# Windmill Replica restored for National Mills Weekend

(continued from page 1) ... venetian blinds slats from the original creator, Michael Dunn's, house; sanding down the cladding and roof then applying primer, undercoat and two topcoats of paint. The ladder has been completely rebuilt including the handrail and supports then painted. A new window shutter was made to match the existing shutters and with new shutter clips. A new crank handle, replacing rotten wood framing and securing the bottom corner posts with brackets. The shutter sail structure and stocks have been completely rebuilt with new wood strips and strengthened then painted. New bolts have also been provided.

Kate Armstrong, Co-Chair of the Bourn Volunteer team said: "We plan to use the replica to demonstrate how the sails move clothed for our visitors on open days, and for those not able to climb the stairs. It will be an invaluable aid and we are most grateful that the Cambourne Shed team have been able to restore it so beautifully."

# Spot, snap, submit: your wildlife records matter

Submitting official wildlife records is valuable, and data can contribute to research, direct green space management, and inform local planning.

Anyone can submit records directly to the county-based biological records centres, (ours is Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Environmental Records Centre), or using the free app iRecord.

Any wildlife record is valid, from the blackbird in your garden, to the orchid in your nature reserve. If you can get a photo, your record is more likely to be accepted.

You need to know the name of the species though, so here are some identification tips:

- Fold-out guides made by the Field Studies Council are great for common wildlife, fairly cheap, and are accessible for children. There are lots of different guides; I recommend: butterflies, garden birds, trees, woodland plants, and bees.
- Websites: The Wildlife Trust BCN's website has guides, biological keys, and information. The Wildlife Trust BCN's Monitoring and Research Facebook page has knowledgeable staff and volunteers who can help identify all kinds of wildlife. The RSPB website has an A-Z of birds including bird songs The Woodland Trust website has an A-Z of trees.
- Free apps: Merlin is a brilliant app to identify bird song ObsIdentify uses photos to identify any species with a % confidence level.

Seek does a similar thing to ObsIdentify and Froglife's Dragonfinder app helps identify and record reptiles and

Also Google Lens, though this is not as good as other options as it is not regionally specific.

# **Cambridge Nature** Festival 2025: 24th May - 30th June

Now in its fourth year, the Cambridge Nature Festival is back! The festival aims to get us all more in touch with the nature on our doorsteps.

Over 160 events and activities are planned with something for all ages, abilities and interests. There will be guided walks, wild(ish) camping, BioBlitzes, bat punt safaris, tall tree climbing, nature boat trips, guided nature walks, star gazing, wildlife ID workshops, hands-on creative activities such as making seed bombs, and much more. Most of the events are free or low cost

and will take place in Cambridge and the surrounding countryside.

The festival is being organised by local charity Cambridge Past, Present & Future, in collaboration with The Wildlife Trust BCN, The National Trust, RSPB, Cambridge City Council, Cambridge Sports Lake Trust, South Cambs District Council, Magog Trust and Cambridge University Botanic Garden, as part of the Cambridge Nature Network. The National Trust will be holding craft activities and family trails at Wicken Fen. They are running Mucky Pups nature adventures for children, Big Tree Climbing and a number of guided walks at Wimpole Hall.

The next LUC event is a night of Bingo at The Hub on 7th June, tickets sales have been fantastic, and we are heading for a sellout evening; thank you to all

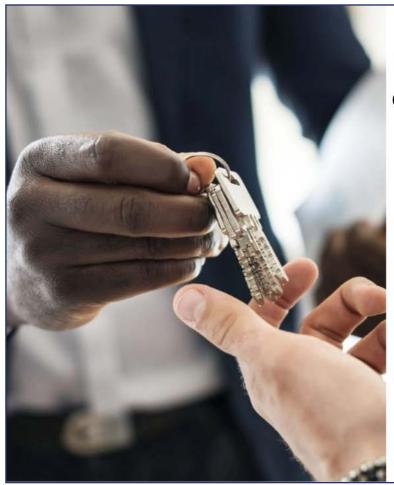


those who support us by coming to our events. LUC are hoping to make Cambourne even prettier this Christmas time and everyone's continued support is the reason why it will happen.

#### Seniors' communities in Cambourne

I am deeply connected with all communities in Cambourne and continuously making plans for their wellbeing, aiming to make Cambourne a happy place for all.

I am concerned about seniors' wellbeing and loneliness in Cambourne hence, my efforts for regular tea parties continue along with the small bus journeys. The minibus seems to be busy for the Cambourne community, especially for the senior members. I am looking for more volunteer drivers if anyone can spare a little time.

At the Cambourne 25 meeting, I emphasised the need for a bus shelter at Broad Street, the main bus stop in Cambourne for seniors.

Currently, I am working on the Science Festival, art exhibitions, sports club, STEM education, chess club, minibus trips, food and cooking projects, and the Cookery Club, which tackles loneliness and helps make new friends.

In early May, I went with a group of children from Cambourne to Harrogate to take part in the National Robotics Competition to compete in the Robotics Nationals for the UK and Ireland championing young people, promoting science and technology and building a community spirit.

I will also be providing more STEM education in Cambourne. The regular classes will run on Fridays from 6 to 7pm at Cambourne Church.

### Cancer of the oesophagus

The oesophagus is the food pipe that connects the mouth to the stomach.

Cancer can occur anywhere along the oesophagus and is most commonly found in men over 75, but can affect anyone.

Cancer of the oesophagus usually causes difficulty or pain when swallowing food with a feeling that food is getting stuck. It can also cause indigestion such as burping, feeling or being sick, heartburn, acid reflux, a hoarse voice, loss of appetite and losing weight unexpectedly. Although there may be other causes for the symptoms, it is important to mention them to a GP who may refer you to have tests that look inside your oesophagus.

Cancer of the oesophagus is more likely in those who have long term, severe acid reflux including those with a condition called Barrett's oesophagus.

Some cancers in the oesophagus are also linked to lifestyle and are more likely in those who smoke, drink too much alcohol or who are overweight. As with all cancers, the earlier cancer of the oesophagus is found, the more likely it can be successfully treated.

Even if things don't seem too troubling, it is important to talk to your GP if you develop new symptoms.

# Taking time to reflect and refresh

Over the coming months I will be on sabbatical leave.

What does that mean?

It means that for three months I will not be engaging with ministry as usual in Cambourne, but rather will be stepping back to read, reflect, and be refreshed. I will be visiting a church and school in Kenya with which Cambourne Church has long been partnering. I will go on a pilgrim walk from Melrose to Lindisfarne. I will be spending time in prayer at a retreat house in Devon. And I will be studying more than usual too. I will still be around in Cambourne, but I will not be in active ministry.

Life is supposed to be punctuated with work and rest. The principle of sabbath or sabbatical is laid out on the very first pages of the Bible, and is reiterated many times.

But what about the church community here? What will happen in my absence? Church has never been about the minister. Every member has a role to play. My last active day until mid-September will be Pentecost Sunday when we celebrate the fact that God's Spirit works through all kinds of people.

Services will continue - sometimes with visiting ministers, but often led by our own people. Our various groups will still run.

If you have a need or a query then the first point of contact will usually be the staff in the church office, as is often the case now. They will then make contact with the person or people who are best placed to help. The church is still here seeking to serve this community.

# Pastoral thoughts: dealing with conflict

Normal Sunday services continue with the occasional battle with Windows not recognising the correct audio output and trying to shove it out of the laptop speakers. Back when I worked in tech support we had a saying 'what is the difference between Microsoft and a virus? A virus usually works'. Of course that was back in the 90s. Now whilst sometimes annoying, it is not a vital conflict.

In our addiction recovery ministry on Wednesdays we spoke a bit about conflict and anger and forgiveness.

Addictions often begin as flawed coping mechanisms. There's a wound or a pressure point in life, and we reach for something - anything - to dull the pain. Maybe the drink to help relax after a hard

day spread to the morning to take the edge off and grew to the lunchtime tipple until you are hiding it everywhere. Or perhaps you suffered trauma or betrayal and you turned to something to help you forget but now you are needing that thing not to feel good but just to survive.

These are symptoms of a deeper conflict - a fight with a false cure. True healing requires us to get to the root of the issue. And that often involves difficult steps. Some people I've worked with had to forgive others before they could move forward. Others had to acknowledge the hurt they had caused. In many cases, bitterness - whether toward others or oneself - had become entangled with pride, keeping them stuck. But when you

push past the anger, pride, defenses and distractions, it becomes just you

and the Lord. That's the moment when real change begins - when you can cry out, as the Scriptures say, "God be merciful to me a sinner." (Luke 18:13). That's when healing takes root. When you fix that primary relationship with God, the other relationships in your life can begin to heal as well. The path isn't easy, but the key to victory is surrender. Not to your addiction. Not to your pain. But to the God who loves you and wants to restore you. Have a joyful June - and don't forget Father's Day!

# Seeds of change sprout in Cambourne's Catholic Community

The Seeds of Change team at the St John Fisher community were delighted to welcome Dr Sue Price from the Margaret Beaufort Institute of Theology for an Enrichment Day. The aim of these days is to provide an opportunity to explore faith in greater depth, looking at it from a new angle and, hopefully, doing something a bit different from what we are used to in daily life. Dr Price delivered brilliantly, leading us through a Godly Play session on Jesus' parable, "the Pearl of Great Price." Godly Play is a well-established method of looking at scripture that uses the spoken word together with carefully-chosen props and visual aids to tell the story; the storyteller then makes some prompts that begin "I wonder..." and teases out some threads of thought from the group before sending



everyone off to respond to the story. Art and craft materials are provided for this, but each participant responds in their own way. Like all good gatherings, the sessions ended with a feast. Godly Play is accessible to people of all ages, and the children and parents who attended all got something wonderful out of the session, with one cynical dad coming away with a bright new insight into a story that he thought had little new to offer him: such is the power of Godly Play. 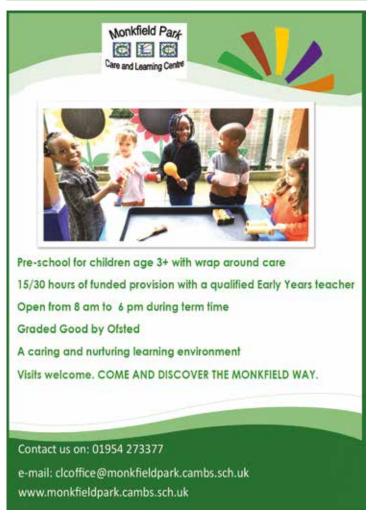

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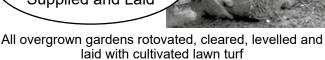
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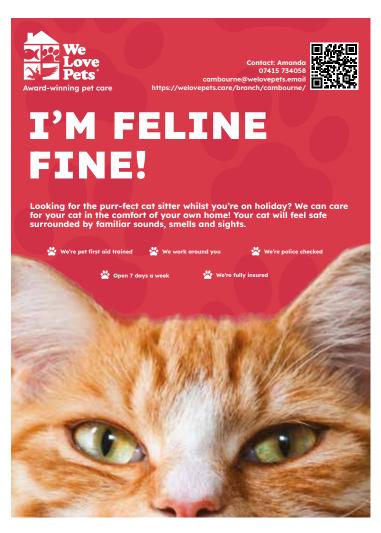

# **Cambridgeshire Fire Service** issues warning after battery blazes

Charging batteries have already caused several fires in homes across the county so far this year.

Firefighters have been called to fires involving batteries being over charged, resulting in thermal runaway from the lithium-ion contained in them and causing significant damage to homes.

Crews from Wisbech and March, along with crews from Norfolk, recently attended a well-developed house fire in Wisbech. They arrived to find the battery from a DIY home conversion e-bike kit had exploded, with the fire spreading throughout the property causing significant damage. One of the residents was treated for burns at the scene.

At the start of April crews from Cambridge attended a fire on the ground floor of a house in the Chesterton area of the city. They arrived to find an escooter, as well as several other items including power tools, on charge in the living room, with one of the batteries having exploded. Luckily the residents closed the doors while evacuating the property, which limited the damage.

At the end of March crews from Ely and Burwell, along with Newmarket from neighbouring Suffolk, attended a fire in Soham. They arrived to find a fire in the kitchen resulting from two devices being charged, a games console controller and a portable power bank.

A matter of days later the Peterborough Volunteer Fire Brigade and a crew from Yaxley attended a fire in Orton Malborne in Peterborough. This again involved a battery used in a DIY home conversion e-bike kit, bought in an online market place. One of the residents sustained burns that required hospital treatment.

Both of these fires caused significant damage to the properties.



Station Commander Gareth Boyd, one of the Service's community risk managers, said: "These incidents highlight the potential risks that lithiumion batteries can pose and how it is vital for people to be alert when charging any kind of device. Electrical devices are a key part of everyday life. Mobile phones, tablets, laptops and games console controllers, as well as vehicles like ebikes and scooters are used daily and need to be powered to do so.

"Most devices come with safety features to ensure they do not overheat when being charged. Using the charging packs, cables and plugs provided by the manufacturers, rather than cheaper versions will help charge devices safely. Replica replacement chargers sometimes don't have these features and can end up overcharging the battery, which causes thermal runaway leading to explosions and rapidly intense fires. We have seen items for sale, at car boot sales as well as online, that people can use to convert a standard bike into an e-bike. These whilst seemingly a cheap alternative can be highly dangerous and do not conform to the required standards to be sold in the UK."

Residents are being reminded to Take Charge and Be Safe, remembering some simple tips to help keep themselves and their families safe.

Gareth added: "Most new items come with a suitable battery and charger, however if you are looking to purchase additional ones then make sure they are the right voltage and are fully compatible. Other things like charging a mobile phone while you are awake and alert, rather than while sleeping, means the device won't be overcharged and risk overheating the battery. This can be the same for any device."

The Service is encouraging people to plan a good bedtime routine. Things like making sure all internal doors are closed, electrical sockets are switched off, any candles or heating appliances are off and keeping hallways and stairs clear of obstructions. This will not only help prevent a fire from happening but also ensure an easy escape if one does.

Gareth said: "Many fires in the home start at night while people are asleep, but can be easily avoided by following a few simple tips, as well as having working smoke alarms on each floor of your home. Residents can also use our online home safety check to carry out their own fire risk assessment. This simple to use tool generates a safety plan for the occupants to follow."

# South Cambs leads the nation in boosting Healthy Start uptake

South Cambridgeshire has seen the biggest increase in NHS Healthy Start claims in the country, following a targeted campaign by the District Council encouraging eligible parents to sign up for free food and milk support.

The three-week campaign is projected to have distributed nearly £60,000 of previously unclaimed funds.

The campaign used the District Council's innovative new Low-Income Family Tracker (LIFT) software to identify families who were likely to be eligible for this support. These families were then sent a letter or text encouraging them to apply if they had not already done so.

The NHS Healthy Start scheme provides vital help for pregnant women as well as parents with children under four, offering free fruit, vegetables, milk and infant formula to those who qualify. It can be worth up to £8.50 a week depending on the age of the child - however many people are unaware of their eligibility.

Thanks to the Council's proactive approach, the number of people claiming from the NHS Healthy Start scheme in the district jumped by over 12 per cent between February and March - from 526 to nearly 600 residents.

This increase is higher than any other district in the country for this time period and compares to a national increase of just 1.4 per cent. Using average claim figures, this increase is projected to be worth a total of £42,858.40.

The Council also used the campaign as an opportunity to increase uptake of the Household Support Fund, a one-off payment of £110 to eligible families. 137 Household Support Fund applications were completed as part of the campaign, valued at over £15,000. This takes the financial impact of this three-week campaign to £57,928.40.

The Healthy Start scheme is offered by the NHS to parents receiving certain benefits but were estimated to go unclaimed by more than a third (38 per cent) of eligible parents in South Cambridgeshire which is why the District Council campaign was launched.

The Low-Income Family Tracker (LIFT) identified 377 households who were likely to be eligible for the Healthy Start scheme. All these households were contacted by letter and text where possible encouraging them to apply if they had not done so already.

Parents are eligible for the NHS Healthy Start scheme if they have a child under the age of four and are on certain benefits. If eligible, parents will receive a Healthy Start card that can be used in most UK supermarkets, like a debit card.

The card will be pre-loaded with £8.50 a week for children aged under one, and £4.25 a week for children aged between one and four years old.



# The Healthy Start Card can be used to buy:

- Fresh, frozen, and tinned fruit and vegetables
- Fresh, dried, and tinned pulses
- Plain liquid cow's milk
- Infant formula milk based on cow's milk

# The card can also be used to collect:

- Healthy Start vitamins these support a parent during pregnancy and breastfeeding
- Vitamin drops for babies and young children – these are suitable from birth to 4 years old

A household must be claiming one of the following benefits to quality:

- Universal Credit with earned income of less than £408 per month from employment
- Child Tax Credit
- Income Support
- Income-related Employment Support Allowance
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (not contributory benefits) and have a household income below a specified amount

# The easiest way to apply for the Healthy Start scheme is online.

If residents are unable to apply online, they can call the Healthy Start helpline on 0300 330 7010 and a member of staff will help complete an application.
