This year, the Act of Remembrance will take place on Sunday 9th November at 10.50am outside Cambourne Church.

Everyone is welcome at this event as we say 'thank you' to all who have served, sacrificed and changed our world and also to those who are currently doing so. There will be the opportunity for the uniformed organisations, community groups, local businesses and individuals to lay wreaths at the foot of the cross during the service.

There will be a parade of the uniformed organisations starting at the junction of the High Street and Monkfield Lane (by

the Monkfield Arms) and moving along the High Street, turning in front of Cambourne Church and then into the church car park from Eastgate. After the service, the parade will then move from the church to the cricket pavilion at the junction of Eastgate and Back Lane. After the Act of Remembrance, everyone is warmly invited to stay at Cambourne Church for hot drinks and cakes. The parade route will be closed to all traffic (except pedestrians etc) between 10.00am and 11.45am while the Act of Remembrance and parade take place. Diversions along Broad Street, De La Warr Way and Back Lane will be in place. During this time, the whole of the church car park will be in use for both the parade and members of the public - therefore, please ensure that no vehicles are left in the car park on the Sunday morning. November Wildlife Trust BCN Update

The Wildlife Trust BCN are very keen to encourage people to be more sustainable. The more things we buy, the more energy is needed to make them and move them, which contributes to climate change and affects local wildlife. Consider buying good quality gifts that will last, think about packaging, make something with upcycled materials, and give something that will be cherished.

Here are some ideas for alternative gifts:

Grab a ticket to share a sociable Nature and Natter session with your friend or family member. Coming up, we have an evening of sustainable craft, and another where you can make a willow wreath. wildlifebcn.org/events

Buy something hand-made and local from a craft or farmer's market, or visit our annual Christmas Fair at our head office in Cambourne on Friday Nov 28th 3-7pm

Adopt a species. For the Wildlife Trust BCN you can support our work by adopting a highland cow, beaver, or hedgehog shop.wildlifebcn.org

Give the gift of Wildlife Trust BCN membership and support the local nature reserves you use regularly wildlifebcn.org/become-member

Create a jam-jar full of time vouchers...you could have a token to explore a new nature reserve together, or one where you watch the birds in the garden.

Winter wildlife

Winter is a good time to watch ducks and geese. Many wildfowl are winter migrants, and the Wildlife Trust BCN have a few wetland sites nearby where you can see these more unusual water birds, sometimes as part of large flocks.

Grafham Water: we manage some of the area surrounding this huge reservoir, and there are several hides. There are lots of interested ducks, including pintail, shoveler, and shelducks. There is a charge for parking.

Ouse Washes: An internationally important site for wetland birds. Over winter you might see Bewick and whooper swans here, as well as large numbers of ducks.

Godmanchester Nature Reserve: this smaller site was once gravel pits. Look out for wigeon, tufted duck and teal here.

The Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs, and Northants is a local wildlife conservation charity aiming to achieve bigger, better, and more joined up habitats for wildlife and people. We do this by working in partnership to conserve and enhance habitats and biodiversity, and through community work, helping people enjoy, understand, and take action for wildlife.

Winter dog walking etiquette: **Enjoying safe, respectful** walks in our community

Walking our dogs is one of life's great pleasures, especially on crisp autumn and winter days. As evenings grow darker and paths become busier, a few simple habits can help keep everyone safe, comfortable and happy.

Here are our top tips for thoughtful dog walking this season:

Be Seen

With daylight fading, make sure you and your dog are visible. Reflective/light up collars, leads or coats help other walkers, cyclists and drivers see you clearly on local paths and roads.

Pick Up and Take It Home

Always clean up after your dog and use a nearby bin. If there is none, carry the bag home - also keeps your hands warm! Leaving waste or litter can harm wildlife and spoil community spaces.

Lead by Example

If your dog is still mastering recall, keep them on a lead. Always use one near livestock, children or when passing other dogs.



Care for Paws and Paths

Cold pavements and salt can irritate paws. Wipe them down after walks and use paw balm





when needed. Stick to marked paths to protect nature and avoid icy spots.

Regular walks are not only good for your dog's health but also for your own. Spending time outdoors boosts mood, reduces stress and helps clear the mind, a wonderful way to reset during the busy winter months.

Palliative care beds at Arthur Rank Hospice

It came as a shock that Arthur Rank Hospice, our excellent local palliative care provider, would be facing a funding cut which will force the closure of nine of its 23 beds.

There are thousands of people who have been supported through the most difficult time of their and their loved ones' lives by Arthur Rank Hospice – I have heard from many residents over the past few weeks, and visited the hospice myself after news of the funding cuts broke.

The funding crisis is primarily due to Cambridge University Hospitals (CUH) being unable to sustain its previous funding contribution due to pressure on its budgets allocated by the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Integrated Care System. This is

made even more severe by the government's increase in employer National Insurance Contributions (NICs). I have written to the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, urging him to restore the funding deficit to ensure that all 23 beds at Arthur Rank stay open.

It is our hospices, not our overstretched hospitals, that should be properly supported to provide the care people need to die with dignity.

We have also launched a petition to show the Government just how much this community-based care means to residents, which gained over 10,000 signatures in the first 24 hours. You can sign the petition by using this link: www.snm clibdems.org.uk/campaigns/save-arh-beds

New war memorial and remembrance garden

At the time of writing this, our new war memorial and remembrance garden is being constructed at the corner of Eastgate and Jeavons Lane, at the site of the old Ark building.

This is something I have wanted for so long and have worked to deliver with District Council grant funding from the Rural Prosperity Fund, the Town Council and the veteran community in Cambourne.

Most older towns and villages have war memorials which were built following the two Great Wars. Cambourne as we know it was not in existence then, although the land it is built on played an important role as an airbase in WW2. But our residents still wish to pay their respects to those who have served our country and our values, during the World Wars, and also those who have served in more recent conflicts such as Bosnia, Iraq and Afghanistan.

As we establish ourselves as a town, it is important that we built civic infrastructure that provides focal points for our community at times when we wish to come together. I hope that this new formal garden will provide a peaceful and reflective space and a place we can honour the service and sacrifice of so many.

We will remember them.

Suffering from Dizziness

Feeling dizzy is unpleasant and can cause difficulty in carrying on with daily activities.

Dizziness can include different symptoms such as feeling the room is spinning, giddiness or feeling light headed. There are many causes of dizziness. Often it can be connected to a problem with the ears, including infections (sometimes related to colds and flu), inner ear problems which may include ringing/ sounds in the ears (tinnitus) and problems with tiny crystals in the ears that help balance.

Dizziness can also occur when we stand or sit up suddenly; this may be caused by our blood pressure dropping (postural hypotension) and can be helped by marching feet on the floor before standing up.

Some medications can cause dizziness and if symptoms start after beginning a new medicine, it is important to report this.

Stress and anxiety, particularly with panic attacks, can also be linked to dizziness.

Other conditions related to dizziness include migraines, dehydration, low blood sugar and anaemia.

Dizziness usually settles by itself, but speak with a doctor if symptoms do not go away. This is particularly important if other symptoms include vision, speech or hearing changes; a high temperature; feelings of numbness or weakness; fainting or a severe headache.

I am deeply troubled by the increase in divisive rhetoric in this country. Such language focuses on what divides us from one another rather than on what unites. However, there is a verse in the Bible which inspires me. It speaks of a barrier between people of different ethnic and religious backgrounds being broken down because of Jesus Christ. "He himself is our peace ... and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility." For me this sets a standard. While I cannot do the unique things that only Jesus can achieve, I can still seek to live by the values and goals which he embodied. And one of those values and goals is the breaking down of hostile barriers between people of different backgrounds.

It is November - the month of Remembrance - and it is a good time to reflect on actions that divide and on actions that unite. Remembrance Day is a time to pause, calling to mind those who have died in war. It is also a time to reflect on continuing hostilities, and to commit ourselves to working towards a better world. I am reminded of another Bible verse: "If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone."

So it is worth asking ourselves afresh,

- What can I do that builds community?
- What binds diverse people together?
- What offers love and hope?

And God will be with us.

Fix it or Fling it.

Pastoral Thoughts

Last month I spoke of maintenance. Both at home and in the ministry. I also made the application to our spiritual lives. Not neglecting prayer, Bible reading, or fellowship, we may get by for a while, but eventually there will be a breakdown. Well it seems the Lord had a second part to that as even though some things need repair and maintaining at other times some stuff needs straight up replacement. Like my dryer which lasted 20 years but when its belt went it also snapped several components and we also found electrical burns in the cord and some other things that made me feel that reassembly would not be a safe wager. Same is true with the rear silencer on my car. It decided to come along for the ride but not do anything but hang around badly detached from the rest. This caused 2 loud disturbing sounds, one from my engine and the second from my wife about the engine sounds. But at least they sell silencers for engines. In fact a church member needed to borrow a tool that day and picked up the part and swapped it out for me. What I am trying to say is some things you fix some you do not. If the thing is hazardous or detrimental to your life like my broken dryer it needs to be replaced with something better. This could

be a physical thing or a spiritual thing such as a habit or addiction or even an attitude. We addressed some of this in our addiction recovery ministry. (this should be restarting early next year.)

Do not just remove it as nature hates a vacuum but replace the bad with good if it is harmful or perhaps like the

It is laying aside the mundane for that which is better. Philippians 4:8 Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things.

You change your thoughts, you will change your actions which will change habits and attitudes and that will change your life.

The Vine Inter-Church Primary School had an excited day trip. The

excitement started as soon as the kids left school heading off on a double-decker coach to Wandlebury Country Park. Transported back in time to the Iron Age period, they loved adventuring around the site, collecting stickers while learning about the hillfort which stood on the site all those years ago. In

"I learned there was no electricity in the Iron Age. They kept warm by making fires."

"I learned that archaeologists found bones at Wandlebury!" "That was the best school trip ever!"





Every project demonstrates how technology can transform lives, leaving audiences inspired.

For the past nine years, Dr. Sujit Bhattacharya has mentored these Friday classes at Cambourne Church, guiding children through ten sessions that end with a public project presentation and certificate ceremony.

The next BBC Micro: Bit Beginners batch starts in November 2025 in the Church annexe. These classes nurture curiosity, teamwork, and innovation, giving children the tools to explore STEM and build confidence for the future.

Be protected this winter

NHS Cambridgeshire & Peterborough urging anyone eligible for their COVID-19, flu, RSV or pneumococcal vaccines to make sure they've had them this winter. Each vaccine has a slightly different eligibility criteria:

RSV vaccine - for anyone who is pregnant, aged 75-79, or anyone who turned 80 years old from 1 September 2024.

Pneumococcal vaccine - for anyone 65 or over (only one dose is needed).

Flu vaccine - for anyone aged 65 or over (including those who will be 65 by 31 March 2025); have certain long-term health conditions; are pregnant; live in a care home; are the main carer for an older or disabled person, or receive a carer's allowance; or live with someone who has a weakened immune

COVID-19 vaccine - for anyone aged 75+; those aged between six months and 74 years and have a weakened immune system because of a health condition or treatment; and people who live in a care home for older adults.

For some people who have got used to have their COVID-19 and flu vaccine together in winter, this might mean a change for them as the COVID-19 vaccine age criteria has changed from people over 65 to people over 75.

Take Charge and Be Safe this festive season

As the festive season approaches and people look for presents and take advantage of Black Friday deals, many are looking to save money on electrical items. However, we continue to urge people to Take Charge and Be Safe when buying devices, especially items that require batteries or chargers.

You can help keep yourself and your family safe by following a few simple safety measures, including ensuring to buy electrical items from reputable dealers, being awake and at home when using and charging devices and adding safety to your bedtime routine.

Electrical devices are a key part of everyday life and are often bought in Black Friday deals and as presents for family members and friends. Games consoles with controllers, tablets, laptops and e-bikes and e-scooters are on lots of people's present list. All these items require charging as they contain lithium-ion batteries.

Most devices come with failsafe features to ensure they do not overheat when being charged, but rely on the manufacturers' provided charging cables and adapters to work. Also, using the plug and cables supplied with the product rather than cheaper versions will help charge devices safely.

The Service is reminding people to Take Charge and Be Safe, not only when charging their devices, but also when planning on purchasing devices and presents. Most new items come with a suitable battery and charger, however if you are looking to purchase additional ones then make sure they are the right voltage and are fully compatible. Other things like charging a mobile phone while you are awake and alert, rather than while sleeping, means the device won't be overcharged and risk overheating the battery. This can be the same for any device.

We are encouraging people to plan a good bedtime routine including things like making sure electrical sockets are switched off, all internal doors are closed, any candles are out, heating appliances are off and hallways and stairs are kept clear of obstructions. This will not only help prevent a fire from happening but also ensure an easy escape if one does.

Disposing of batteries safely

Batteries can be a fire hazard if they are not disposed of properly. They should never be put in household rubbish or recycling bins.

During the processing of waste or recycling, a battery can be compacted and damaged, which can lead to ignition of the highly reactive lithium, leading to a fire starting.

Any kind of battery can cause a fire if not disposed of correctly and safely. This includes vapes or other e-cigarettes as well as standard batteries.



Fires involving batteries cause damage to refuse vehicles and roads, as well as significant delays to bin collections and road closures.

How to dispose of batteries

There are many places to safely dispose of batteries. As well as local recycling centres, many shops around the county have collection bins in-store.



Consultation about Street Trading in South Cambs

Proposed changes to street trading in South Cambs aim to help small local businesses work in more places whilst giving local communities more of a say. The consultation launched today (Wednesday 15thOctober 2025) and runs until to Monday 24th November 2025.

South Cambridgeshire's local traders in particular are being asked to share their views – although anyone is welcome to have their say. The proposed alterations aim to modernise and streamline the street trading regime across the district, with proposed

key changes including:

A new "Ice Cream Trader" consent which would allow ice cream vans to trade anywhere in South Cambridgeshire - where they have agreement from a parish or town council. There would be specific conditions on location, timing, and noise.

Enhanced safeguarding measures requiring basic DBS checks for traders and their employees.

Clearer application requirements, including written permissions from the County Council's Highways team and landowners for trading locations – before a licence application is made.

The recognition of specific food hygiene training standards to ensure food safety.

A more flexible approach to how long trading consents last for, moving away from a fixed expiry date.

A simplified process for revoking consents, with appeals handled by District Councillors.

Feedback can be submitted via the Council's consultation portal at www.scambs.gov.uk/consultations

Responses will be considered by the Licensing Committee before any final decisions are made in the new year.

Cambourne u3a visit to Burghley House in Lincolnshire











We had a really enjoyable and interesting day at Burghley House. We were lucky to avoid the rain as we toured the beautiful gardens in the afternoon.

The house was built by William Cecil Lord High Treasurer to Queen Elizabeth 1st, between 1555 and 1587. Later in the late 17th century the 5th Earl inserted arched windows on the south front to enclose a gallery and to repair damage sustained in the Civil We building.

In 1754 the 9th Earl employed Lancelot Capability Brown to design the garden and parkland and additional buildings including the Orangery. The photos here show the main facade.

We enjoyed an extensive and very informative tour of the interior of the house, starting in the kitchen. There were many shelves full of copper kitchen equipment including a turtle used to serve turtle soup (there were also a row of small turtle skulls on a shelf!). We also saw the largest silver wine cooler in the world!

Also some beautiful pieces of furniture. We then enjoyed a tour of the gardens and park. We walked down to the Lake and then toured the North American garden which where the maples were beginning to show Autumn colour. We walked through the Remembrance garden and where lovely dahlias were beginning to bloom, and then tested our skill in the maze!

Other lovely blooms were cyclamen and colchicum. Altogether we had a lovely visit. The house is wonderfully well preserved and the room stewards were all very knowledgeable and gave us a fascinating account of the history of the house and family.
