision is made.

What we do know is that these changes are going to happen and it is up to councillors at all levels to do what they can to make it work. It is going to be a challenging time, but we hope that at the end a simpler and more efficient model of local government can be established for Cambourne.

Meningitis: A medical emergency

Meningitis is an infection of the membranes surrounding the brain and spinal cord (meninges).

It is most serious when caused by bacteria, but can also be caused by viruses which are less likely to cause long term problems. It can develop at any age but is most common in children and young adults.

Meningitis can be very dangerous if not treated quickly and can cause damage to the brain or nerves. It can also cause sepsis which can be life-threatening. People with meningitis who are rapidly treated in hospital often recover well. However, some may need amputations or have long term problems affecting hearing, sight, balance, memory and movement.

The symptoms of meningitis develop quickly and can include fever, vomiting, headache, stiff neck, drowsiness, seizures (fits) and a dislike of bright lights. In some cases a rash can develop which does not fade when a glass is rolled over it. Not all of these symptoms happen in every case. Meningitis is a medical emergency, so if you think that someone might have it, call 999 or go straight to A&E. *Reference/further information:*

Update from Monkfield Medical Practice

Staffing Update

We have now recruited for our last vacancies and are running fully staffed, working towards improving and protecting the wellbeing of Cambourne. As the population expands, we will keep track of numbers and staff ratios to ensure we have adequate health care and administrative provision.

Winter cover

Our Primary Care Network (PCN) provided additional GP cover over the winter months giving our patient population an additional 400 appointments supporting us to manage an increase in demand. We have also increased the PCN team with Neurodiversity Young people support workers who help to bridge the gap in waiting times of referrals, and a matron supporting our house bound patients.

Training Practice

Since becoming training practice, we have supported three GP Trainees, providing additional appointments to our patient population. Thus alongside supporting a returning-to-practice GP after a period of time away.

Work experience

We have now given three local students work experience placements in the last twelve months and have a further four during 2025. The aim of our program is to give local students the opportunity to have an insight into the medical profession and support any application onto further education opportunities. We also have attended two career events at Cambourne Village College.

Research

We have joined the INDIGO study, which will explore the long term impacts on patients who have had cancer. We are also getting a good response for CANRISK – finding women with a high genetic risk for cancer.

We are wrapping up the TIMES trial (insomnia in those with dementia) and RELIEF (an asthma inhaler trial). We are waiting to hear back from several commercial studies. We have had a research pop-up in the local foodbank to see what we can do to engage underserved populations in our research, to make the findings more relevant to them.

COVID Vaccinations

COVID-19 vaccines will be offered at the practice during April for eligible adults. The virus changes and protection fades over time so it is important to top up your protection if you are in an eligible group: are aged 75 or over OR 6 months - to 74 years and have a weakened immune system because of a health condition or treatment OR live in a care home for older adults.

Practice Development

We are very appreciative to have the monthly practice closures and over the last three months have received invaluable learning opportunities as a result. Practice Improvements

We have been engaged in a program that focuses on our practice needs; managing demand, improving patient experience of access, developing the team and job satisfaction. Throughout this program we have engaged with both staff, patients and gathered data that support us to make informed improvements throughout our patient journey. We take this opportunity to share a couple with you:

- In the hope to spread our demand across the day and not have a rush at 8am we have implemented access during 8am and 4pm to all appointment, prescription, referral, result and general administrative enquires to come through our online portal. We run a duty doctor triage system and your medical need will continue to be assessed throughout the day and within our capacity, therefore preventing you having to hang on the telephone lines in a queue. In addition to this we have been promoting use of the NHS app, where you can view your medical record and see your test results, letters and consultations. By using these methods, we free up the reception and the telephone lines for those patients who are unable.

- Coupled with this, we have implemented within our SMS appointment reminders the ability for our patients to cancel their appointments if they can no longer attend. This in turn reduces the number of unattended appointments and gives others the ability to book appointments throughout the week as they become available using NHS app or online booking.

Wishing you a happy Easter

Easter is much later than usual this year. Unlike Christmas, Easter always falls on a Sunday, which is one of the reasons the date changes. However, there is more to it than that. The date is calculated using the phases of the moon and the date of the spring equinox as key reference points. Like many other religious observances, such as Ramadan, it is based on a lunar calendar.

Christianity traces its roots back into Jewish faith and history and that the date of Easter and the date of the Jewish Passover are connected. The Passover remembers God keeping ancient promises. It remembers God's faithfulness in miraculously freeing a group of slaves, who grew to become a nation. And it remembers sacrificial lambs dying in place of the people. These are all themes which Christians see as pointing to Jesus. At Easter we think of God keeping his promises. We think of him bringing us freedom. And we think of Jesus dying in our place.

So the variable date of Easter is sometimes inconvenient. School holidays change around it. But it does remind us of deep connections to our forebears, and that Easter is not entirely ours to mould into our image and for our own convenience.

So in this April edition of *Cambourne Crier*, I wish you a happy Easter for much later in the month. Enjoy the chocolate, but perhaps also pause to reflect on faithfulness, freedom, and forgiveness through a man who was willing to die for us. **Revd Bill Miller**

years problems came and went but the power alcohol held over me was gone. Now we are not experts but we can teach and we can listen. And hopefully we can learn together. It starts on 2nd April and will run through into July.

We are also preparing for Resurrection Sunday or Easter. Commemorating the death burial and resurrection of Christ. He came that we might be saved, to pay the price for sin for whosoever would come unto Him. It is not about special ceremonies or new clothing or bunnies. An empty cross and an empty tomb but a fulfilled prophecy. I hope you can make it out sometime. Maybe to the main services on Sunday morning or you or someone close to you might need help with addiction. We will do what we can.







Ramadan: A month of reflection and renewal

Ramadan, the ninth month in the

Islamic calendar, is a time of profound spiritual significance. This year the start of Ramadan coincided with the first day of Spring (1st March) and was a glorious sunny day in Cambourne.

Islamic calendar (also known as Hijri calendar) follows a lunar cycle and thus the start of Ramadan□ shifts by around eleven days every year on the Gregorian calendar. We are currently in year 1446 AH marking the 1446th year since the Hijrah (migration) of the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) and his companion from the city of Makkah to the city of Madinah. This migration was made to escape the persecution at the hands of Pagans of Makkah and marks a pivotal moment in the Islamic history.

Ramadan is the month of fasting. The act of fasting promotes self-purification and deepens one's connection with God. The



fast (called Sawm in Arabic) involves abstaining from food and drink from dawn to sunset. However, fasting is much more than physical restraint. It is a period of heightened God-consciousness, abstention from all wrong-doing, cultivation of self-discipline, expression of gratitude and increasing the empathy for those less fortunate.

Fasting starts at dawn and the pre-dawn meal (called Suhoor) is recommended by the Prophet (peace be upon him). This is followed by the morning prayer. The fast is broken at sunset with the evening meal called Iftaar. Suhoor and Iftaar bring families and communities together. Iftaar gatherings are a common sight in Cambourne and Cambourne Cresent (the local Muslim charity) organises multiple community events.

Ramadan is sacred because it is the month of Quran (the holy scripture of



Islam). Muslims dedicate and increased amount of time to Quranic recitation and reflection and the last 10 days hold particular significance, especially the odd nights. Quran was first revealed during one of these nights and so the Muslims observe night prayers.

The conclusion of Ramadan is marked by the celebration of Eid-ul-Fitr, the biggest festival in Islamic calendar. This is a joyful occasion is marked by wearing one's best clothes, offering special communal prayer in the morning, sharing meals, exchanging gifts and thus fostering unity and inclusivity.

Increased ram-raid protection for ATMs

The first heavy-duty planters -

designed to better protect some of South Cambridgeshire's cash machines from ram-raids - have been installed. The idea is to install planters in front of ATMs considered vulnerable to try and deter the destructive robberies.

District Councillors, representatives of Cambourne Town Council and Co-op staff met outside Cambourne's School Lane Co-op on Thursday 20 March to see firsthand the four new planters – which have been filled with flowers by the Town Council. The scheme has been organised on the ground by the South Cambs Community Safety Partnership and Cambourne Town Council are caring for the new plants, as part of their Cambourne greening projects.

Following an increase in ram-raids with vehicles, South Cambridgeshire District Council's Cabinet last year agreed to allocate funding to better protect some ATMs. The funding came from the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund, which is administered locally by the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority. Other ATM sites in South Cambridgeshire will benefit from similar protection soon.

Many cash machines that are attacked get lifted out by a telehandler – a heavyduty forklift, widely used in farming – after a building is rammed by a vehicle. A heavy-duty planter will at least delay, if not prevent, damage and theft.

South Cambridgeshire District Council's Lead Cabinet Member for Communities, Cllr Henry Batchelor, explained: "Cash machines are lifelines for communities, providing convenient access to money. When they are ramraided, it not only disrupts this essential service but also causes significant financial loss and distress to local businesses and residents. It also puts the viability of precious ATMs at risk,



and can cause enormous damage to buildings. Protecting these machines plays an important role in maintaining the stability and security of neighbourhoods."

Cllr Helene Leeming, District Cllr for Cambourne and Representative on the South Cambs Community Safety Partnership, commented: "These planters are both attractive and practical. I am looking forward to seeing planters like this in more locations."

Cambourne Town Cllr Fran Panrucker said: "We're pleased to be working on this joint initiative – it's another great example of partnership working. A lot of people simply cannot travel a long way to get cash out – so this sort of local access is hugely important. Cambourne Town Council has agreed to maintain the planters to keep the flowers looking nice throughout the year."

Senior Operations Manager at the Coop, Joel Mattless, added: "Thank you to all the partners who are working with us on this scheme. Ram-raids are a problem for us in Cambridgeshire – but we want to keep providing ATM services for our communities so they can continue accessing their cash for free. This scheme gives us the confidence to continue having ATMs in our stores."

There are ways that residents can help police anticipate and stop ATM cash machines being ram-raided. You can: Install trackers on high-performance cars and heavy vehicles, such as Transits and flat beds, which could be used in a ram-raid.

Raise concerns if anything doesn't feel quite right, such as plant vehicles

travelling during the hours of darkness, or that are not usually in the area or appear to have been left parked for a few days.
Consider installing video doorbells or CCTV on your home, which could capture something vital.

Report anything suspicious, including anyone taking photos or attaching 'out of order' signs to ATM machines.

If you have any information or concerns, report to Police online or call 101, quoting Op ATMosphere. Always call 999 in an emergency.

Detective Chief Inspector Chris O'Brien, from Cambridgeshire Constabulary, commented: "Putting these planters in place, and working with our partners to deter ram-raids and protect our communities, is incredibly positive. Ram-raids on ATMs cause devastation and misery so this initiative showcases our commitment to tackling serious and organised crime in Cambridgeshire."


